## 150 ATTEND HOMECOMING EVENT AND DEDICATION AT KOKOMO

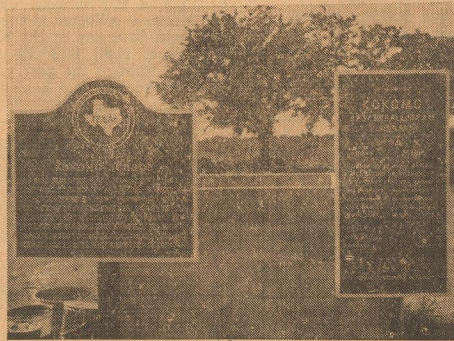
Approximately 150 persons attended the Annual Kokomo Homecoming and historical marker dedication held on the site of Kokomo School Saturday, May 10.

The visitors met at the Simpson Cemetery at 10 a. m., once the scene of the annual "working" but now maintained by the cemetery association.

The dedication of the Kokomo School site marker was made by

Mike Collins, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee. He urged the people of the community to make a written record of their once thriving community as the official metal marker was unveiled.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 20x20 inches and is located on a site at intersection of FM 2689 and FM 2563, 7 miles northeast of Carbon and reads:



KOKOMO MARKERS DEDICATED — Show above are the two historical markers that were dedicated at ceremonies held Saturday, May 10 at Kokomo.

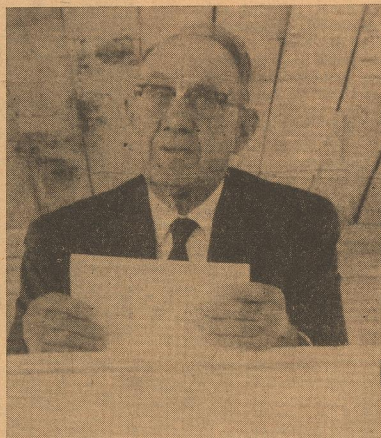
### Near Sites of Kokomo School

First building erected in this once thriving community was a one room log school house, 1886. Only furnishings were a stove and split log benches. In 1899 better equipment was acquired and a larger 30'x60' frame building was erected. In 1907 it was enlarged to two rooms. This school was consolidated with the Carbon School in 1949.

Following the school site marker dedication, a second marker paid for by school's basketball coaches and players for the year 1920-21 term, was unveiled by

the former coach, Otis Neill.

The basketball marker listed the names of players for the year 1920-21: Ruby Crawley, now Mrs. H. A. Reynolds of Stephenville; Mamie Barton, now Mrs. Lawrence Collins of Rankin; Remy Hagar, now Mrs. Ellis Jumper of Andrews; Avery Jones, Mrs. Floyd Crawley, Lake Leon; Donna Jones, now Mrs. Jesse Parker of Gorman; Esther Lasater, Mrs. R. Q. Graham of Kokomo; Winnie O'Neal, Mrs. Thomas Young, Hamlin; and Ona Simpson, Mrs. Hood of Crane. All were present except Mrs. Hood and Mrs. Jumper.

Members of the boys team listed on the marker include: Roy Crawley, Ranger; Elmer Barton, Levelland; Hoyt Bryant, Kokomo; Lois Everton, now deceased; R. Q. Graham, Kokomo; Ward Mangum, Long Beach, Calif.; and Edwin Sowell, Lubbock. Barton, Graham, Sowell were present for the dedication. Also listed on the marker were the names of the coach, Otis Neill and Oren Justice, assistant coach. The boys team won 11 games and lost 1 and the girls won 14 and lost 0.

An old fashioned "dinner on the grounds" was served at noon.

Otis Neill, now of Slaton, coach of the basketball teams which

won all but one of the 25 games played in the 1920-21 season, a former student and teacher in the school and chairman of the marker committee, gave a brief history of the school and the community at the business meeting of the Cemetery Association.

Mr. Neill stated in checking the records in the County Superintendent's office it is shown that the Rural School Districts of Eastland County, and there were more than 30, were organized or set aside by the County in 1883. The Kokomo School District was originally named Nash Creek District No. 9. Apparently there was not

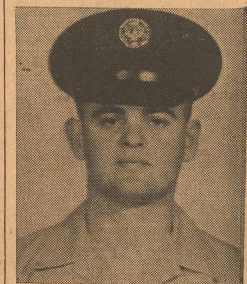
The wedding is set for June 7, 8:00 p. m., in the De Leon First Baptist Church. All friends and relatives are invited to attend.

## Lawndale Home Is Now Extended Care Facility

Effective immediately Lawndale Home For Senior Citizens has been accepted as an Extended Care Facility under Title XIX of the Social Security Act (Medicare).

2. You have been in a Medicare hospital for at least 3 days in a row before your admission;
3. You are admitted within 14 days after you leave the hospital;
4. You are admitted for further treatment of a condition for which you were treated in the hospital.

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Board of Trustees a Petition signed by twenty or more persons praying that we order an election in said District, to be held within 30 days after the order of election, for the purpose of submitting the Propositions hereinafter stated, in accordance with law; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees officially finds and determines that said Petition is signed by twenty or more resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that said Petition conforms with law in all respects.

WHEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF DESDEMONA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election shall be held in said District on the 31 day of May, 1969, at the High School, Desdemona, Texas. Said District shall constitute a single election precinct for said election, and the following election officers are hereby appointed to hold said election at the aforesaid polling place:

Sam Jones is hereby appointed as the clerk for absentee voting for said election; and High School is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and official state holidays; and the aforesaid clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting.

2. That at said election the following Propositions shall be submitted in accordance with law:

**PROPOSITION NO. 1**  
Shall the Board of Trustees of said District have the power and be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected an annual ad valorem tax at a rate not to exceed the limit of \$1.50 on the \$100 assessed value of taxable property in said District, for the further maintenance of public free schools, as authorized by Chapter 528, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session, as amended?

**PROPOSITION NO. 2**  
Shall the Board of Trustees of said District have the power and be authorized to issue the bonds of said District in one or more series or issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$65,000, with a net effective interest rate not to exceed 6 1/2 per cent as provided by Senate Bill No. 20, 61st Legislature, Regular Session, 1969, with said bonds to mature serially or otherwise in such installments as are fixed by said Board of Trustees, for the purpose of the construction and equipment of public free school buildings in said District, and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor; and shall said Board of Trustees have the power and be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the interest on and principal of said bonds, as authorized by Chapter 528, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session, as amended?

3. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid Propositions, which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

**KEEPING UP WITH FRIENDS**

By Dee Gordon.

Now that spring is here the outdoor work really begins. Most homeowners have more yard work to do than they can possibly get to.

Cool season broadleaf weeds and grasses seem to be causing everyone trouble, including myself. There are three different treatments recommended to control cool season plants before the lawn grass starts growing.

Ammonium nitrate dissolved in water will burn all vegetation. Dissolve one pound of ammonium nitrate fertilizer in one gallon of water and spray the weeds and grasses. One gallon is enough to spray 1000 square feet. The nitrogen will also benefit your lawn grass. There is, however, a problem in spraying with ammonium nitrate. It's hard to get all the fertilizer to dissolve causing the sprayer to clog. The nitrogen also corrodes the sprayer if it is not cleaned real well.

Endothal is another material that can be sprayed on cool season weeds before the lawn grass comes out. It should be sprayed on two or three days after a close mowing.

Paraquat is the third material that may be used on the weeds. It kills all vegetation it contacts. So more precautions should be followed when using paraquat. It should not be used after the grass comes out.

Bagworms, damaging insect pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants, will soon be making their spring time appearances.

Evergreens should be closely examined, and if newly hatched bag worms are found, control measures should be applied.

The worms immediately spin a bag of silk around themselves and attach bits of foliage to the outside of the bag as they feed. The larvae carry these bags wherever they go with only the front part of their bodies protruding for feeding and movement. The bags enlarge as the bagworms grow. A heavy infestation can completely strip that plant of foliage. When this happens, the plant may be lost.

The effective "camouflage" presented by the bags makes the insect hard to detect and damage may be extensive before they are noticed. They are much easier to control while they are still young.

If bagworms were present on a plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Recommended control measures are outlined in L-199 "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants". Copies are available from my office.

Chemical shearing of sheep and goats will be demonstrated to Texas producers April 17 at the Sheep and Angora Goat Field Day planned by Texas A&M Agricultural Research Center near McGregor.

Chemical fleece removal now only in the testing stage, will be done by Dr. Maurice Shelton, sheep and goat geneticist at McGregor. Shelton will discuss the possibilities and limitations of this method for producers use in the future.

Several other interesting topics will be discussed at the field day which begins at 9 a. m.

Now that pecan trees are budding out there is increased interest in budding and grafting the new improved varieties on native and undesirable stock. If you would like to learn how to do the budding or grafting be sure to attend our propagation school at Cisco Junior College April 18.

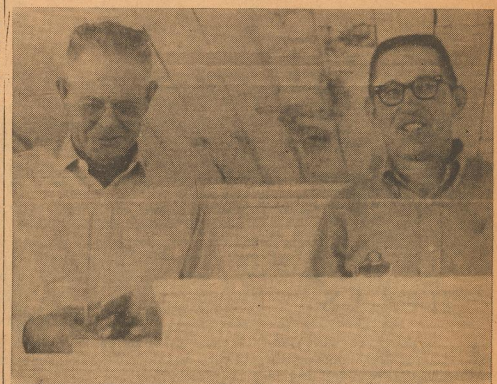

**Junk Ground Treasures**

Antique bottle hunting in old junk grounds has become a most fascinating hobby with many people in the past few years.

They will spend days digging around in rubble of abandoned junk grounds and the choice places for the treasure hunts are on old farms.

Mrs. Delma Maupin, who is an avid bottle hunter, found a most treasured item recently, a Mason fruit jar made on November 30, 1858. It was made from a four piece mold and has many bubbles which she says is an indication that it is old. She would not divulge the hunting ground where she found her treasure as the competition in this hobby is so keen.

Mrs. Maupin has many bottles in her collection that she has found in this manner. Among her treasured antique collections is a natural gas iron. She does not know the date it was patented. It was manufactured by Dover National Gas, Inc., manufacturing company in Dover, Ohio.

According to Ralph and Terry Kovel when John Mason patented his screw-cap glass jar on November 30, 1858, housewives were quick to see its advantages. Most early jars were some shade of green or blue, and those colors were used until the 1930s. Amber jars date from the last of the 19th century to about 1917.



The first colorless glass jars were made in the late 1800s but did not become standard until around 1930.

There are 122 different styles of Mason jars. Until about 1904 the words "MASON'S Patent Nov. 30th, 1858," were raised on the glass. Old jars have a small neck opening. The glass is bubbly and flawed. The bottom of the jar has a rough scar or pontil mark, the top a rough cut lip. The colored glass and tiny flaws and bubbles make the jars themselves intriguingly collectable. Prices on these collectors items range from 50c to \$10.
