D. B. Warren, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association Director, has announced that an important peanut growers meeting will be held at Gorman at 7:30 p. m., Tuesday, March 15. The meeting will be held in the high school auditorium.

Several items of vital interest to peanut producers will be discussed. Plans for increasing planted peanut allotment in Eastland County will be one of the featured items. Mr. Emmett Powell, ASC office manager, will explain new peanut acreage allotment provisions. Eastland County has lost hundreds of thousands of dollars the past two years due to the lack of planting alloted peanut acres.

B. C. Langley, Supt. of the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, Stephenville, will explain to growers the latest practices relative to the prevention and control of Southern Blight and other plant diseases.

Ross Wilson, SWPGA manager, will answer grower quesions relating to 1960 peanut price support program. Refreshments will be served by the Gorman Businessmen's Club. All growers in the area are cordially invited to attend the meeting.





#### Born After His Daddy Died -
