EASY-TO-MAKE PEANUT BUTTER ICE CREAM PIE RECOMMENDED

Preparation of "Peanut Butter Ice Cream" pie is easy. Glancing at the recipe, you'll note the filling calls for a quart of vanilla ice cream, one-half cup of chunk-style peanut butter and a few salted peanuts for garnish . . . That's all.

The filling is placed in a baked nine-inch pie shell . . . the pie placed in the freezer and allowed to set until firm.

Allow the pie to set at room temperature between 15 and 20 minutes before serving. Then simply slice, slip the wedges onto frothy plates and dessert is ready.

PEANUT BUTTER ICE CREAM PIE

- 1 9-inch pie shell
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream
- 1/2 cup chunk-style peanut butter
- 1/3 cup (approximately) salted peanuts for garnish

Allow ice cream to soften slightly. Mix peanut butter until soft and creamy. Add softened ice cream gradually until peanut

SINGLE PIE CRUST

- 1 cup sifted enriched flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 4 to 6 tablespoons lard
 - 2 to 4 tablespoons cold water
- Mix flour and salt. Cut lard into flour until crumbs are about the size of small peas. Add cold water, a little at a time, mixing quickly and evenly through flour with a fork until dough just holds in a ball. Use as little water as possible. Roll to about 1/8 inch thickness. Line a nine-inch pie pan. Prick bottom of shell with a fork. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees Fahrenheit) 8 to 10 min.

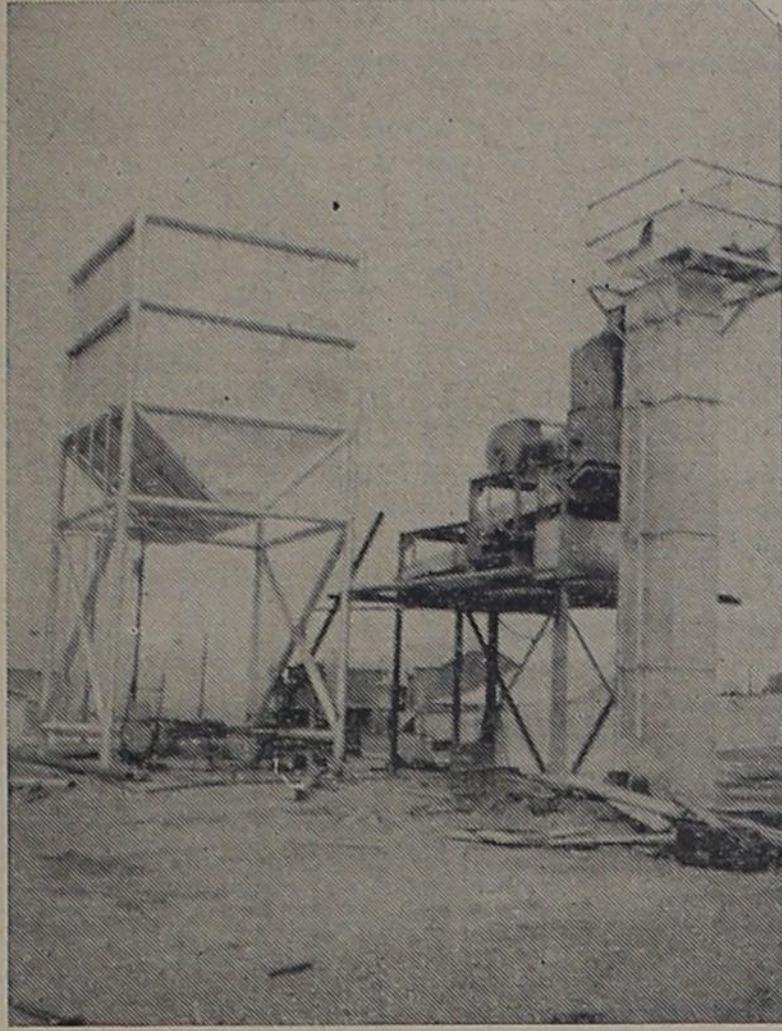

The clean peanuts are then loaded into a truck and weighed prior to selling. Your grade and weight are determined on clean peanuts.

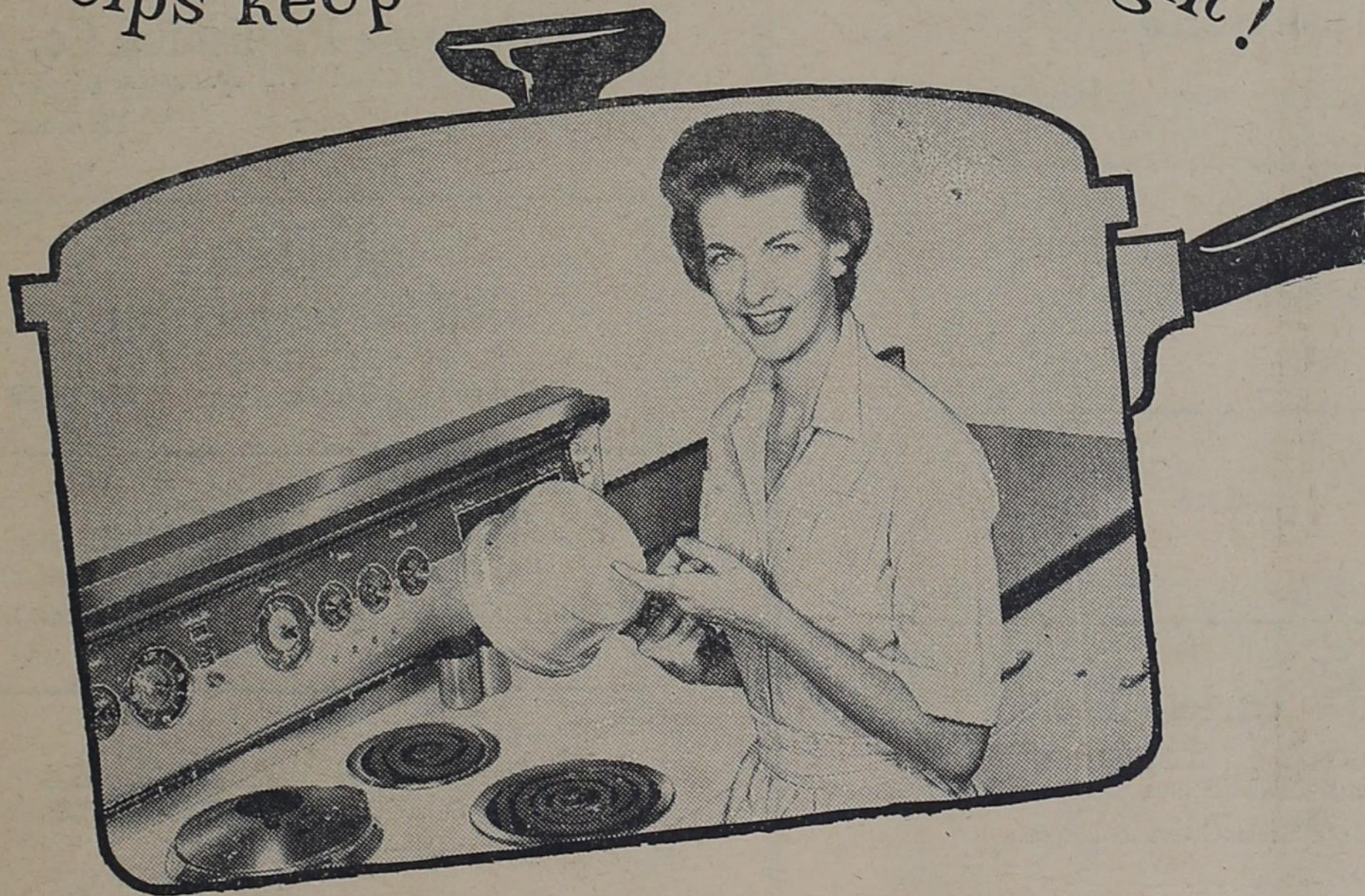

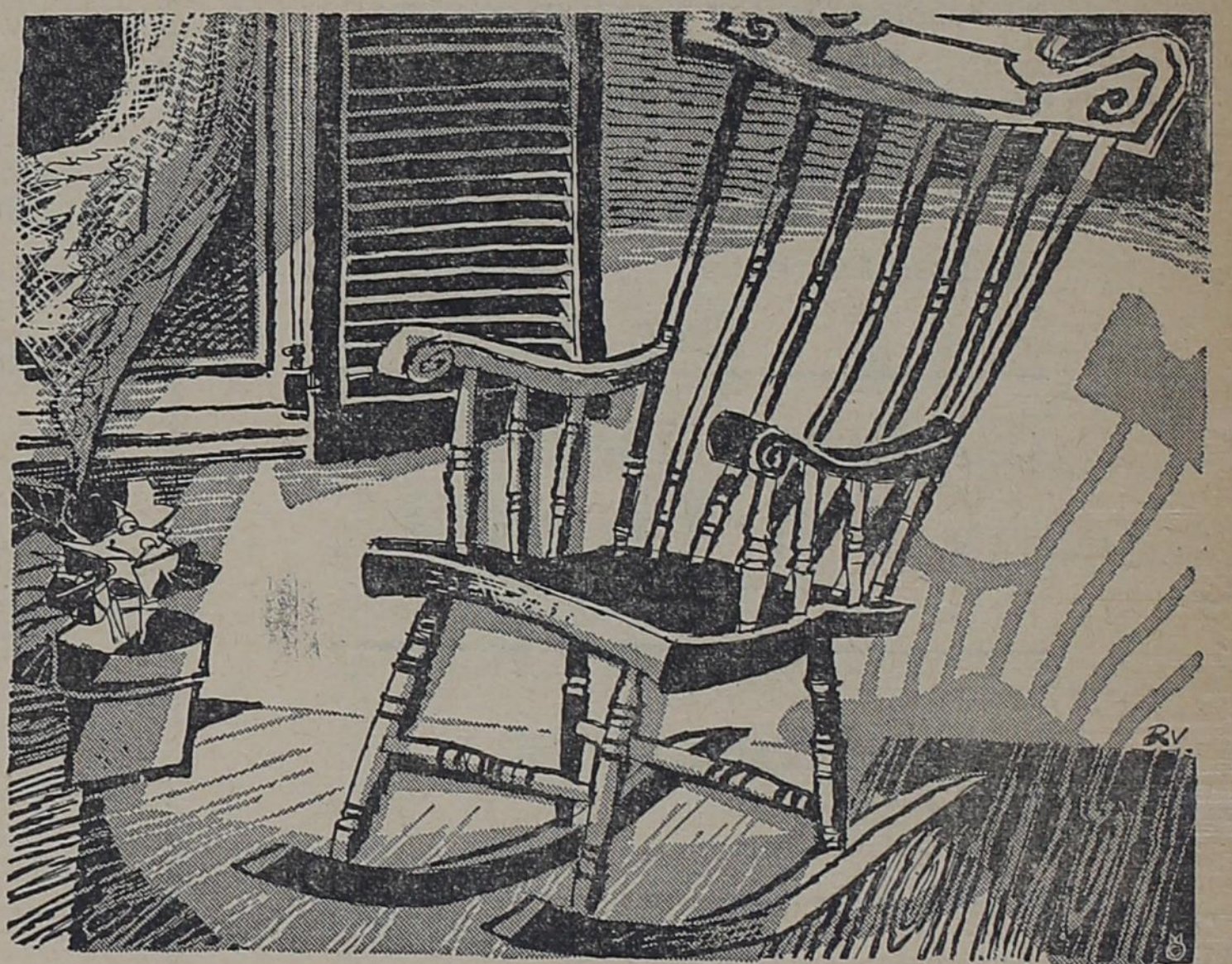

IT'S EASY TO CHECK YOUR OWN SOCIAL SECURITY RECORDS

While the Social Security Administration has the responsibility for maintaining approximately 126 million earnings records, Mr. Weatherly, Field Rep. of the Abilene district office, pointed out today that it is the responsibility of each individual social security card holder to check his record periodically to make sure it is correct.

Mr. Weatherly also stated that everyone should check his social security record at least once every three or four years. In most instances the Social Security records become final and not open to adjustment after three years, three months and fifteen days from the end of the taxable year for which the earnings were reported. There is another point to be considered too - the sooner an error is found, the easier it can be corrected. This applies to everyone whether he is working in his own business or for someone else as an employee.

Mr. Weatherly says that the manner of checking a particular record is simple. Just ask your social security office for postcard form 7004, fill in the blanks and drop it in a mail box. The form is a self-addressed postcard. In about two weeks you will receive a statement showing the total earnings credited to your social security account. It will also show a yearly breakdown of your credited earnings for each of the past three full calendar years. If, after receiving this statement, an error is noticed, get in touch with your social security representative. He will be glad to help correct your account.

Mr. Weatherly stresses the fact that your social security benefits will depend on this record of your earnings. Social security is a valuable insurance for you and your family, so don't delay. Get form 7004 from your local social security office today, or from Mr. Weatherly when he is next in your town, and check your social security record.

He will be in Gorman on Oct. 19th. at the City Office.

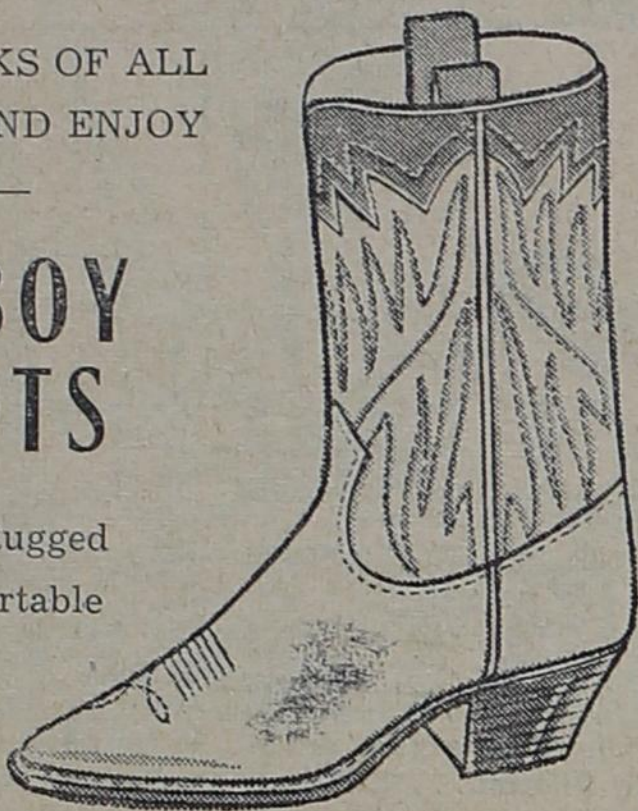
