Max Pierce, shown above taking a hand off from Quarterback Jackie Sledge, has had the best spring training season he has had since entering TCU. As a result of his fine showing in this year's final spring drills Max is listed as the Number 1 Fullback for Abe Martins Horned Frogs.

An ankle injury slowed Max down some when he was a Sophomore but even so he lettered the past two years as fullback and has participated in two post season Bowl games. Year before last he played in the Cotton Bowl game and last year in the Blue Bonnet Bowl in Houston.

Max has the distinction of having never lost a yard in all his college career. He has made some yardage on every play. In the final scrimmage game Max made 78 yards in 11 carries; scored one touchdown and was the outstanding back in the spring drills.

The Fort Worth sportswriter's wrote that the coaches knew all along that Max could run with Spikes and Priddy, in fact, he was even better, but their experience in defense kept him from playing more than he did the past two seasons. With Spikes and Priddy both graduated Pierce is expected to carry on the fine tradition of the Frogs having outstanding fullbacks.

Max was not only an outstanding athlete for four years at Gorman High School but was well respected and admired by all the people of this community for his spirit of fair play and determination in his studies as well as sports. As Max has progressed in his college football he has continued to show the same spirit and determination and the people who know him are justly proud of Max's accomplishments and wish him well in his next and final season with TCU.

B. C. Langley, Supt. of the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, Stephenville, will explain to growers the latest practices relative to the prevention and control of Southern Blight and other plant diseases.

Ross Wilson, SWPGA manager, will answer grower questions relating to 1960 peanut price support program. Refreshments will be served by the Gorman Businessmen's Club. All growers in the area are cordially invited to attend the meeting.

A similar meeting, co-sponsored by the Eastland County Farm Bureau, will be held at Nimrod Community Center Monday, March 14 at 7:30 p. m. Mr. Justice, President of ECFB, stated that their organization is extremely concerned over the lack of planting allotted peanut acres in the county.

It was reported that the City Commission had begun the transfer of sale of a portion of this park and the Gorman Jaycees unanimously made the following resolution:

"The Gorman Jaycees go on record as opposing the action of the City of Gorman in selling or proposing to sell certain property that is under management of the Gorman Jaycees and further suggest that the city cancel said deed or transfer."

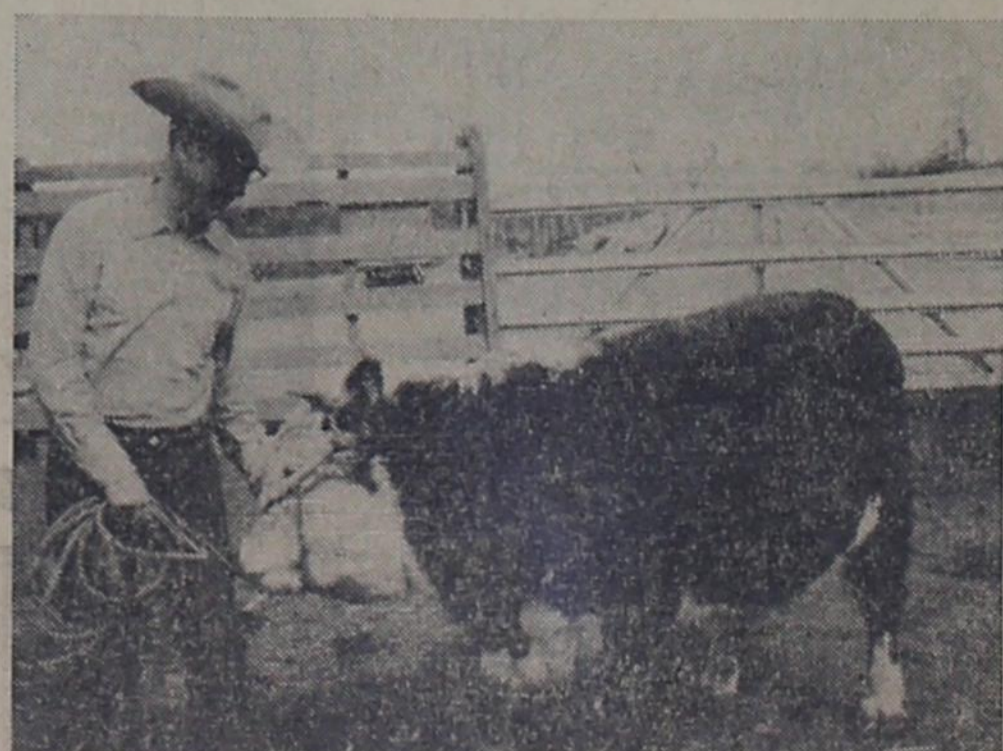
