

## Homecoming Activities Set For Saturday

### Cubs Win Championship For Second Straight Year

The Gorman Grade School Cubs won their second consecutive District Championship Tuesday night by defeating the Stephenville Junior High by a score of 16-6. The win also gave the Cubs a perfect season record with 8 wins and no losses and a 7-0 district record. The win also extended their winning streak to 15 games straight.

The Cubs received the opening kickoff and moved the ball 76 yards for the first touchdown. Halfback Gary Overstreet moved the ball to the 2 with a 5 yard carry and Halfback Ronnie Page carried over for the tally and extra points to give the Cubs an 8-0 lead.

An on-side kick was successful with William Jay making the recovery for Gorman. The Cubs went to the Stephenville 25 yard line before losing the ball on downs. The Cubs were successful in holding the ball for the entire first quarter.

The first play of the third quarter found Stephenville scoring on a 47-yard pass play from Pat Ballow to Jack Ballow. The attempted pass for the extra points was no good, leaving the score 8-6 in favor of the Cubs.

The Gorman team took the next kickoff and drove 61 yards for a tally with Halfbacks Overstreet and Page and Fullback Wayne Bledsoe carrying the ball. Page scored from one yard out and added the extra points.

The quarterbacking was handled by Harold Rodgers. Offensive linemen seeing action were Ends Larry Anderson and Joe Edd Baze; Tackles Rodney Stephens and William Boyd; Guards Billy Welch, Richard Watson and Jerry Wilson and Center Bobby Rodgers, who made two important fumble recoveries. On defense Gene Simmons, Richard McLearn and Rodger Woodall did commendable playing. William Jay and Bobby Haynes went down on kickoffs.

Other players on the squad are Larry Kirk, David Kirk, James Wallace, George Bolt, Jerry Ormsby, Tommy Broom, Gerald Scitern, Micheal Foster, Terry Clark, Don Wallace, and Terry Joiner. Vickie Stacy is a member of the squad but was unable to play the last half of the season. Managers were Leslie and J. L. Hamilton.

The Cubs defeated Cisco 8-0 in a non-district game and won district games from Granbury 34-14; De Leon 32-14; Glen Rose 28-8; Hamilton 8-0; Comanche 26-12; Dublin 32-6; and Stephenville 16-6.

The Gorman team scored 184 points to their opponents 60.

Hamilton defeated De Leon 28-0 Tuesday night to finish second behind the Cubs, with a record of 6-1, with Stephenville having a 5-2 district record to finish third.

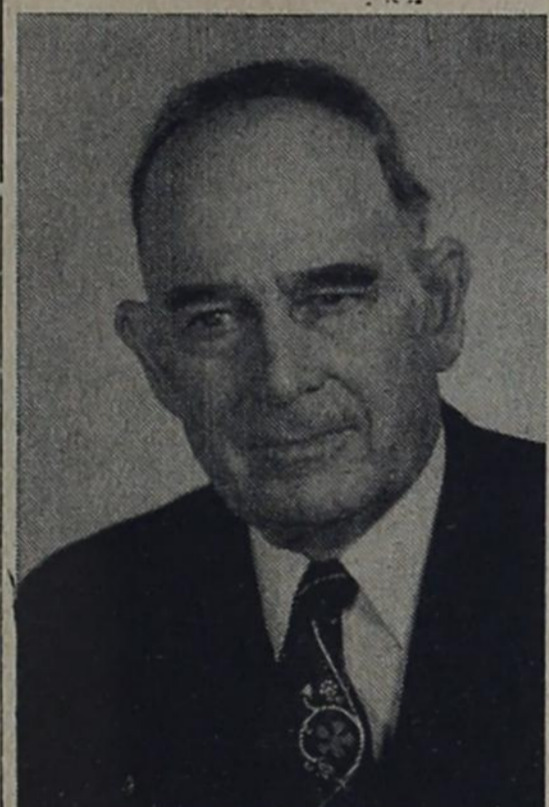

With all the good, clear weather we have had the past week and so far this week the farmers are sure making (not hay) peanuts while the sun shines. The crops are averaging a very good yield but grades are lower than anticipated. However, peanuts being graded now are receiving a little better grades than the early peanuts which were marketed during the damp weather. The yield average for this entire area is estimated at around 20 to 25 bushels per acre. Some, however, have gotten as many as 60 bushels per acre and this could raise the final average.

All I know is that it has been several years since I have seen as many sacks of peanuts standing at the end of the rows waiting to be stacked for drying before marketing. And if the good weather continues the harvesting should be done pretty quick.

**Proper Curing Of Peanuts A Nesity**

Good quality peanuts can be produced by artificial drying if properly cured. Improper curing of peanut will cause off-flavors to develop which will make them unsuitable for use in foods according to G. W. Giles and J. W. Dickens of North Carolina State College. Speaking before a joint meeting of the Peanut Butter Manufacturers Association and the Peanut Butter Sandwich and Cookie Manufacturers Association in Washington, D. C., Dr. Giles likened peanut butter manufacture to a long production line that starts when the seed is planted and ends when the jar of peanut butter is ready for the consumer. The curing operation and all other operations which occur along this production line have an effect on the quality of the final product.  
 Mechanization of peanut harvesting by combining partially-dried peanuts from the windrow will save the grower nearly 1000 man-hours of labor on 45 acres of peanuts over the conventional stackpole method. These partially dried peanuts are cured by forcing air at 95 degrees or below through bins of combined peanuts. While bulk cured peanuts as good or better than stackpole cured peanuts can be produced if the recommendations of the State Experiment Stations are followed, Dr. Giles warned his audience that in addition to off-flavors caused by excessive air temperatures in curing, rapid drying and overdrying will cause milling damage which lowers the quality of the peanuts. Proper curing requires equipment designed to give the proper air flow and the proper temperature. It should never be necessary to exceed the capacity of the system in order to meet the needs of a rush harvesting season. Above all else, proper curing requires a skilled, conscientious operator who recognizes the detrimental effects that improper curing can have on the entire peanut industry.  
 Through a better understanding of each step of peanut processing and strong support of basic research on peanuts, Dr. Giles looks forward to the production of higher quality peanuts with still further reductions in labor requirements and weather hazard.

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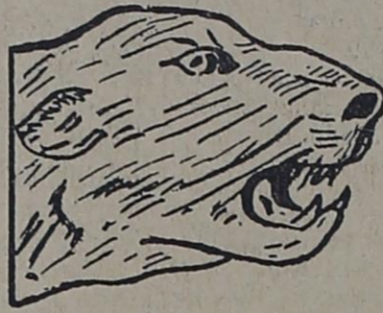

4 eggs  
2 tablespoons cold water  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/8 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup English walnuts or pecans

2 cups powdered sugar
