Judge Scott Bailey Makes Statement Of Candidacy

Scott Bailey, a lifetime resident of Eastland County, was born and reared in Cisco. He is married to the former Mary Nicholas of Carbon. They are the parents of two children, John Melvin, age 2½ and Melissa, age 1. Judge Bailey's mother is the former Maud Arnold, who attended the Hankins Normal College in Gorman. The Baileys are well known in the Gorman area.

Bailey is a graduate of the Public Schools of Cisco, Cisco Jr. College and holds a BS degree from North Texas State University in Denton. After returning from the Korean War, he attended the University of Texas Law School for one year. Judge Bailey is a Veteran of overseas action in Korea, where he served with the famed "Fighting Buffalo" Regiment of the 7th Infantry Division.

He worked his way through school as a farm and ranch hand and as a laborer in the oil fields. Bailey was serving as a high school teacher when he decided to make his first race in politics. He ran for and was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in Austin, where he served during the regular 57th session and three special sessions. Much of his work in the Legislature concerned Education and Youth as well as Soil and Water Conservation, along with needed improvements to our Farm-to-Market Road System.

During the 57th session, he was able to block legislation which would have moved the historic 11th Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland to Abilene. Bailey's work for and support of War Veterans and Senior Citizens has won him lasting recognition with these groups.

In this statement concerning his candidacy, Bailey said: "I do not intend to make a lot of promises or commitments that would be impractical or impossible to fulfill. If the good people of Eastland County re-elect me as their County Judge, I will continue to attend to the duties of this important office with dignity and decorum, remembering always, that a public office is a public trust. You may be assured that I will continue to render fair and impartial decisions on all matters which may come before me. I pledge my continued cooperation with all county, city, state and national officials for the betterment of Eastland County; continued work for and support of programs which benefit our Senior Citizens and Young People of our county; support and sponsorship of the Sabanna Watershed Movement as well as other efforts to save our soil and water from being wasted. We will continue to make every effort to continue this Program of Progress and Good Business Management of County Finances."

In closing, Judge Bailey said, "I am making this campaign as a democrat and as one who believes in the principles of democratic government based on the Constitution of our great State and Nation. YOUR VOTE AND ACTIVE SUPPORT ON MAY 2 WILL ALWAYS BE REMEMBERED BY ME AND MY FAMILY."

Dick Foster Issues Statement

To the people of Gorman, Desdemona, Carbon and surrounding community:

I would like to take this opportunity to thank each of you for your patience and cooperation the past three years in which I have served as your County Commissioner. I have done all that I could do with the money that I received. The machinery is old and it takes a lot of the money to keep it repaired.

I will try to explain how much money we get to operate on. As most of you know, the tax evaluation on your land is \$450 an acre on pasture land and \$900 an acre on cultivated land. The rate is 80c on the hundred. The Commissioners Court set the value of the land at 25 percent of the actual value. This means \$8.00 a thousand. Each precinct gets 3 percent of this for road maintenance which is about 24c on each \$8.00 you pay in taxes (not much is it?) However, we receive about \$32,000 a year of car tag money, which makes a total of about \$40,000 a year. The payroll for this precinct is about \$25,000 a year. That only leaves about \$15,000 a year for the upkeep on the machinery, gravel and fuel.

I also have to pay a portion of my allotted money on the indebtedness the precinct was already in when I took office. At that time the indebtedness was \$19,510.93. A treasurer's report of the present finances is published elsewhere in this week's issue of the Progress, for your approval of how I have managed the finances the past three years.

If this meets with your approval, I would appreciate your vote May 2nd for a second term as County Commissioner.

A Hymn Is Born

The Sweet By and By

A hymn is born of a casual remark

Like many another temperamental artist, Composer Joseph Webster had his off days. So when he sauntered into the office of Dr. Sanford Bennett, where he usually hung his hat and violin, the doctor knew the musician was in the dumps.

"What's the trouble now?" Bennett asked Webster, who had his back to the physician and the stove.

"Oh, nothing," came the dejected reply. "Everything will be all right by and by."

The doctor turned back to his desk where he wrote prescriptions as a profession and verse as a hobby. "By and by," he mused, "the sweet by and by." He paused, looked up at Webster, then reached for writing paper.

Joseph Philbrick Webster was an out and out musician. In the East, where he was born in 1819, he had been an active member of the Handel and Haydn Society and a prolific composer of popular songs. In his early thirties he migrated to Indiana, and in 1857 settled in Elkhorn, Wis. When the verse writing physician, Sanford Fillmore Bennett, moved to the same town in 1861, the two struck up a partnership in the production of sheet music. After six years Bennett had learned Webster like a song book. He had soon learned that the best prescription for his partner's spells of melancholia was a batch of verses to be set to music. But on that Autumn day in 1867 the doctor had no remedy in stock. But Webster's casual remark had given him a theme . . . not for another of their popular songs, but for a church hymn.

While the physician wrote hastily at his desk two townsmen joined Webster at the stove. In a few minutes Bennett handed Webster three verses and a chorus. In less time than it had taken the doctor to write the words, the composer had the music. He gave the melody a few rounds on his violin and the four men sang for the first time:

There's a land that is fairer than day,
And by faith we can see it afar;
For the Father waits over the way,
To prepare us a dwelling place there.

We shall sing on that beautiful shore
The melodious songs of the blest,
And our spirits shall sorrow no more,
Not a sigh for the blessing of rest.

Break Thou the Bread of Life

An artist takes time out to write two hymns

Mary Artimisia Lathbury was 30 years old. She had spent most of those years writing verse and illustrating stories for children. But in the Summer of 1880 on the bank of a lake in Southwestern New York state and read a book that has been published more than any other volume between covers. The story she read from the Bible was about Christ feeding the five thousand.

Because her father and two brothers were Methodist preachers, Mary Lathbury felt so close to that denomination that when she was 32 she put aside her pen and brush and took a job as assistant to the Methodist Sunday School Union's executive secretary, Bishop John H. Vincent. A year later, in 1874, Vincent founded the famous Chautauqua movement. By 1880 Chautauqua had grown to such proportions that the bishop opined they needed a Vesper hymn just for Chautauqua

meetings. So Asst. Mary Lathbury brushed up on her verse-writing and came up with "Day Is Dying in the West; Heaven is Touching Earth with Rest . . ." She wrote only two verses, but the hymn became so popular that she had to write two more stanzas and a chorus. It became so popular, in fact, that it wasn't long until "Day is Dying in the West" was called "one of the finest hymns of modern times" and published in nearly every hymnal in America.

Mary Lathbury became known as "The Lyrist of Chautauqua" and when the organization's Literary and Scientific Circle was inaugurated the lyrist was called on to write a "Study Song" just for members to sing at their gatherings all over the country. Sitting by the lake that gave the movement its name, Mary Lathbury got the theme for her other hymn as she read about Christ feeding the multitudes by the Sea of Galilee and she wrote . . .

What is causing my peach leaves to become red and swollen? This is a question that is being asked by many people this week.

This disease, like many other plant diseases, must be prevented before the symptoms occur.

Peach leaf curl is a fungal disease which attacks the young developing leaves as they emerge from the bud scales. As a result of this infection growth hormones are produced, which induce the leaf to become puckered and distorted.

Ferbam is a fungicide that can be applied in the winter or spring at the pink bud stage for the prevention of this disease. It must be applied prior to the leaves emerging from the buds. Ferbma should be used at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 pounds per 100 gallons of water or 1 1/2 to 2 tablespoons per gallon. If your trees have this disease, make a note to use this fungicide next spring.

Those who used it this year report good control.

If you did not spray for peach leaf curl this year, you could pull off the infected leaves and burn them so that the rate of overwintering inoculum will be reduced.

In most cases only the first leaves are infected and the disease normally does not do any measurable economic damage.

Several meetings are being held in Eastland and surrounding counties to urge farmers to grow Guar. The use of guar products is expanding rapidly and buyers want to get farmers in this area to produce this crop.

This crop grows well on the same type of soils that are good for peanut production. A farmer could expect to make a net income of \$20 to \$40 per acre.

(An Editorial)

On pondering the State Representative's race in this district, one can't help but remember incidents which affect a decision in this contest.

Pitted for the office are incumbent Burke Musgrove and Former Businessman Joe Hanna, both of Breckenridge.

In one way or another, most of the incidents have been explained by Musgrove, but still, there's those remembrances that they did happen, and one wonders if they were all "just coincidences."

For instance, you recall:
• The "Ernie's Chicken Shack" affray, in which a high school youth was injured while in the company of the Incumbent

• The Fund Solicitation Letter to Austin Lobbyists, signed by Burke.

• The Interscholastic League fiasco which called down the wrath of noted educators across the state, when Burke proposed drastic changes.

• The fumbling of the bill which would, had it passed, moved the 11th Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland. In an earlier episode of the same maneuver, a delegation of Eastland Countians had to go to Austin to help block the bill. Representatives are sent to take care of such things, not make arrangements for local delegations to do the job, we hold.

• The voting of an absentee legislator—"Solon Voted 11 Times by Fellows" the Houston Post said in an article dated March 28, 1969: "Other members of the House of Representatives cast votes for state Rep. Burke Musgrove on the voting machine Thursday while the young Breckenridge legislator was said to be out of town."

Then, too, there's the law suits on notes and the Gorman Hospital District confusion.

These and others may all be incidents, explained, unexplainable, relevant or insignificant. Individually, either might be excusable, but taken as a whole, the picture brings puzzlement and prompts one to think of an alternate.
