

## Activities Set For Homecoming Saturday

### Panthers Battle Jim Ned Indians To 26-26 Tie

The Gorman Panthers and the Jim Ned Indians played to a 26 to 26 deadlock in one of the most exciting games that has been played in several years.

The boys in Red and Blue meant business from the time the whistle blew for the kick off. Gorman won the toss and elected to receive and Neil Overstreet received a hand off from Ronnie Page and went 97 yards for the Panthers first touchdown. Jim Ned came back with a 63 yard drive and Larry Aldridge climaxed the drive with a 6 yard run off tackle and Ken Windham ran for the extra points to take a 8 to 6 lead.

The Indians kicked off to Gorman and the ball was covered over the goal line by Aldridge to give them a 14 to six lead in the first quarter. Jim Ned's next touchdown came on a pass from Quarterback Roland Smith to End Little for 11 yards.

The Panthers came back with a drive of 55 yards with Overstreet scoring on a 15 yard run up the middle. The Jim Ned Indians lead 26 to 12 at the half.

Coach Byrd must have fed the Panthers some raw meat during the half because they came roaring back the last half and completely dominated the game the rest of the way.

John Brinegar climaxed a 52 yard drive by going 2 yards and Ken Welch, who had come off the bench to sparkle the Red and Blue, passed to Overstreet for the extra points and the last touchdown that tied the score saw Fullback Brinegar displaying some of the hardest running this year drive six yards to climax another 67 yard drive. liked about one foot making the extra points which ended all the scoring and the Panthers had scored 14 points in the last half and had not allowed the Indians to get passed the 30 yard line.

This game was considered a moral victory since Jim Ned had become the favorite to win the district. This certainly was a team victory because the entire squad played outstanding ball.

The Panthers displayed some of the hardest tackling and blocking that has been shown in two years. And if the Red and Blue continue to play like they did the last half Friday night they stand a good chance of going all the way.

The entire forward wall of the Panthers, Reeves, Whitlock, Puckett, Shell, Townley, Rodgers, Shugart, Anderson, Blackshear, Craig, and Joiner, played outstanding football on defense and offense. The backfield showed some of the hardest running and the best passing and blocking they have shown all year. Fullback Brinegar, Overstreet, Harrison, Welch, Page, Simpson, Snider did outstanding service.

Gorman racked up 15 first downs to Jim Ned's 5. Both teams had three penetrations but the Panthers did have more first downs. However, the officials failed to keep a record of this and in the event Gorman and Jim Ned each won the rest of their games a flip of the coin would determine who would represent the district in the play off.

### Final Rites For Mrs. T. L. Gates Held Monday

On Saturday, October 17th, Mrs. T. L. Gates passed away in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Homer B. Brelsford, on the Circle B Ranch near Bullard, Texas. She was born December 25, 1866, making her 92 years, 9 months and 12 days old. Her birthplace was Pleasant Ridge, Miss.

Around the turn of the century Mr. and Mrs. Gates moved to Gorman from De Leon where he had taught school and established a lumber yard and later added a mercantile business.

The couple was faithful workers in the Methodist Church and active in the affairs of the community. They were interested in and was very helpful to the young people.

Mr. Gates passed away in 1916 and she lived in Gorman until about 1946.

Funeral services were held in Gorman at the First Methodist Church on Monday, October 19, 1959 at 2 p. m. with Bro. John Dowd officiating.

Survivors are one son, Tom S. Gates of Post; four daughters, Mrs. Homer B. Brelsford, Bullard, Mrs. Grundy L. Shapard, Wichita Falls, Mrs. G. W. Griswold, Roswell, N. M., and Mrs. Ruth Holland, El Paso; one brother, Frank Stewart, Tulsa, Okla., six grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

Burial was in the De Leon Cemetery.

#### FRUITED BEEF ROAST

3 to 4 lbs. beef pot roast (either round or blade bone)  
Flour, salt, pepper and shortening  
1 lb. dried mixed fruit  
2 cups hot water  
Grated rind of 2 lemons

Dredge pot roast in seasoned flour. Soak dried fruit in hot water 1 hour. Brown meat in shortening in heavy skillet. Drain water from fruit and add it with grated lemon rind to meat. Cover and simmer slowly 2 1/2 hours or until meat is tender. Remove meat from pan. Skin fat from gravy. Stir in fruit. Serve pot roast hot with fruited gravy.

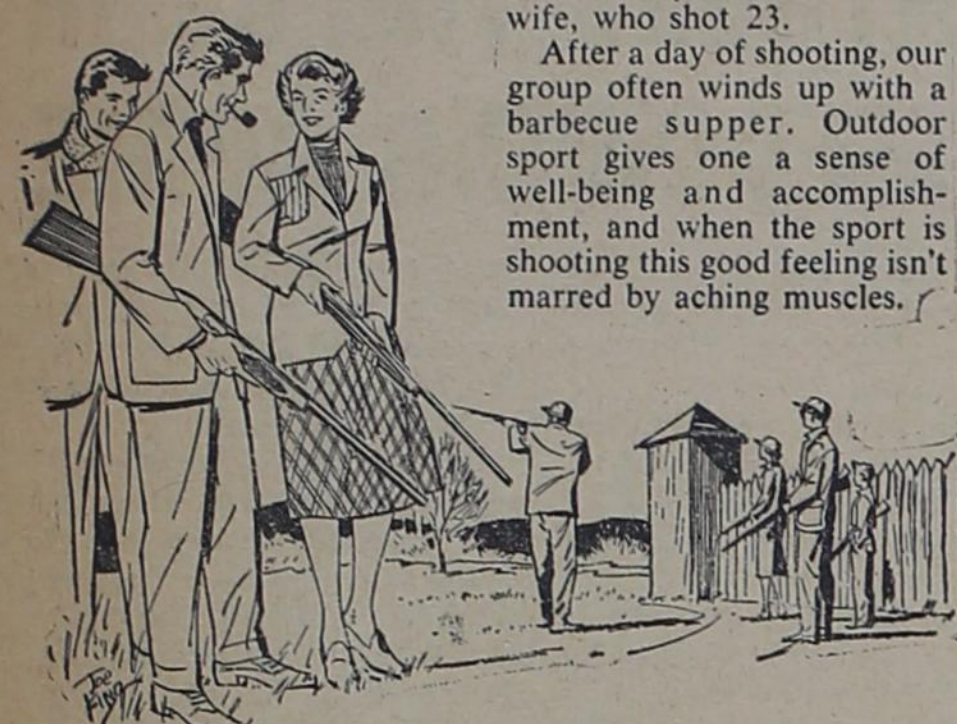
### Shooting Offers Action, Companionship FOR ALL
