Gorman Places Second In District Track Meet Thursday

The Rising Star Track squad won the District 32-B Track and Field meet held at Gorman on Thursday, April 16th. The Wildcats scored 67 1/2 points followed by Gorman with 49 points, Desdemona 18 1/2, Carbon 9, and Olden 3.

Jerry Anderson and Neil Overstreet of Gorman were the only double winners in the High School Division with Anderson winning the 100 yard dash and setting a new record of 23.3 in the 220 yard dash. Overstreet won the discus and shot, setting a new record in the shot with a toss of 42' 10 1/2". Other records were set in the pole vault by Jerry Yates of Gorman and in the broad jump, 440 yard dash, 440 yard relay, 880 yard dash, and mile relay. The 180 yard low hurdles record was tied in the meet.

Jerry was the 100 and 220 yard dashes at Glen Rose. He also came in second in the 100 and 220 at Bangs behind the State Champion, David Green, of Richland Springs. In the Clifton track meet he won third in the 100.

He won the 100 and 220 in the District 32-B Meet held here on Saturday and will run in the Regional Meet at Stephenville on Saturday.

"Open House" will be held at the San Antonio, Big Spring, Terrell, Wichita Falls, and Austin State Hospitals, and Kerrville State Home.

Farm Wage Proposals Arouse Farmers

WASHINGTON, D. C. - FARMERS ARE JUSTLY AROUSED at the proposal of the Secretary of Labor to give the Federal Government control over farm wages and working conditions.

ALTHOUGH THE ENTIRE HISTORY of Congressional action on farm employment makes it crystal clear that no authority over farm employment shall be exercised by the Federal Government, the Secretary of Labor, under pressure of the big unions in the North and East, wants to set a minimum wage now applicable only to businesses engaged in interstate commerce.

AS A MATTER OF FACT, not only has the Congress never given such authority, but has expressly denied the Executive Branch of Government any such power.

SEVERAL BILLS HAVE BEEN INTRODUCED in the Congress which would bring agricultural workers under the so-called Fair Labor Standards Act. These bills are not likely to be passed, or even receive favorable consideration in the present Congress, but in spite of this probability, the Department of Labor now attempts to control farm labor as it now protects industrial labor. It seeks to control the determination of wages to be paid farm labor, establish specifications for housing for farm workers, and order farmers to pay transportation of workers from distances far removed from the place of employment.

IN ADDITION TO THIS ACTION by the Department of Labor, a second proposal relates to the use of Mexican national farm workers, so vital to our seasonal agricultural economy. The Department would assume complete authority over all farm labor, a power which the Congress has never granted but has specifically denied.

A GROUP OF CONGRESSMEN FROM agricultural areas have had several meetings with Secretary of Labor Mitchell, and at the first meeting he agreed the order appeared contrary to the intent of the law. Shortly afterwards, however, new proposals with the same intent were made, which were even more rigid.

BEHIND THIS ACTION TO RULE BY DECREE is obviously an intent to destroy the Mexican National Labor Program, despite its enactment by Congress, and to use the instruments of Government to bring agricultural workers under union domination.

SHOULD THE LEGISLATION NOW PENDING bring agriculture under the Wage and Hour Law, it would be the straw which broke the camel's back. Even worse, although the results would be the same, would be to allow the Department of Labor, by arbitrary order, to do the same thing.

EVERY EFFORT WILL BE MADE to resist the action of the Labor Department and to defeat these proposals in the Congress. WE BELIEVE WE SHALL BE ABLE to do both, but from now on a constant alert against these attempts must be maintained.
