New Crop To Be Tested For Eastland County Farms

Kenaf (accent on the f) is a name many of us are not familiar with. But we are going to learn a lot about it soon, if this new ag group does well here.

A native of India, kenaf is an annual fiber plant used to make paper for newsprint and other products. It is related to cotton and okra, and apparently needs the same type of soils and climate as these crops.

There is a good market now for kenaf fiber as well as the seed, so hopefully this crop can be used to replace some of the peanut production being moved out of Eastland County.

Davy Vestal, County Agent Ag, has some plots secured for kenaf testing. One is four miles south of Cisco on the Herman Glueck farm, one is at the Darryl Medford farm in the Okra Community and the other at the Jamie Snider farm near Gorman.

The test plots will be planted soon. Kenaf will be treated as a non-irrigated crop at all these plots.

Scientists in the United States have known about this crop since the 50's and 60's, and some testing has already been done in the south.

The kenaf plant produces two main fibers, called the bast and the core. Bast fibers are found in the bark, and are arranged so they can be as long as the tall, woody plant. Core fiber is considerably shorter than bast.

Practices and growing conditions that favor cotton will also result in maximum yields on kenaf. It is somewhat tolerant of cool soils but does better when seeded in warm moist soils.

Kenaf grows on nearly any type of land with good drainage, but yields best on light soils. It will not tolerate standing water, so extra tillage may be required on heavy clay soils.

Kenaf grows rapidly, and laps the rows in 5-6 weeks. Early season weed control is essential, for the yield can be reduced as much as 85 percent by cocklebur and Johnson grass.

Cocklebur is also troublesome if it ends up in the processing of the fibers. The bur will wrap in the bast fiber and can't be separated.

Yields of kenaf range from 4-8 tons per acre, but harvesting sometimes made difficult by rainy weather in the fall. Sometimes the material is packed in cotton modules and covered until it can be carried to market.

Kenaf seed that has been stored for more than a season is notorious for low germination, so there is an annual market for good fresh seed.

And how much market is there for fibers for newsprint? Enough to cause firms like Kenaf Industries LTD. make plans to break ground on a \$150 million newsprint mill in Willacy County (south Texas) this spring.

Dr. Charles Taylor, Chief Operating Officers says that Willacy County farmers will grow 13,000 acres of kenaf this year, and the processing plant should begin production by June 2000.

The newsprint mill will operate 24 hours per day, seven days a week producing 350 tons of paper a day. Taylor estimates that the mill will need 100 to 120 paper workers, and another 100 to 120 seasonal ag workers.

Kenaf Industries covers the cost of seed, harvesting and hauling, and farmers are paid at intervals during the growing season, according to reports.

In addition the newsprint, the mill will produce fibers needed to replace fiberglass in molded automobile trim parts and natural core powder for cleaning up industrial waste spills.

Davy Vestal is hopeful that something good will come for Eastland County from the kenaf testing here. Others are also very interested. Vestal says that the Eastland Economic Development Board and the Economic Development Boards from Cisco and Ranger will all be investors in the research. The Gorman and Rising Star Development Boards have expressed interest and will be meeting later to discuss the matter.

There are still people in Eastland County who remember the transition from cotton to peanuts. Now everyone is hoping for a new "savior" for agriculture around here - something that will produce well and doesn't have to depend on a falling world market.

For two years Davy Vestal has been testing alfalfa, trying to find a variety that will make a good producer for Eastland County. Several of his plots have done well, and more alfalfa will probably be raised here in the future.

The first alfalfa cuttings in Eastland County was done last week. But kenaf takes less water than alfalfa, so that makes this new crop look even more interesting.

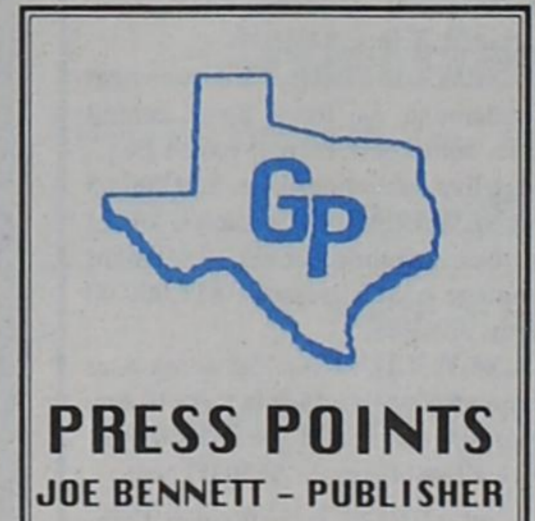

National Agricultural Summit April 27th

A national agricultural summit will be held April 27 in St. Louis, Mo., to bring together the leadership of more than 20 of the nation's farm and commodity organizations to find common ground to address the farm crisis.

Wes Sims of Sweetwater, president of Texas Farmers Union and member of the National Farmers Union Executive Board of Directors, will participate in the national ag summit.

"In this time of great uncertainty in rural America, it is absolutely critical that farm organizations work to speak with a common voice on behalf of the nation's farmers and ranchers," said Sims. "We will gather in St. Louis in hopes of finding areas of agreement that we can take to Congress and the administration to resolve the crisis our farmers and ranchers now face."

The goal of the summit is to develop common principles of agreement in the areas of the farm safety net, risk management, concentration and trade. The summit was initially announced during National Farmers Union's annual convention in March. It will take place at the Adams Mark Hotel in downtown St. Louis.

The following 23 organizations are scheduled to attend: Alabama Farmers Federation; American Agriculture Movement; American Corn Growers Association; American Farm Bureau Association; American Sheep Industry Association; American Soybean Association; American Sugarbeet Growers Association; Burley and Dark Leaf Tobacco Growers Association; Burley Tobacco Growers; National Association of Wheat Growers; National Cattlemen's Beef Association; National Corn Growers Association; National Cotton Council of America; National Family Farm Coalition; National Farmers Organization; National Farmers Union; National Grange; National Milk Producers Federation; National Pork Producers Council; National Sunflower Association; Organization for Competitive Markets; USA Rice Federation and Women Involved in Farm Economics.

Eastland County Crisis Center Offers New Program

The ECCC purchased rights to a program for children called, "We Help Ourselves" or "WHO". The program was designed for the Mental Health Association of Dallas. It was created by a teacher for school-age children. It discusses the topics of physical and sexual abuse in a non-threatening, age-appropriate manner. This program is already utilized in over 123 public and private institutions in the state of Texas, including the metroplex and Abilene.

The WHO program is based on three basic premises: 1) Know what to do in a situation, 2) Know where to go for help, and 3) Know who to tell. The program proposes questions to children and gives them an opportunity to think of solutions. The WHO program teaches them to trust their own instincts and to follow the rules set by parents. The program is divided into age levels and is available for children in preschool through the ninth grade. The program is also available at the high school level, and the Center hopes to offer education to the upper grades next year.

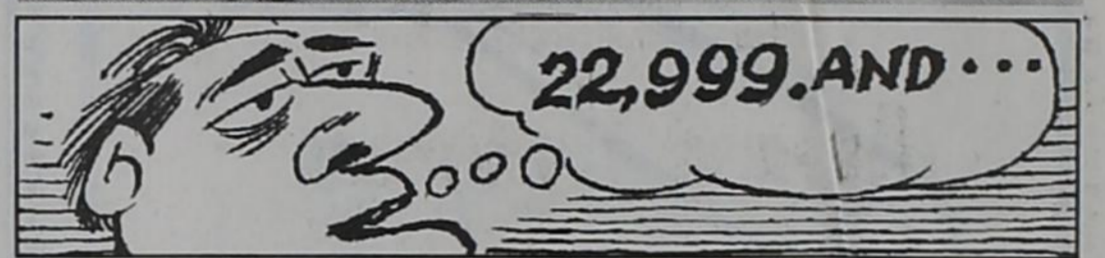
