Does Gorman have an incurable disease?

We have a fine staff of Doctors and a hospital on a par or above any in the southwest. However, if Gorman has this incurable disease there is nothing they can do about it although our Doctors play an important part in the economic stability of our community. Each businessman and individual must make his own diagnosis and write his own prescription. Some of our businessmen have a seemingly incurable pessimistic attitude on the future of Gorman, while one or two others do their best to hamstring progressive efforts. I am thankful that the majority ARE looking to the future and are doing their best to cure this creeping paralysis.

Ronald Burton of Eastland and Jim Taylor of Cisco met with the Businessmen's Club on Monday night. These men are members of a County-Wide Planning Committee and were guests of Check Smith and Tom Dunn who are also members of this committee.

Mr. Burton gave some population figures which were almost like sounding a death knell for our county. In 1940 Eastland County had 30,345 citizens with 7,764 school enrollment. The 1960 census shows 18,901 with 3,828 in school. At this rate under present conditions it is estimated the county will have 10,600 with a school enrollment of 2,665 by 1975.

The County-Wide Planning Committee, representing all towns, are hoping that each of us will assist them in striving to re-build our county instead of just sitting by and watching it die. Their next meeting will be at Rising Star on August 23.

Congratulations to the Jaycees on their Carnival Saturday night. Folks enjoyed it and some were heard to comment that they were glad to see some activity around Gorman again. They sure did miss the Peanut Festival.

It is still summertime and we cooks have to think of something that will be nourishing and appetizing (and quick to fix) to eat. The Upsidedown Bologna Salad is one that the family will go for and it is both quick and easy to fix.

UPSIDEDOWN BOLOGNA SALAD

12 or 14 slices of bologna
1 pkg. (8 oz) shell macaroni
cooked
1/4 lb. Cheddar cheese, cut into cubes
1 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup sliced pitted ripe olives
1/4 cup chopped green onions
2 tablespoons cut-up pimento
2 tablespoons minced parsley
3/4 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon vinegar
2 teaspoons prepared mustard
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper

Line a 1 1/2 quart mixing bowl with 10 slices of bologna arranging slices to overlap each other and the bowl rim. Cut remaining bologna into thin strips. Combine with macaroni, cheese, celery, olives, pimento and parsley. Blend remaining ingredients; mix thoroughly with macaroni mixture. Spoon into bologna lined bowl, fold edges of meat slices over salad. Chill. Invert salad on platter and garnish with greens. Makes six to eight servings.

EFFECT OF SAWING ON THE APPEARANCE OF WOOD

The grain appearance of a piece of wood is largely determined by the way in which the log was cut. Cross cutting exposes the end grain. This is the surface seen on meat blocks used by butchers.

Lumber is never manufactured by sawing across the grain. It is always sawn parallel to the grain or lengthwise of the log. However, sawing in this manner can produce two distinctly different types of wood grain. When sawing the outer portion of the log, the cut parallels the annual growth rings of the tree. Lumber of this origin is called plain-sawn or flat-grained. As the sawing approaches the center of the log, the cut crosses the annual growth rings. That type of lumber is called quarter-sawn, edge-grained, or vertical grained.

Only a small amount of lumber is purposely quarter-sawn. For most purposes, lumber with either type of grain is satisfactory. But, for uses requiring heavy wearing qualities, such as for flooring, quarter-sawn lumber is best. Such lumber also shrinks less in width, and splits and twists less than plain sawn lumber. The advantages of using quarter-sawn lumber for flooring and similar specialized uses more than offsets the additional cost required.

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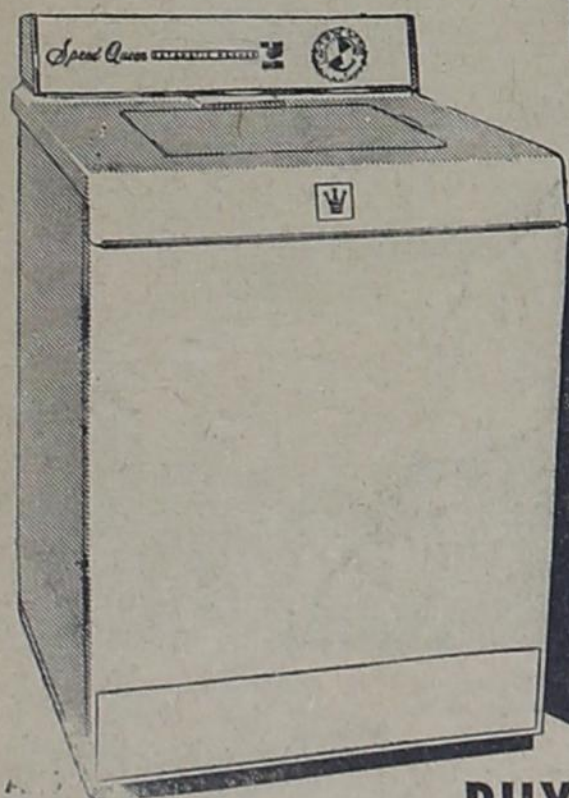
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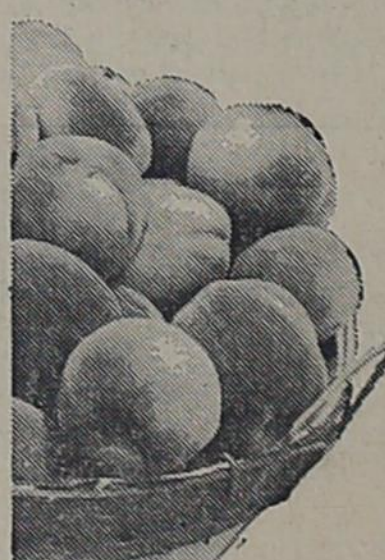
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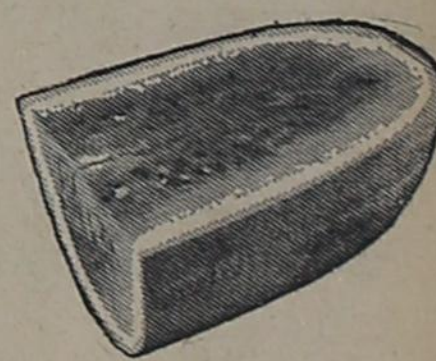
