Ben R. Townley, city secretary, gave the Progress the following letter which has been mailed. Payment of these bonds will complete a bonded indebtedness that was made back in the Twenties when Gorman was a town of several thousand and oil was in its heyday.

Guaranty Trust Co. New York, N. Y. Gentlemen: We are placing in your hands at this time funds in the amount of two hundred fifteen dollars (\$215) for the interest payment, payment and commission due November 1, 1958 on City of Gorman Refunding Bonds, Series 1938.

We are also forwarding to you our check in the amount of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000.00) with which to redeem bonds that have been called as per the enclosed notice, a copy of which was sent to the Bond Buyer at 67 Pearl Street, New York 4, New York, with instructions to run one time.

We want to stop interest payments on these particular bonds as of November 1, 1958. The number 39 coupon is the last interest coupon to be paid on the above numbered bonds.

This call retires all of the outstanding bonds of the above described issue, dated November 1, 1938.

Facts About School Tax Evaluation

Facts and figures about school evaluation increase of School tax rate at \$1.50 per \$100 value. Forty cents of which goes for bonded indebtedness and \$1.10 to local maintenance.

Below are figures covering nine years of school cost, taxes received and evaluation from which the taxes are paid.

The last line represents this school year and the estimated evaluation and taxes on 100% collection. The income column shows the total amount from state, county and local tax receipts (which is also the amount spent. Over the nine year's a gradual increase in school costs as compared to the gradual decrease in evaluation shows evaluations had to be raised to meet the needs of operating the school.

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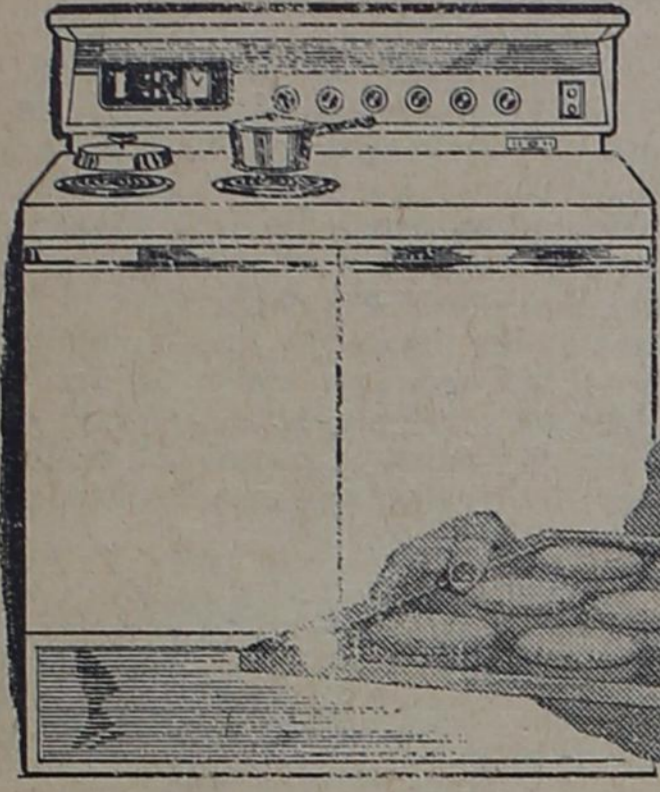

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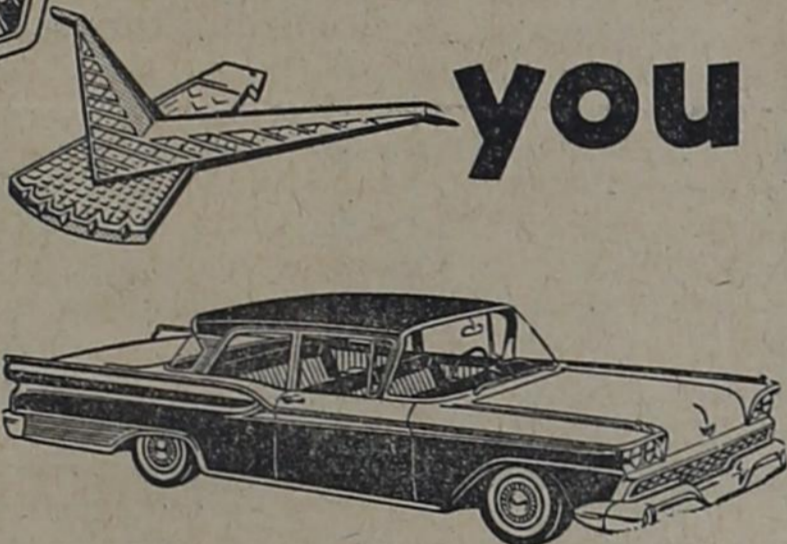
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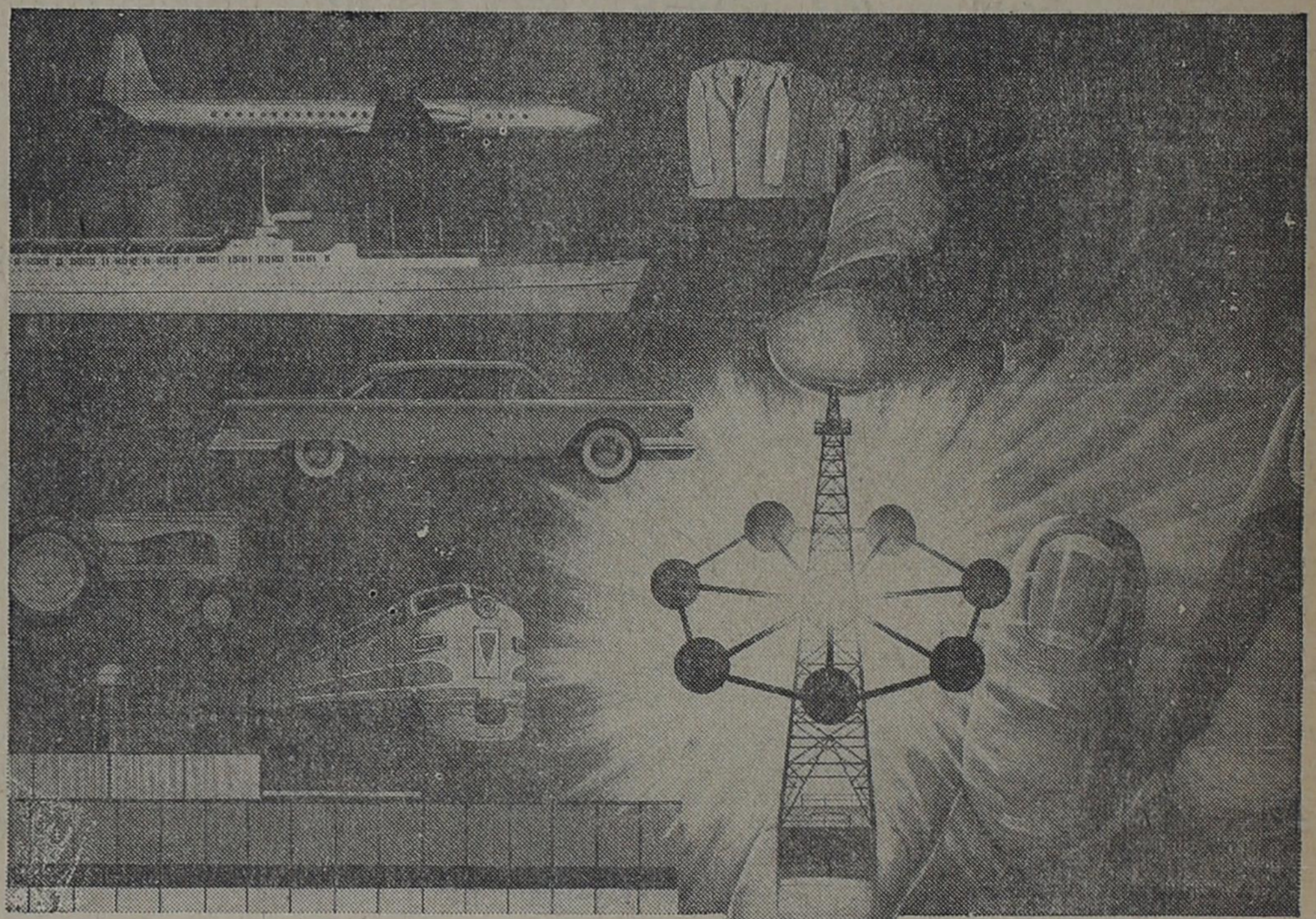

COOPERATING IN TELEVISION STUDIES

BROWNWOOD - Howard Payne is one of the nation's colleges cooperating with the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and the National Broadcasting Company in offering a televised course on atomic age physics.

The course, designed primarily for high school teachers, began on October 6, and will be televised from 6:30 until 7 each morning, Monday through Friday, over NBC-TV stations.

Enrollment for the course thru HPC is open to any person with at least 60 semester hours of college work. Students taking the course for credit will view the course over television, in lieu of classroom lectures, and also will work problems and take tests prepared by Dr. Inman's Department. Tuition will be \$48 per semester.

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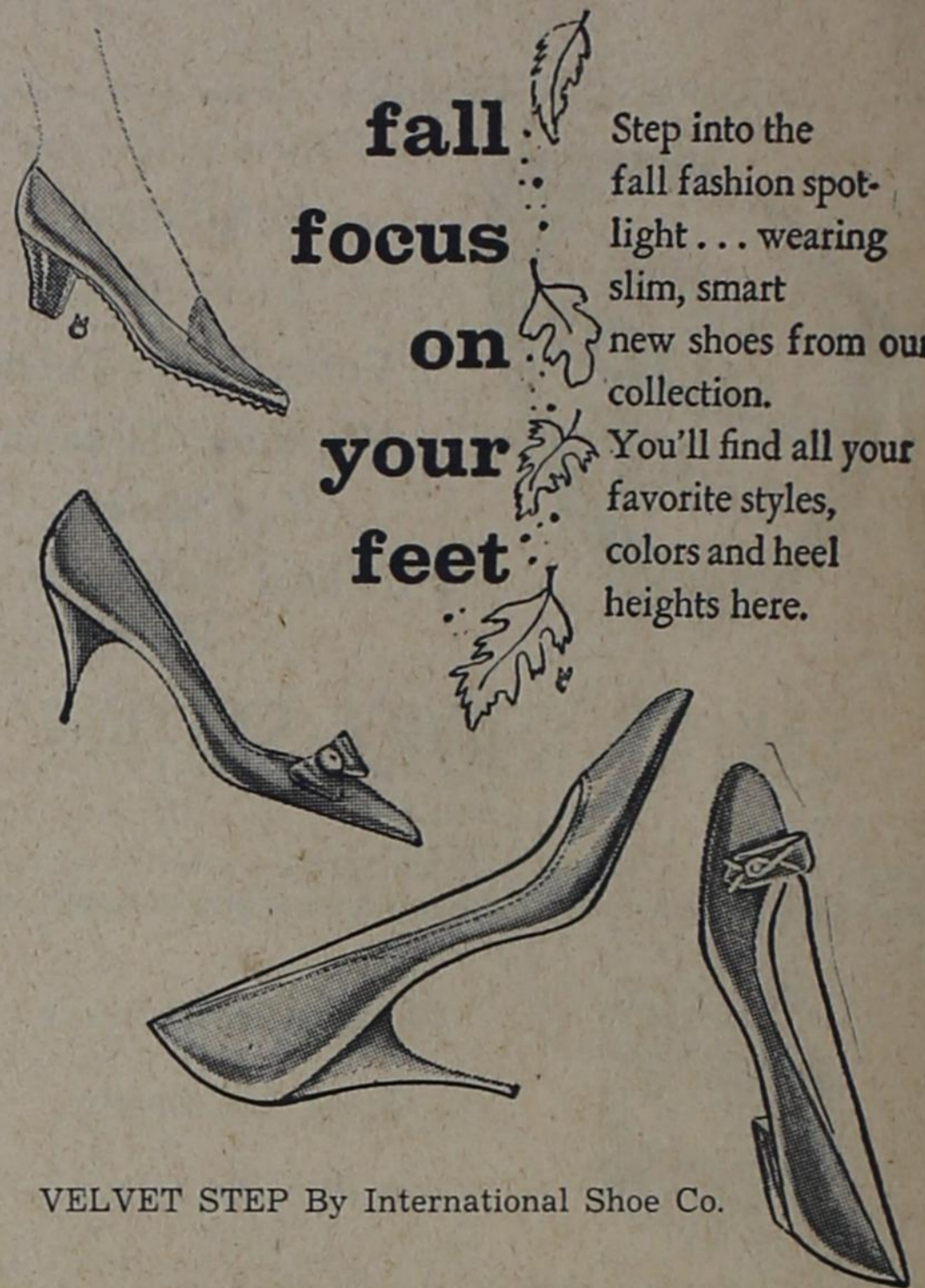
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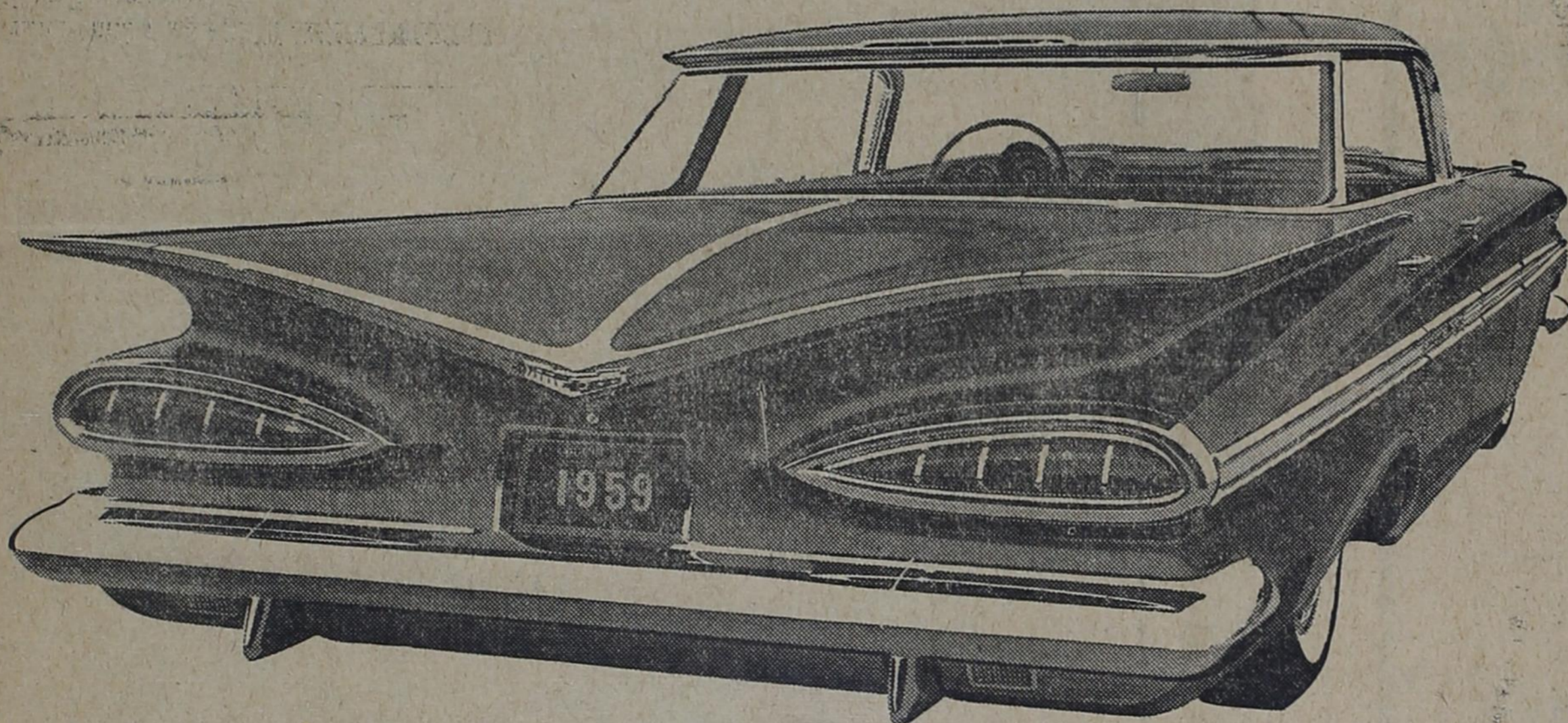
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
