Someone who knew and loved her wrote: "Her one aim in life was to serve Christ by making everyone whom she met happy. No one could have been more unselfish than she."

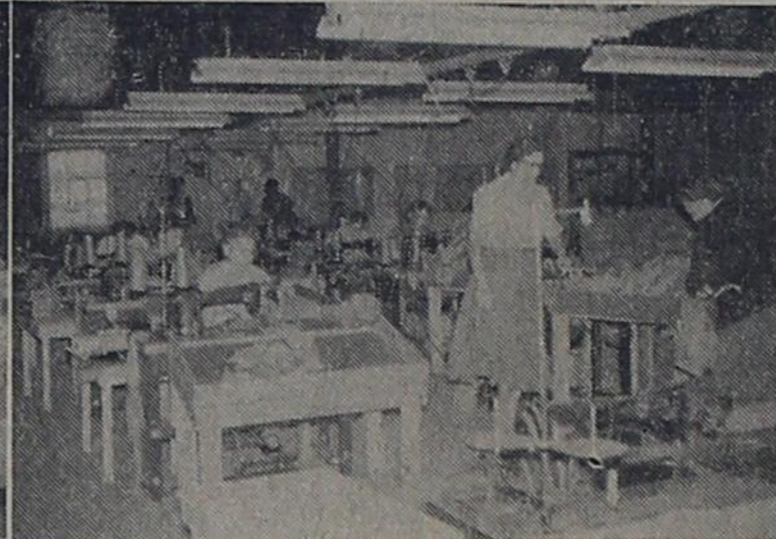

First of all, here is the recipe for the pumpkin pie that I promised. This one is what you might call a basic old fashioned recipe. There are ways to "fancy it up", such as Pumpkin Chiffon and Pumpkin Ice Cream; mighty good, too, but more pies are made by the simple, easy method and they are still enjoyed by the whole family.

Old Fashioned Pumpkin Pie

1 cup evaporated milk or light cream
1 1/2 cups cooked mashed pumpkin
1/2 tsp. ginger
1 tsp. molasses
3/4 cup brown sugar
3/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. mace
3/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. ground cloves
2 eggs
pastry for a 9-inch shell
Combine milk, sugar and pump

Budget As Approved By School Board

Following is the 1958-59 School Budget as approved by the Board of Trustees of the Gorman Independent School District.

Estimated receipts totaled \$121,908.00 according to the approved budget, and total expenditures were set at \$121,856.97.

The assessed valuation of taxable property for School purposes for 1958-59 is \$1,908,894.60 and the tax rates are: Maintenance - \$1.10 and Bond - \$.40.

Hostess, Mrs. Acree, served coffee, cake and candies during the social hour.

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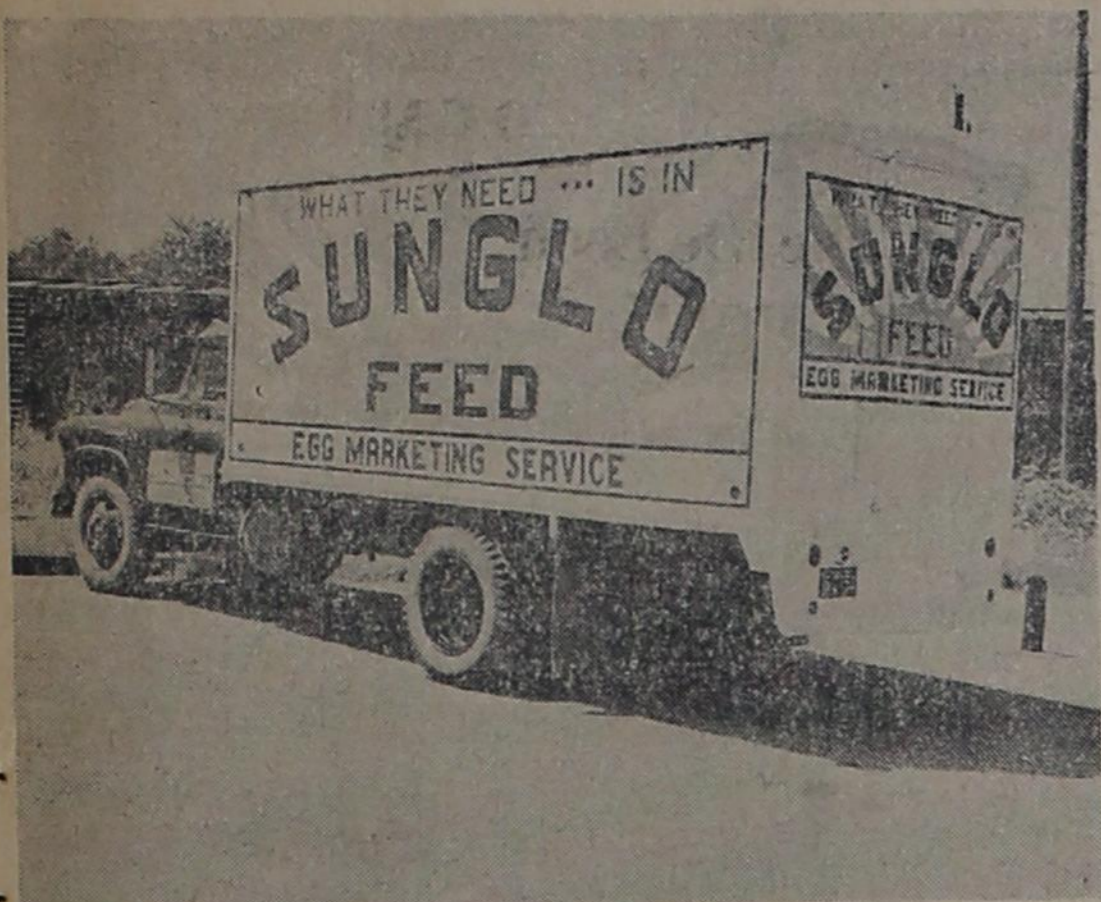
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Pictured above is the egg marketing service refrigerated truck in use by the Sunglo feed division of Fant Milling Co., Sherman, which will pick up eggs at Producers Feed & Supply in Gorman every week beginning Thursday, October 23. The eggs are hauled direct to Wilson & Co. in Dallas. This farmer-to-consumer service has been set up by Fant Milling Company of Sherman with Wilson & Co., Inc. of Dallas participating. Like most of the egg programs of today, this one has a strict feeding and management program provided by the Sunglo Feed division of Fant Milling Co. All laying flocks are kept in confinement. Eggs are gathered 3

times a day and put under mechanical refrigeration, which each participating poultry farmer must have. A different feature of this program is that the eggs are graded as to quality and size by the flock owner, packed in Wilson certified egg cartons and are not handled again, except for spot checking, until they reach the hands of the consumer in the grocery store. Each carton of eggs is identified with the producer's name and address placed on the carton prominently with a sticker. The program was set up by J. W. Banister, sales manager for the Sunglo Feed division of Fant Milling Co.

New work was planned for our Christmas gifts to the orphans home.

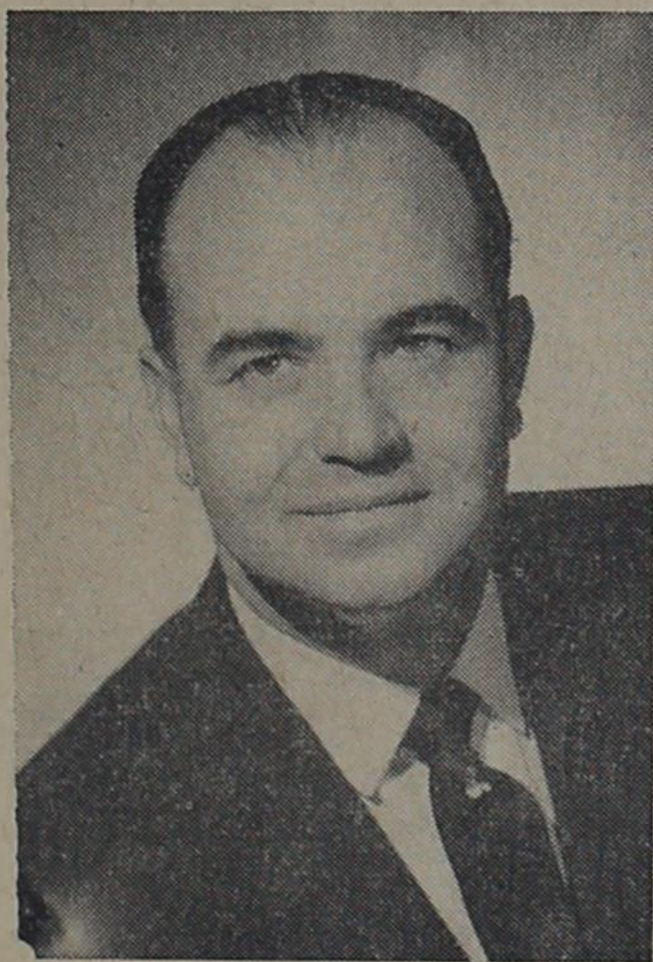

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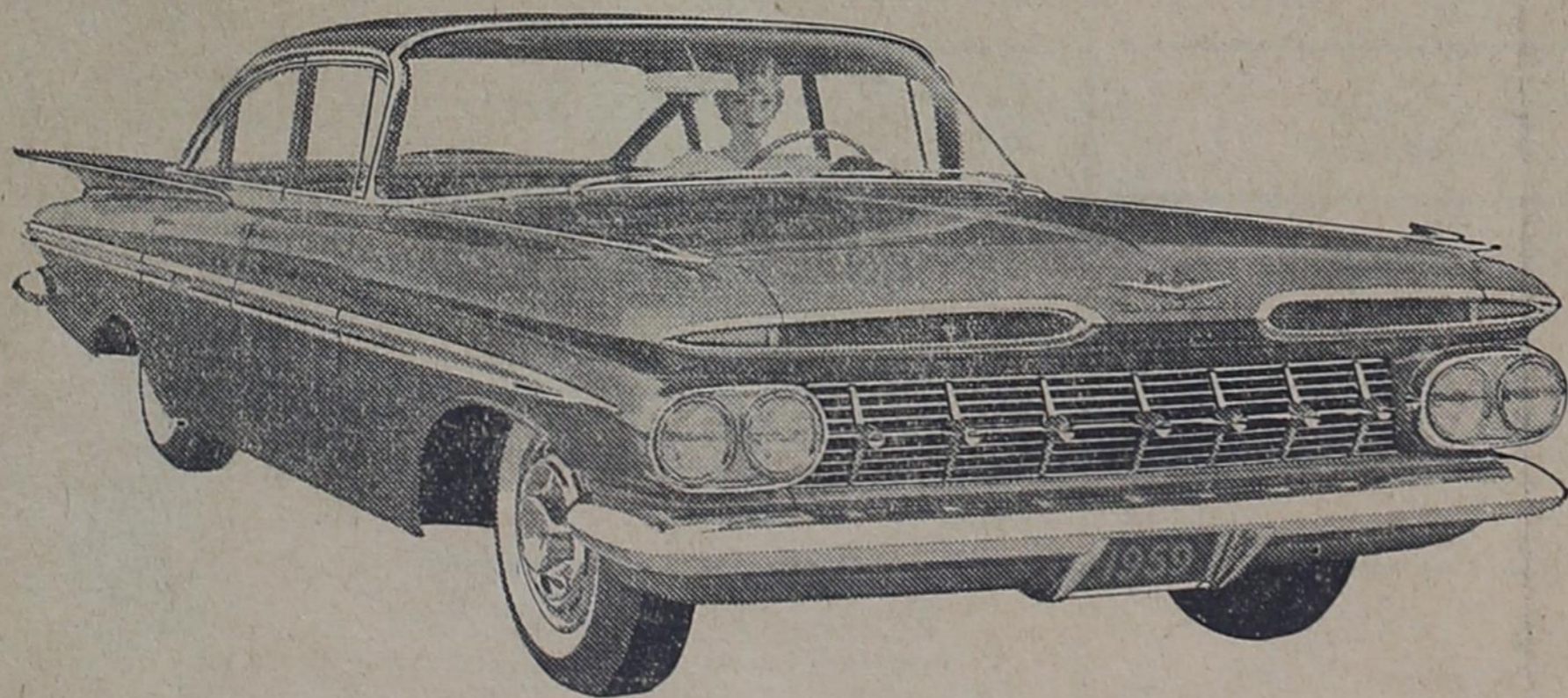
