Gorman Bank To Handle FHA Loans

Interim Support Announced

Interim price support levels by types and areas for 1959-crop peanuts were announced today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. These levels are based on the minimum national average support of \$193.50 per ton announced in advance of planting time (press release USDA 615-59 issued March 4).

USDA officials explained that the announcement today will permit price support operations to be placed in effect promptly for the 1959 crop pending determination of the final support rates on the basis of the August parity price (to be released July 31) and the supply situation as affected by the 1959 estimated production shown by the August crop production report (to be released Aug. 11).

If the final support rates are higher than those announced today, any farmers who may have placed peanuts under loans at the announced interim levels will receive additional advances to reflect the higher levels.

The average support prices by type per ton of 1959 quota peanuts related to the \$193.50 per ton announcement are: Virginia type, \$205.30; Runner type, \$180.64; Southeastern Spanish type,

Assessment Bills Fail This Year

Proposed state legislation aimed at setting up plans of grower assessment for the purpose of financing research and promotion of peanuts has failed to become law this year.

The Oklahoma proposal failed by one vote to get the majority needed for House Passage. In a House vote on July 2, 59 representatives voted for the bill, 27 voted against it and 32 members did not vote. There are a total of 118 members in the House and 60 votes were needed for passage. The original version of the bill had previously been passed by the Senate and by the House Committee on Agriculture. The latter group placed a "do pass" tag on the measure recommending it for House passage.

The original Texas bill was ruled unconstitutional by the Attorney-General in April. A revised version was also found to be unconstitutional. However, the general feeling is now that a bill permitting the type program desired is possible under the Texas Constitution. Additional work toward drafting such a bill will be begun later this summer.

For Ladies Only

These hot summer days catch us with jaded appetites and more often than not, we fail to eat properly - - results - - no energy - no desire to do anything but sit near the air conditioner and wish the work was done - - and the work must go on.

The nutritionists demand one hot dish with the meal - - but few of us comply. However, at this season of the year the standard fare on most dinner tables is black-eyed peas, okra, corn-on-the-cob and hot cornbread. Iced tea, chilled cantaloupe and tomatoes fit the tastes for the cooling effects. Good eating, too, also very fattening, unless we do get busy and do all our work, using

the energy those foods produce. When the appetites yen for something that is tasty, filling, energy giving, try something different. Here are some suggestions to beat the heat, park up the appetite and hold down the weight, and no trouble to fix - - besides keeping the kitchen cooler with a one dish, top-of-the-stove meal.

CHICKEN MUSHROOM SIMMER

Chicken, topped with vegetables, the mushrooms on top, form this attractive 1-dish, top-of-the-stove meal.

Three tablespoons pure olive oil, 1 3-pound ready-to-cook broiler-fryer, cut up, 1 cup minced onions, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 1 8 1/2-ounce can small white onions and liquid, 3 carrots, cut in penny slices, 1/2 cup water, 1 4-ounce can sliced mushrooms, undrained.

Heat oil in Dutch oven. Brown pieces of chicken; set aside. Brown onions in Dutch oven. Return chicken and rest of ingredients in order given so that mushrooms sit on top. Cover and cook gently 20 minutes or until chicken and vegetables are done. Makes four servings. Mushrooms optional.

MAKE SALAD RING OF BRIGHT FRUITS

Unmold a salad ring of bright fruits in shimmering lemon or pineapple-flavored gelatin to decorate your dinner table. When gelatin is partially set, fold in canned pineapple, avocado cubes, halved strawberries and orange slices. Fill ring mold and chill until set. Decorate with sprigs of mint and puffs of whipped cream cheese.

Other good health rules are to drink plenty of water and add more salt to the diet. How about sneaking in a piece of cake now and then.

Following is one of Reddy's Favorite Recipes (Texas Electric Service Co.):

APPLE JUICE CAKE

3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
1 cup apple juice
1 cup chopped pecans
Line two 9 inch square cake pans with waxed paper. Sift flour with baking powder, soda, salt and nutmeg. Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually. Beat until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs one at a time. Add sifted dry ingredients and apple juice alternately to creamed mixture. Add nuts. Pour into cake pans. Bake in a pre-heated 375 degree oven for 30 minutes. Cool. Spread filling between layers. Spread frosting on top and sides of cake.

APPLE JUICE FILLING

1/2 cup sugar; 1/4 cup cornstarch; 1/3 teaspoon salt; 1 cup apple juice; 1 egg yolk; 2 tablespoons butter; 1 tsp. grated lemon rind; 1 teaspoon lemon juice.
Combine sugar, cornstarch, salt and apple juice. Cook until thick. Stir constantly. Beat egg yolk; gradually add apple juice mixture. Return to heat until heated through. Spread between layers of cooled cake.

APPLE JUICE FROSTING

2 tablespoons butter; 1 egg white; 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind; 2 tablespoons apple juice; 2 1/2 cups confectioner sugar.

Cream butter, add remaining ingredients and beat until fluffy. Spread on top and sides of cooled cake.
