age sliced American cheese, 4 eggs, separated, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 1/4 cups milk, 3/4 teaspoon onion salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper.

**Method:** Spread crackers lightly with mustard. Alternate layers of crackers and cheese in a greased 2-quart casserole. Beat egg yolks well, and blend in flour, milk and seasonings. Beat whites until very stiff. Fold whites into milk mixture and pour over crackers in casserole. Place in refrigerator until ready to bake next day. Then heat oven to 325 F. (slow oven). Set casserole in a larger pan of hot water. Place in oven and make at 325 F. for 1 1/2 hours, or until lightly browned and firm to the touch. Serve at once. Makes six servings.

Excitement mounts as the Who's Who Jackpot remains unclaimed. Again too many clues were listed, and again the person who identified the Who's Who failed to win the full amount.

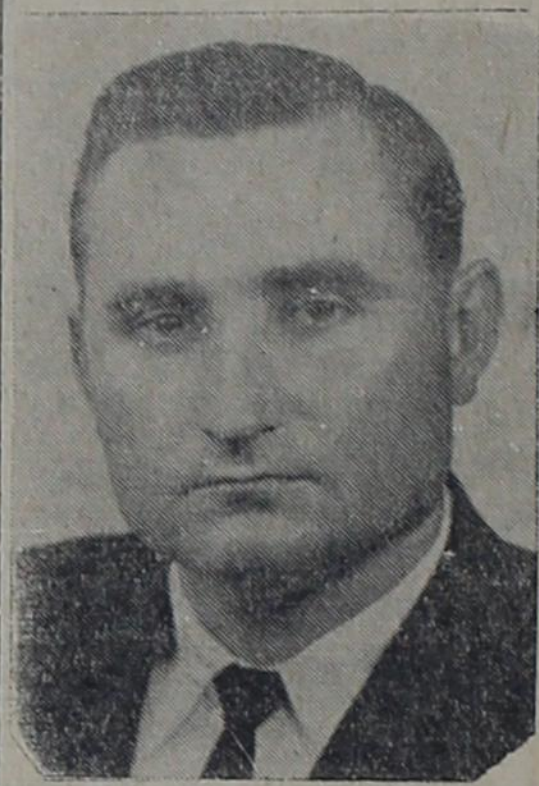

## Scott Bailey Is Candidate For Representative



Scott Bailey today authorized this newspaper to announce that he would be a candidate for state representative from the 76th District in the May 7 Democratic primary.

Bailey, who is seeking his first public office, is a native of Eastland County and has been a legal resident of the county all of his life. He is 29 years old.

A graduate of Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College, he holds a bachelor of science degree from North Texas State College.

At North Texas his major was education and government. He entered the Army as an enlisted man following his college graduation and served two years, including 16 months of active duty in Korea. While in Korea he served with the famed Buffalo Regiment of the 7th Infantry Division.

Following his discharge from the Army, Bailey worked for Oilwell Supply Division of United States Steel Corp. He then enrolled in the University of Texas and completed a year of graduate study.

Bailey then accepted a teaching position in the field of government and United States history. He has been active in professional organizations of the teaching profession.

"After having taught government for the past two and one-half years, I have decided to resign my teaching position and offer my services as a state representative from the 76th District," he stated.

He announced he would issue his formal statement and platform at a later date.

## Information On Veteran's Pensions

Ben R. Townley, Assistant County Service Officer, will attend a class in Mineral Wells on February 18 and 19 to receive instructions on the new Veteran's Pension Law which may affect any person receiving a Veteran's Pension.

An open meeting to acquaint veterans and widows with the provisions of the new Veterans Administration pension law that goes into effect July 1, 1960, will be held in Eastland at the American Legion Hall Friday, Feb. 19, at 3 p. m.

The new legislation, known as Public Law 86-211 is especially important to thousands of Texas veterans, their widows and dependent children who are now receiving pension payments. It is also of particular interest to widows and dependent children of WWII and Korean veterans who may have been previously denied benefits.

All veterans and widows who believe they may be affected and others interested in learning more about the new law are encouraged to attend.

At the Eastland meet from the Dallas VA Regional Office to explain the benefits will be R. L. Hight, Chief, Adjudication Division, and H. G. Diebel, Chief, Contact Service.

Later Mr. Townley will announce a date for a meeting in Gorman to discuss this new law.

## M/SGT. GEORGE CORNWELL WINS AIR FORCE MAINTENANCE AWARD

CLARK AIR BASE, P. I., Jan. 26. — M/Sgt. George W. Cornwell of Gorman, Texas, a military veteran of nearly 17 years, has been selected Clark's "Maintenance Man of the Month" for January.

Sergeant Cornwell, who currently serves as Acting Line Chief with the 510th Tactical Fighter Squadron here, was awarded the honor for his outstanding job performance in flight line maintenance functions.

Upon joining the Air Force in April, 1943, Sergeant Cornwell took basic training at Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas. He was then assigned to Pensacola Naval Base, Fla., for a PBY engineers' course.

From there, he went to Gulf Port AFB, then to Keesler AFB, both in Mississippi, serving at these installations as a technical instructor. Before coming to Clark in January, 1959 from Luke AFB, Ariz., he had been overseas twice — in Santiago, Chile, in 1949 and in Weisbaden, Germany, during the 1949 Berlin Airlift.

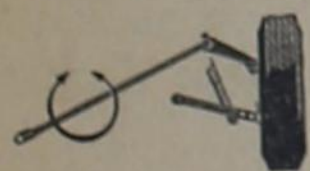

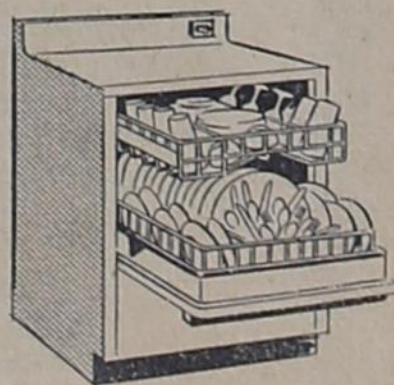
