He also read cards, letters and telegrams from some who were unable to attend. One telegram arrived too late to reach the meeting in time. It was sent to Pen R. Townley.

It read: "Best wishes on the class reunion. Sorry I couldn't make it." — Jim Jamison.

Old business was soon disposed of. Under new business a motion was made and carried to have a \$1.00 registration fee to help finance the association in place of the "passing the hat" practice.

Next in order was the selection of the Coming Home Queen. The two nominees were Mrs. Ruth McKittrick White and Mrs. Elva Shell Kirk. Mrs. Kirk was voted the winner.

The oldest ex-teacher to register was Mr. G. W. Scott of Rising Star. Other ex-teachers were Mrs. Flora Mae Clark Kinney of Stamford, wife of one of our first football players; Mrs. Dona Moorman, now serving as our postmaster; Mrs. Clara Mae Underwood Frossard, who admits her husband in running their dept. store; Mrs. Era Rudd Skaggs now teaching at Hardin-Simmons University, and her husband Mr. Roy Skaggs, who is in the investment business in Abilene.

I'm sure everyone enjoyed the wonderful cooperative spirit of the Rising Star Band is helping with the presentation of our Queens and Princesses. Together with our Panther Band, Miss Tate, our capable band director, and incidentally ex-band director of Rising Star, directed them in the formation of a huge heart, with the majorettes forming the arch under which the Queens, Princesses and their escorts entered the heart.

Mrs. Alice Hill Final Rites Held Here Thursday

Mrs. Alice Hill, pioneer teacher of the West Texas area, and the mother of Mrs. O. R. (Lois) Buchanan, of Gorman, passed away November 5, 1958 in Central Hospital, Wichita Falls, Texas.

Mrs. Hill was born in Lee County, Texas in 1879. Her father was the Reverend Alonzo Atkinson, Presbyterian minister.

Miss Alice Atkinson first married Mr. W. A. Lowry in 1903 at Goldthwaite. Mr. Lowry died in 1910. To this union was born two children: Mrs. Lois Buchanan of Gorman, and William Alonzo Lowry, who preceded his mother in death in 1933.

In 1913 she was married to Mr. A. B. Hill, also of Goldthwaite. He passed away in 1917.

Funeral services were held in the First Baptist Church of Gorman on Thursday, November 6 at 3:30 p. m. with her pastor, Rev. Don Turner, officiating.

Mrs. Hill taught in the public schools of Texas for 36 years, retiring in 1936 because of ill health. Most of her teaching was done in Lampasas, Coleman and San Saba Counties. She taught her last year in Novice, in Coleman County.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Lois Buchanan of Gorman; one sister, Mrs. Lena Dunsforth of Borger; one half brother, Mr. Jessie Atkinson of San Angelo; two granddaughters, Mrs. Eugene Hardin of Longview and Mrs. Andrew Urban of Brownwood; her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Era Lowry of Brownwood; and four great-grandchildren.

Burial was in the Oak Lawn Cemetery of Gorman.

Largest Peanut Crop In This Area Since 1950

Reports from the Gorman Peanut Company state that peanut farmers are harvesting their best crop since 1950. Farmers who have thrasher, hauled and sold their crop will vouch for the above.

Melvin Shell states that last Monday topped all previous records for peanuts purchased. 700 tons were bought and unloaded. With their new warehouse and modern unloading equipment peanuts are purchased in bulk as

well as in sacks. Trucks loaded with bulk peanuts are backed up to a lift which empties them in one operation.

R. A. Barnett of, Route One, is reported to have the largest yield per acre to date - over 117 acres brought him an average of 48 bushels per acre. R. W. Hampton yields were almost as much as the above. L. A. Harbin of Pumpkin Center unloaded over 46,000 pounds Wednesday.

If the weather continues to be favorable over 80 percent of the harvest in this area will be completed by Saturday.

"Come and Get It" was sounded by the brass band. By lantern light guests found their places marked with branding irons B & H.

Further enhancing the ranch atmosphere were two branding irons belonging to Mr. Hugh Baskin. One iron had the brand T R and had been hand-forged and used by the late Jack Brown of the Jewel Community who has been deceased some fifty years. The other iron is the brand of the Baskin family, having been handed down for several generations.

This would be 108 feet for Texas maximum speed of 60 miles per hour.

She also cited the necessity for keeping the eyes moving to assure oneself of taking in the wider and long view vs. the curb and the middle of the road view. Mrs. M. H. Fairbetter took a two-head topic, "Safety in the Home and Atomic Safety." She said, "Parents have a feeling of security, a safeness for their children when all are in for the night, and yet statistics show that the home is not a safe place; for 4 million persons are injured annually in the homes of the nation.

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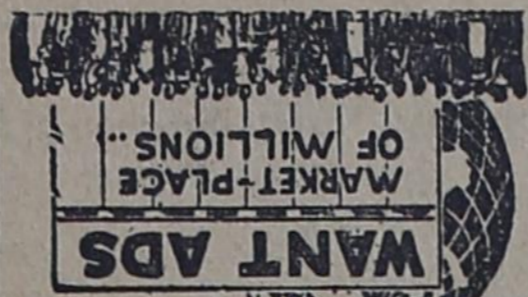

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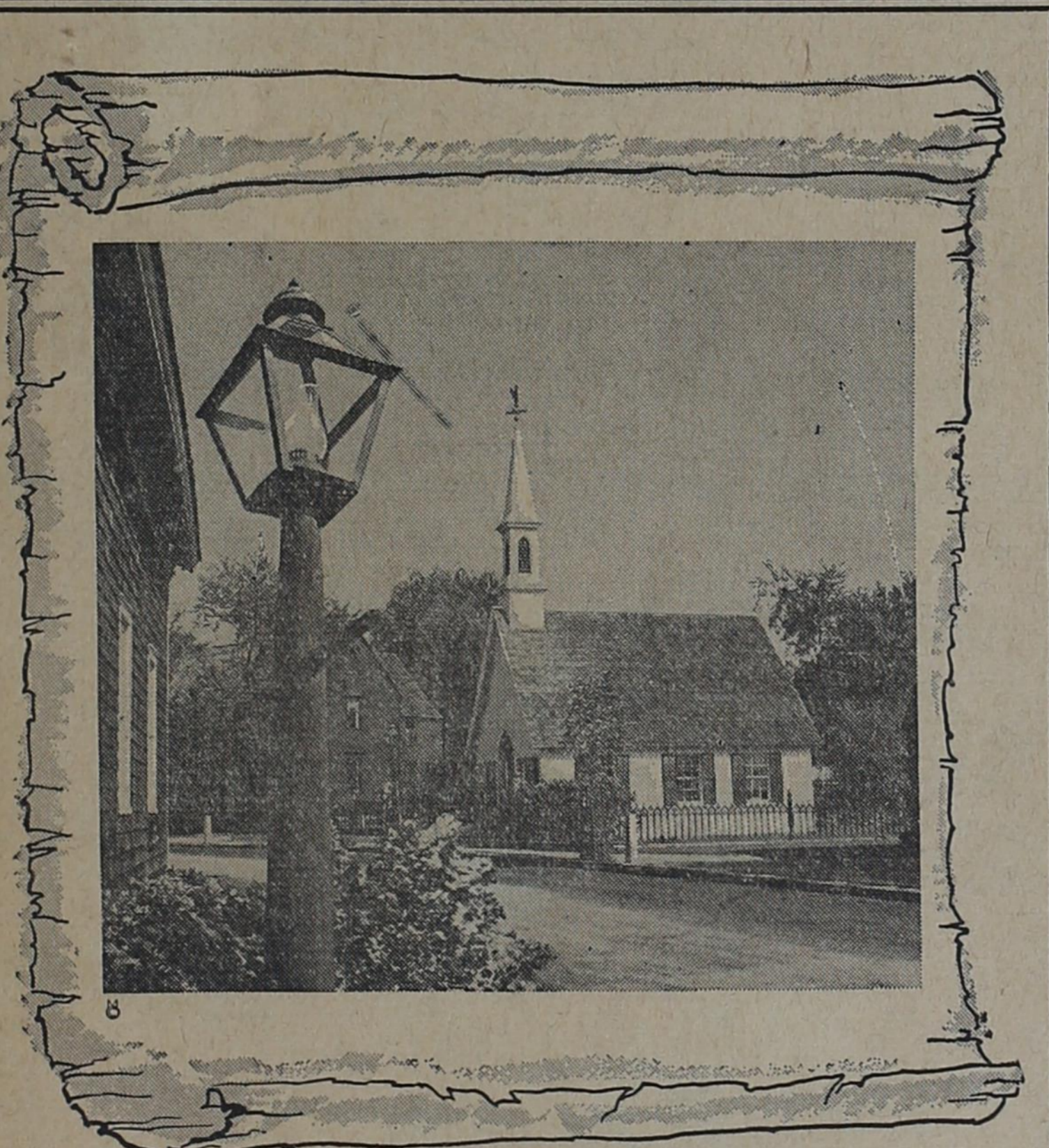
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The So And Sew Corner
