Control of the pecan scab, the pecan nut case bearer, the walnut caterpillar, characteristics of the two new pecan varieties, Choc-taw and Wichita and other topics will be discussed on the program at the annual Eastland County Pecan Field Day to be held at the Victor Hotel in Cisco next Friday, May 15th.

The morning session will begin at 10 o'clock in the dining room there at the hotel. The afternoon session will be held in the F. O. Hulburn orchard about 5 miles southeast of Cisco in the Leon River bottom. The afternoon session will consist of a survey of the eggs and larvae of the pecan nut case bearer, a spraying demonstration, a pecan grafting demonstration and a couple of power saw demonstrations.

Those attending the morning session will be guests of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce for lunch in the Victor Hotel. Miss Rebecca Graham, Eastland County Pecan Queen and who will be crowned Texas Pecan Queen at Fort Worth in July, will attend the lunch. You will want to meet and visit with her.

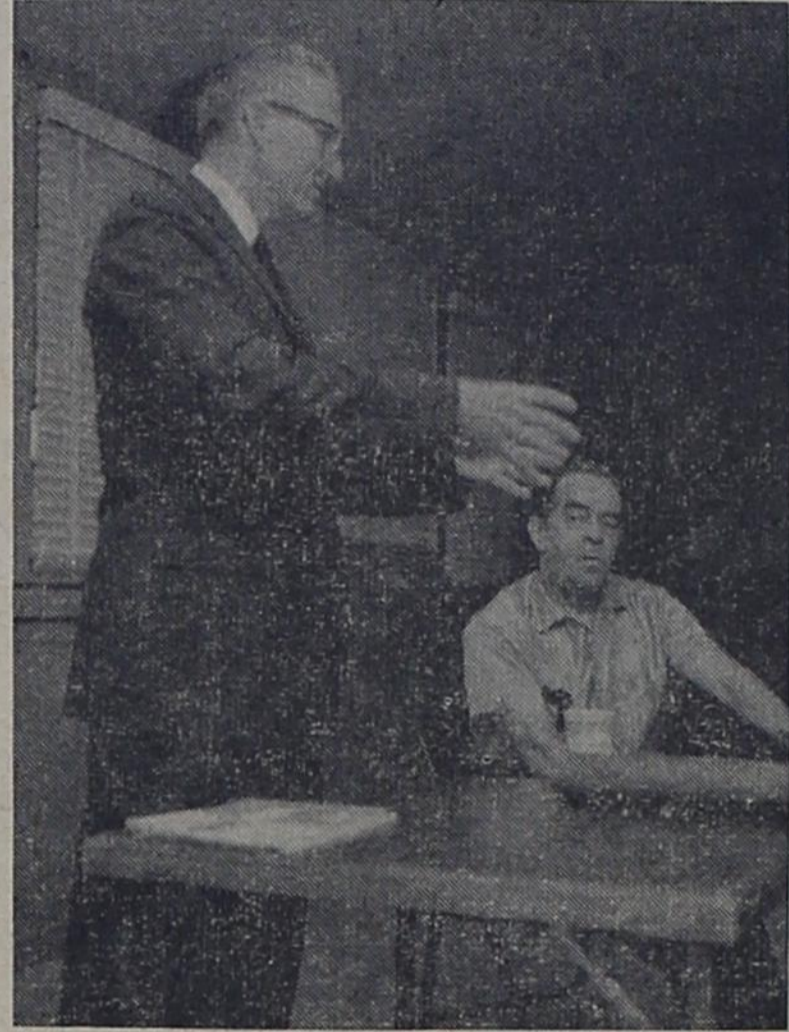
DINNER FOR MURRAY COX IN J. D. CALDWELL HOME

Less Specialization - More Basic Knowledge Needed By Students



Paul A. Cunyus, Dean of Tarleton State College, told the Businessmen of Gorman on Monday night a broader education and not so much specialization is needed by students today.

Under the new four-year term, TSC will emphasize a course in Liberal Arts which covers many phases in education and gives a student the ability to work in professions if his chosen profession happens to be overcrowded.

When parents wonder why so many students are unable to make passing grades in college it is usually due to the fact that the students have not been encouraged to concentrate on subjects that will give them a working knowledge of mathematics, science, history, language, etc.

Dean Cunyus spoke of the difference in the attitude toward teachers today and fifty years ago. In bygone days a professor was looked up to and respected. He was considered a person of importance in a community.

With the pressure of two wars and unlimited wealth flowing through the nation, America forgot that our educational program was what laid the foundation of our country. Dr. Cunyus asked the group if they knew that more money was spent on education in 1932 than is being spent now. Did we know that the average worker in the automobile industry made \$4900; a locomotive engineer around \$7200, while the average teacher receives \$3100 and works almost twice as long counting the extra hours put in with school activities, grading papers, etc.

Now, who would consider the most important - the teacher who molds the minds of your children or the men who build your automobiles or run your trains?

Bob Green, a personal friend of Dr. Cunyus, introduced him by saying, "Dr. Cunyus is a man who has dedicated his life to the education of American Youth."

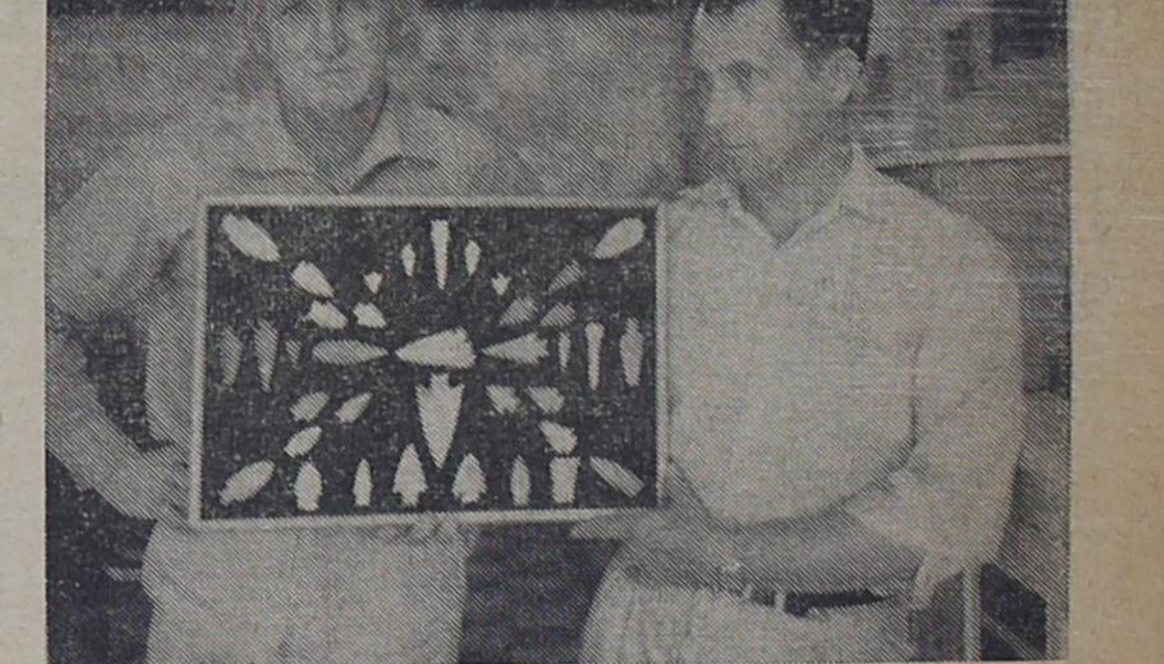

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. - A PROBLEM OF MOUNTING importance over the Nation is the position of older people on retirement or pensions. People are living longer, and usually better, but inflation is rapidly taking away the "better".

IT IS DIFFICULT FOR ANYONE past forty years of age to find new employment and many are encouraged to retire early. WHEN THE SOCIAL SECURITY SYSTEM was decided upon, old age pensions were primarily based on the cost of rent and food.

THERE WAS CONSIDERATION GIVEN to reducing the amount pensioners would receive if they owned their own homes. It was, therefore, an act which could be construed as a sort of relief measure.

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS HAS PASSED since the Act was first proposed, and for the most part it has worked very well. However, under a war economy from 1939 on, the requirements of retired individuals have doubled, tripled and quadrupled with the trend in the economy. The dollar of 1930 is worth only about one third in terms of foodstuffs, and one-half in terms of rent.

WHEN PENSIONS AND ANNUITIES were first worked out as to amounts, utilities such as gas and electricity were written off with the rent at about \$2 per month. No account was taken of telephone and transportation. These things today are considered necessities - not luxuries.

THE ELECTRIC REFRIGERATOR is an example. The iceman just doesn't come any more. The household cost of running an electric refrigerator costs more than was originally allowed for all utilities in arriving at a figure for pensions. Without an automobile and money to operate it, many American families would be trapped in their houses, apartments, or out in the suburbs of the cities and towns. There are places where public transportation is simply not available, and in many places operations are being retrenched.

THERE ARE ABOUT twelve million citizens receiving monthly pensions. The average amount is \$5.54 over the United States. The average for a couple, since last May, amounts to about \$108.

IT MAY BE SAID THAT PEOPLE should have saved enough to take care of these things. They say a home for retirement should have been purchased when young enough to work and accumulate.

THIS MAY BE WELL AND GOOD, and many have done so, but under this system they, in many cases, are penalized for having done this much.

SUB CLERK-CARRIER EXAM ANNOUNCED BY LOCAL P O

The Eighth U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced examinations for substitute clerk-carrier for employment in the Gorman Post Office. All competitors will be required to take a written examination designed to test aptitude for learning and performing the duties of these positions. The test subjects will be of the following types:

(1) general abilities, (2) following instructions, and (3) address checking. Sample questions are given on Form AN3574 which will be sent to applicants with their notices of admission to the written tests. About 2 3/4 hours will be required for this written examination. Those interested in taking this exam may obtain applications from the local post office.

A veteran will get five points added to the earned ratings of the applicant who makes a passing grade and a disabled veteran will get ten points added. Applicants must actually reside within the delivery of the Post Office or be bona fide patrons of such office. They must have reached their 18th birthday on the date of filing application. This age limit does not apply to persons entitled to veteran preference.

Application Card Form 5000-AB must be filed with the office of the Eighth U. S. Civil Service Region, 114 Commerce St., Dallas 2, Texas and will be accepted until further notice.

The card forms may be secured with the local post office or from the Regional Director, Eighth U. S. Civil Service Region, Room 103, 1114 Commerce St., Dallas 2, Texas.

The examination will be held at Brownwood, Texas. Applicants will be notified of the date it will take place.
