Mail orders are still being taken for tickets to rodeo performances Jan. 30 through Feb. 8. Two rodeos are held daily at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. with the exception of opening day, Jan. 30 when only the night show is scheduled. An extra performance will be held at 10 a.m.

Funeral services were held in the Higginbotham Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Mr. Mulliner of Cisco Presbyterian Church officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Robert Haynes, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Gorman.

Burial was in the Gorman Cemetery.

We didn't get any of that much needed moisture tho, so we will just keep on hoping but it had better come along soon or the winter cover crops will be too far gone to be revived.

I was in one of our grocery stores Wednesday morning and overheard one of the order clerks call to the butcher and ask if he had a soup bone. These cold days are really soup and chili weather. Also hot cakes and country sausage. Umm!

While on the subject of food, now would be a good time to get in the recipe.

CRUNCHY PEANUT BARS

If these peanut bars disappear in a hurry, mark this recipe down as another family favorite.
1 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/3 cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
2 eggs
1/4 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup skinless salted peanuts (chopped)

Grease a 9 1/2x13x2 inch baking pan. Preheat oven to 350. Sift together flour and baking powder. Cream shortening and brown sugar. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add half of sifted ingredients and mix well. Stir in milk and vanilla. Blend in remaining sifted ingredients. Fold in 2/3 cup chopped peanuts. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes. Cool. Spread with Confectioner's Frosting and top with remaining 1/3 cup of chopped peanuts. Cut into bar of desired size.

CONFECTIONER'S FROSTING

2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
3 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
Combine and mix until smooth.

This new 4-door hardtop sedan with its increased visibility area brings to three the number of models available in the middle-priced series of the new Chevrolets. The new model and other '59 Chevrolets will headline an "Open House" at dealerships nationally, Jan. 22-24.

DETROIT - - A new sport sedan is making its debut at Chevrolet dealerships.

The car is in the Bel Air series and was inspired by universal admiration for the distinctive 1959 "hardtop" styling introduced exclusively as an Impala sport sedan. The Bel Air model makes available the same sportive appearance at a more moderate price. To introduce the new-comer, Smith Bros. Chevrolet Co., with other retail dealers across the country plan to star the car in an "Open House, January 22-24. In addition, the event will offer retail customers a chance to view a more complete line of

new Chevrolets, which were not available during the announcement period due to production delays.

According to E. N. Cole, general manager of Chevrolet, the new model results from retail market soundings that indicated strong sales sentiment. Production has already started and dealers are being stocked.

The sport sedan, or "four-door hardtop" as it is more popularly known, is comparatively new in the postwar automotive field. Pattered after the two-door hardtop, in which side windows roll completely into body, the car

boasts superlative visibility and a light, airy appearance.

In the 1959 Chevrolet overall design, the sport sedan is especially attractive and two inches lower than other Bel Air models. The roof is flat and overhangs the compound curvature of the broad rear window. Features of the two other sedans in the Bel Air series are otherwise incorporated. Luxury interior appointments and upholstery color-keyed to exteriors are points in common. Body identifications include a full-length, stainless steel molding with a depressed Snowcrest White central area and the Bel Air name in script.

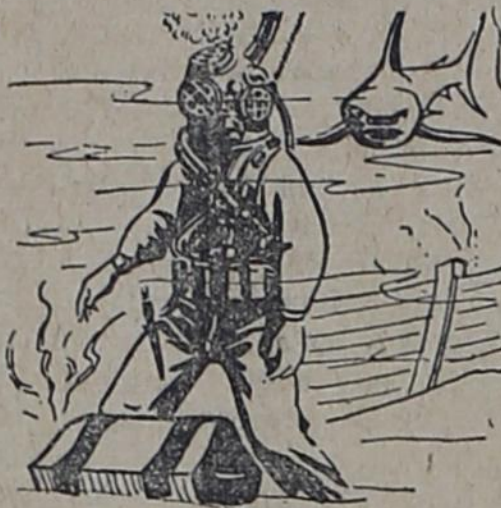

How Does He Do It Asks Post Writer

There are some who agree that Senate majority leader Lyndon Baines Johnson is in fact, if not theory, the country's most powerful man... because he loves to exercise power and President Eisenhower does not.

So reports Stewart Alsop in an article entitled "Lyndon Johnson: How Does He Do It?" in the current (January 24) issue of The Saturday Evening Post, in which the observation is made that the Texan has little chance of becoming President of the United States.

Alsop comments that it would be silly to suppose that a man in

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Johnson's position, with power and will to succeed, would not want to be president.

He says that while Johnson has repeatedly and vehemently denied that he is or ever will be a candidate, the vehemence may derive from the fact that Johnson is capable of considering his own situation with shrewd objectivity and is well aware of the way things stand.

"The Northern liberal-labor groups in the Democratic Party are strong enough to exercise veto power over the presidential selection," Alsop writes. "In any presently foreseeable circumstances, they will veto Johnson."

"In a way this is grossly unfair—but then, politics is the unfairest business in the world. Most knowledgeable observers would agree that Johnson is probably the ablest politician in the Democratic Party."

Alsop finds that Johnson has been true to his New Deal origins—within the limits imposed by his Texas origins.

But, he adds, those limits are such as to make a Northern liberal labor veto of a Johnson candidacy almost automatic. A Texas politician has no choice but to take positions—on the oil depletion allowance, for example—which fly in the face of Northern liberal doctrine.

Above all, Alsop's analysis continues, on the civil-rights issue there is a line which no Texas politician can safely cross and plenty of East Texans are reported to believe that Johnson has crossed it already.

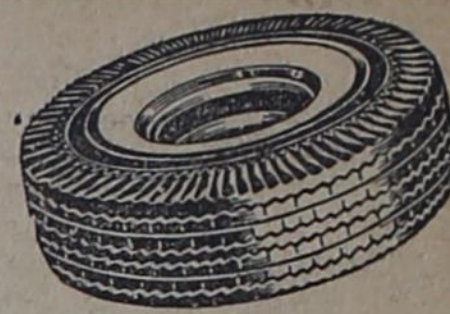
"In short," Alsop summarizes, "the accident of his Texas birth almost certainly bars Johnson from the White House."

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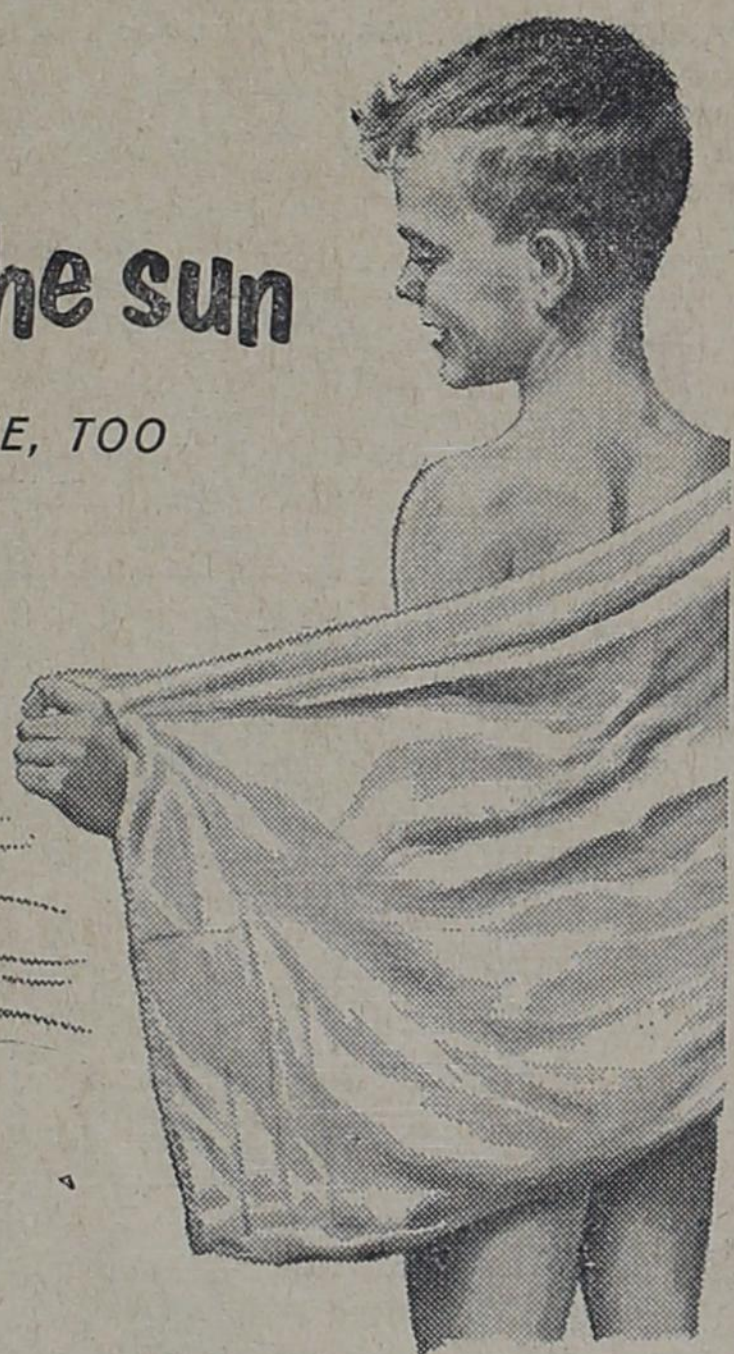
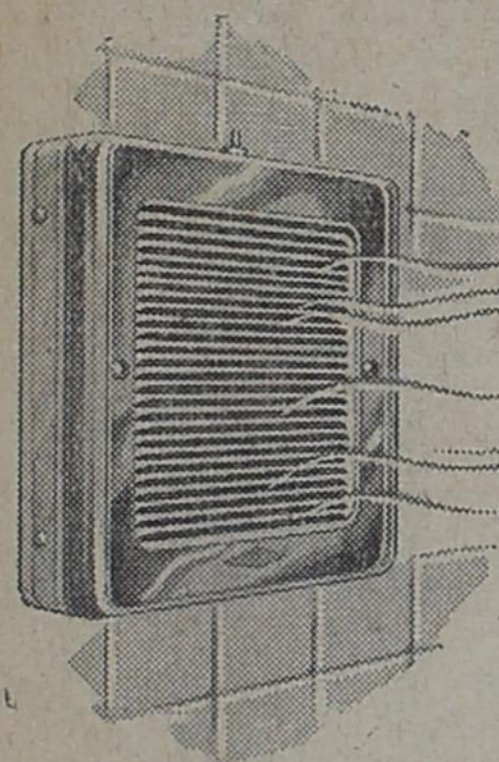
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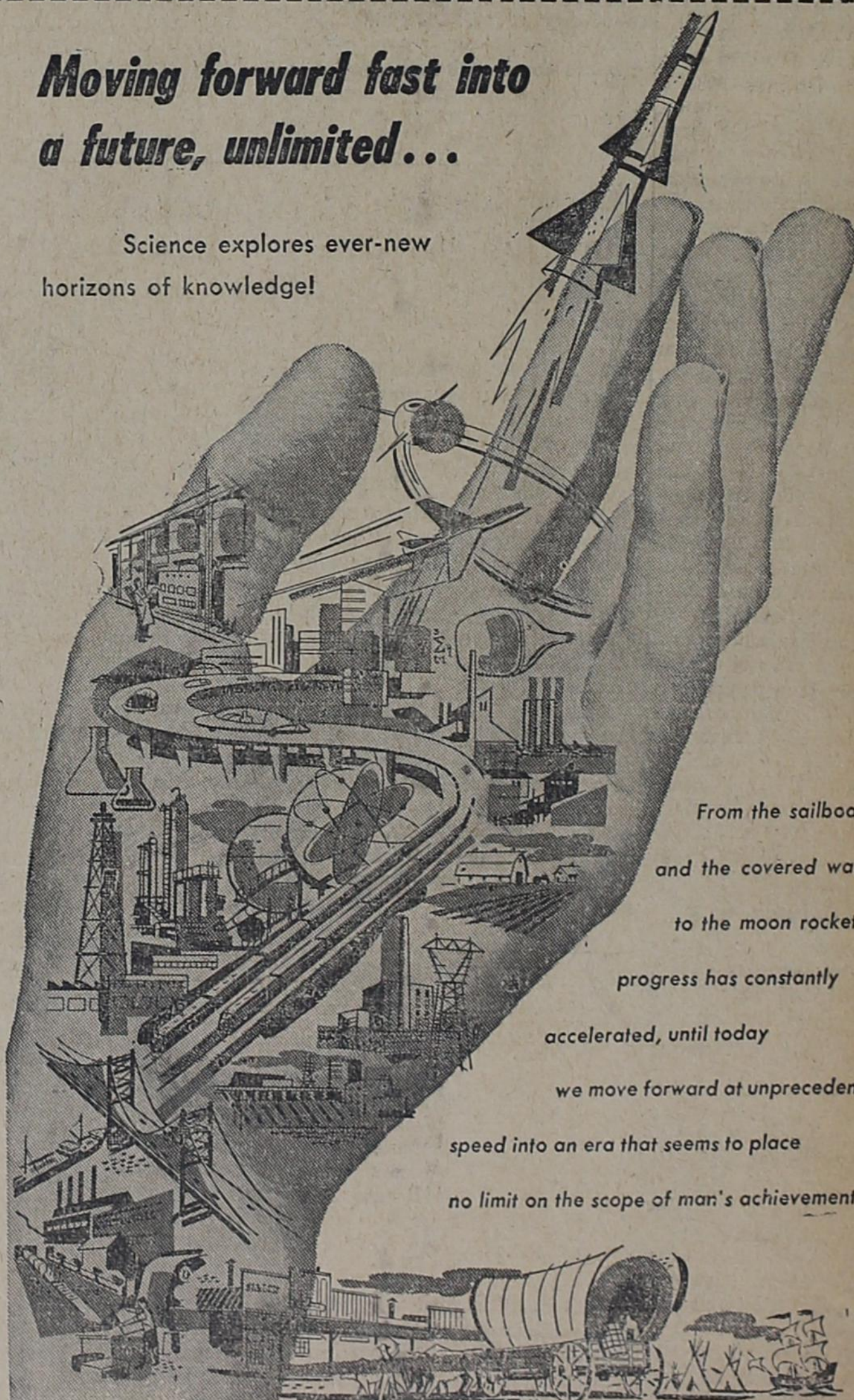
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ACC's 41st. Bible Lectureship Set

ABILENE - (Spl.) - The 41st version of the Abilene Christian College Bible Lectureship will unfold here the last week in February. It will bring together more members of the Churches of Christ than any other event according to past records. Crowds at the lectures have been counted as high as 10,000.

This year's theme, according to Lectureship Director J. D. Thomas, as a missionary one, "Unto All The World."
