

Ordinance For Amendment Declared Invalid By City Commission

An ordinance declaring invalid and of no effect the order calling an election for amendment to the Charter of the City of Gorman, Texas, which order was passed by this commission on the 5th day of March, 1960, and recognizing and declaring all proceedings in pursuance of such ordinance invalid.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Gorman:

SECTION ONE

The proceedings in connection with the holding of the election for the amendment of the City Charter of the City of Gorman in pursuance of order passed by this Commission on the 5th day of March, 1960, and which election was held on the 5th day of April, 1960, this Commission having been advised by a competent legal counsel that such election was not validly held under the laws of the State of Texas, are hereby declared to be invalid and of no force and effect and said election is hereby declared to be null and void. All proceedings in connection with the calling, the notice, the holding and the return of said election are hereby cancelled and held for naught.

SECTION TWO

The fact that an election to amend the Charter of the City of Gorman, Texas, has been called and held and such election is invalid and of no effect under the advice of competent legal counsel, and all members of the City Commission being of the opinion that such election is invalid and should be so declared and recognized by this Commission and that such action so declaring same should be given immediate effect creates an emergency and imperative public necessity requiring the suspension of the rule under Section 11 of the Charter of the City of Gorman that ordinances be read at two meetings of the City Commission. Said rule is therefore hereby suspended, and this ordinance is put upon its final reading and passed.

City Commission To Submit New Amendments To City Charter

Notice is hereby given by the City Commission of Gorman, Texas that such commission intends to pass an ordinance at its meeting of June 11, 1960 providing for the submission of proposed amendments to the Charter of the City of Gorman which ordinance will be in substance as follows:

An ordinance ordering an election for the submission to the qualified voters of the City of Gorman, Texas, of amendments to the City Charter of the City of Gorman and specifically setting out the amendments to be voted upon at such election.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Gorman:

SECTION ONE

That an election be held on the 15th day of July, 1960, within the City of Gorman, Texas, submitting to the qualified voters of said City certain amendments to the Charter of the City of Gorman, Texas, which amendments are set out below. Each amendment set out below shall be voted upon separately and the ballot for said election shall be prepared so that the voters favoring such amendment may vote "Yes" and those opposed to such amendment may vote "No" on each of said amendments separately. Said election shall be held at Fire Hall in the City of Gorman, Texas, and Mr. T. L. Acree is hereby appointed presiding officer of said election and Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher and Mrs. M. E. Shell, clerks, and Mrs. Hubert Craddock, alternate.

SECTION TWO

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas governing elections for cities and towns and all persons qualified to vote in the City of Gorman under the laws of this State regulating general elections shall be allowed to vote. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas relating to general elections.

SECTION THREE

The proposed amendments to be submitted for vote at said election and voted upon separately are as follows:

AMENDMENT 1

Section 1 of Article IV of the City Charter of the City of Gorman shall be amended to read as follows:

The Municipal Government of the City of Gorman shall consist of a City Commission composed of a Mayor and four Commissioners.

AMENDMENT 2

The Charter of the City of Gorman shall be amended by adding a provision to Article IV to be known as Section 2 a., reading as follows:

The four Commissioners shall be designated by place numbers and the present Commissioner whose term expires in April, 1961, shall be designated as "Com-

missioner, Place 1", and the Commissioner whose term expires in April, 1962, shall be designated as "Commissioner, Place 2", and one Commissioner to be added shall be designated as "Commissioner, Place 3" and his term shall expire in April, 1961, and one Commissioner to be added shall be designated as "Commissioner, Place 4" and his term shall expire in April, 1962.

AMENDMENT 3

The Charter of the City of Gorman shall be amended by adding to the first paragraph of Section 7, Article IV the following:

The offices of Commissioner, Place 3 and Commissioner, Place 4 shall first be filled by appointment of the present City Commission and such appointments shall be made by majority vote of the present City Commission and those so appointed shall serve until their terms expire as above provided.

SECTION FOUR

The ballot for said election on such amendment shall be so prepared that the voters may vote "Yes" or "No" on any amendments without voting "Yes" or "No" on all said amendments. Each such proposed amendment, if approved by the majority of the qualified voters voting at said election, shall become a part of the Charter of the City of Gorman. The City Secretary of Gorman shall mail a copy of the above proposed amendments to every qualified voter in said City as appears from the tax collector's rolls for the year ending January 31, 1960.

SECTION FIVE

Notice of the election on the above amendments shall be given by publication of a copy of this ordinance for not less than 30 days immediately preceding such election in each issue of the weekly newspaper published in the City of Gorman.

SECTION SIX

The fact that the law requires an election to amend a charter to be held not less than 30 days after same is called and that the best interests of the City of Gorman will be served by holding the election on the above proposed charter amendments on the date set out, and no purpose is to be served by reading this ordinance at a second meeting of the City Commission of Gorman, Texas, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that this ordinance go into effect immediately and provisions of the law and of the City Charter to the contrary are hereby suspended.

Like many others, she taught during regular school term and attended college in the summer to obtain her degrees. She studied one year at Texas University.

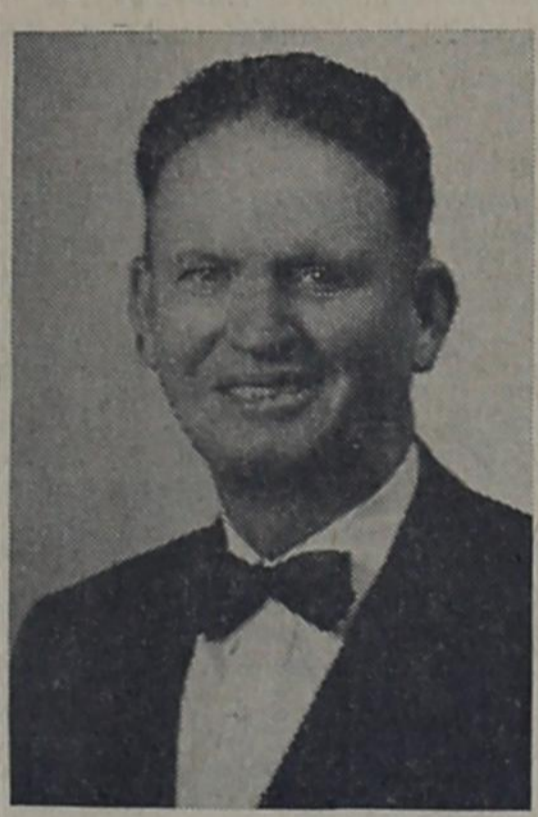
In 1936 she was married and in the same summer attended Texas Tech in Lubbock where she later received her BS Degree.

Texas Highway Travel Maps Now Ready

AUSTIN - May 15 — Texas' Official Highway Travel Map, 1960-style, is now available to the general public. Free copies of the big, colorful map may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, or at the highway district offices and travel bureaus. County tax offices have map cards on hand for requesting copies of the map.

The map reflects 1,933 miles of multilane-divided highway now completed, and includes the finished sections of the seven National System of Interstate and Defense Highways located in the state. More than 1,500 farm-to-market road miles have been added to this year's map. Approximately 20,000 miles of the state's 30,000-mile Farm-To-Market Road System are shown on the map. All of the 26,378 miles of State and U. S. highway are shown.

Three new lakes have been added to the 1960 Travel Map, bringing total shown in the major lakes-and-reservoirs category to 64. New water attractions recorded are Buffalo Lake in Lubbock County; Champion Creek Lake in Mitchell County; and Lake Tawakoni in Hunt, Rains and Van Zandt Counties. Countless rivers, creeks, and streams are also charted on the Travel Map.

The 816 roadside parks pegged on the map are those having full picnic facilities. Their locations are marked by a green dot. State Parks are indicated by a green triangle.

"All of Texas Welcomes You" banners the pictorial side of the map — reflecting, in eleven full-color pictures, some of the outstanding recreational, scenic, and historical attractions in Texas.

A section entitled "Facts About Texas" telescopes information on Texas' terrain, history, and industrial and recreational diversity.

Cities and towns shown on the map total 1,826. City route maps for the state's twelve largest cities are also included — Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock, San Antonio, Waco, and Wichita Falls.

More than half a million Official Highway Travel Maps of the 1959 edition have been distributed — in-state, out-of-state, and to dozens of foreign countries.

The map is used by all state and governmental agencies in the state for determining official highway distances, mileages, zones, and like information.

It's peanut planting time again. If the rains continue to bless us as they have, there should be another bumper crop. To help eat up some of the products made from peanuts, use the following recipe. It is from the latest edition of "Recipes of the South-west", compliments of Texas Electric Company.

PEANUT BUTTER PIE

1 1/2 cups milk
1 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 beaten egg yolks
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons butter or oleo
6 tablespoons peanut butter
1 - 9 in. baked pastry shell
2 egg whites
1/8 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar

Scald milk. Combine brown sugar, flour and salt and add milk. Return to heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Add to egg yolks and cook until thickened. Add vanilla, butter and peanut butter. Cool. Pour in baked pastry shell. Beat egg whites till frothy. Beat in one-eighth teaspoon salt and sugar gradually and continue beating until meringue is stiff and glossy. Spread on pie and bake in moderate oven (350 F.) for 12 to 15 minutes.

Lowly Peanut To Aid Fight On Hemophilia

The lowly peanut may contain an important substance that checks hemophilia, a hereditary disease that delays blood clotting.

A zoology professor at Louisiana State University, Dr. H. B. Boudreaux, has been using himself as a guinea pig for the past 3 years, eating handfuls of peanut and extracts - - including peanut butter - - to treat the disease of the "bleeders."

Persons afflicted with the disease may bleed for a day or longer from a slight cut on the finger. They may bleed to death from more serious wounds.

Dr. Boudreaux is a "bleeder," and he fast noticed the healing qualities of a handful of peanuts upon a blood-containing swelling in his knee. It improved markedly, and healed with subsequent saks of roasted peanuts.

Boudreaux said the bleeding tendency came back when he stopped eating peanuts, and that bleeding was controlled again when he resumed the peanut diet. Almost all preparations of peanuts relieved the clinical symptoms of the disease, he said.

Boudreaux has extracted the healing substance from peanut flour, but only in limited amounts.

PEANUTS GO TO ALL PARTIES

Peanuts have been going to parties for a long time, but usually only as salted peanuts in a bowl or in combination with other nuts. However, just as the late George Washington Carver proved in his laboratory that peanut derivatives can be used in over 300 products, an imaginative cook will find dozens of uses for peanuts and peanut butter for party fare in her kitchen.

Peanuts can go to any kind of party. Their flavor enhance salty tangy hors d'oeuvres and canapes for cocktail parties as well as the sweet delicacies for teas and coffees. In some party dishes the peanut flavor can predominate. In others, a touch of peanut or peanut butter will be that "secret ingredient" that seems to bring out the flavor of other components. Creative cookery can be fun, and peanuts make a good starting point for even the fanciest creations are basically simple. Several recipe variations using peanuts are given below.

A dosage of 14 grams a day of the extract - - equal to a pound of peanuts - - has been the limited number of tests he has made.

Currently, the extract is being tested in a number of hospitals in Louisiana and Mississippi, and Dr. Boudreaux is studying to develop a method to produce the extract on a larger scale. The U. S. Department of Agriculture Research Laboratory in New Orleans is co-operating in the continuing study.

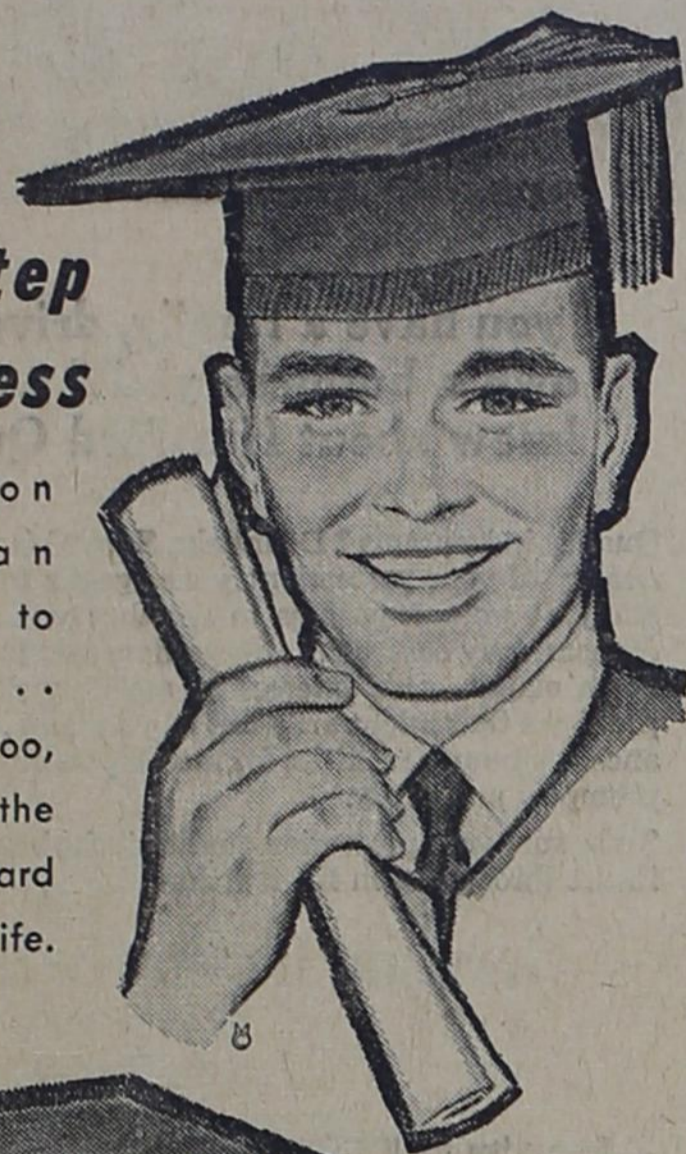
