WHY NOT EVERYBODY?

There was a strike of bricklayers in New Jersey the other day. They were already getting \$4 an hour, or \$28 for a 7-hour day, for laying about 500 bricks. That's 5 1/2¢ a brick. But they got more—\$4.22 an hour now, and \$4.50 an hour by May 1962.

Why is it that every strike seems to win an increase? Well partly it's because the government has granted organized labor monopoly powers enjoyed by no one else. A good many businesses have a measure of government protection, too.

Farmers have never had supports on more than 45 of the 256 farm commodities produced in this country, and those supports have declined. They should have. But isn't it about time to look at the protections enjoyed by others? Shouldn't we all play by the same rules?

The difference is that bricklayers are organized and like most unions they get their price or nobody does the work. If farmers ever get organized to where they can run their own business and work together — you can imagine what will happen.



WOOD INSULATOR

The ability of wood to conduct heat is low. Unlike metals, heat passes through wood very slowly. Therefore, wood is a good insulator against heat and cold. It also explains why well constructed wooden houses are relatively easy to heat.

The insulating capacity of solid wood is affected by many factors such as grain, knots, splits or cracks, and moisture content of the wood. Heat will travel about twice as fast along the grain as it will across the grain. Also, the heavier species of wood have less insulating qualities than the lighter weight woods, and wet wood is not as efficient an insulator as dry wood.

To overcome variable insulating conditions and to increase the natural insulating capacity of solid wood, structural insulating board or other types of insulation is frequently incorporated in interior walls of buildings. Much of this insulation is made of fiberized wood which is frequently impregnated with asphalt or other water resistant materials.

Insulation serves to control sound and also the outflow of heat during cold weather and the inflow of heat during hot weather.

The peach harvest will soon be over too, with one of the largest yields in several years and the fruit was in excellent condition. The late "Indian" peaches are so perfect for making super delicious sweet pickle peaches. Umm - I love those things.

I would, for the present, settle for a quickly made peach cobbler that is a bit unusual but very good. Let's call it —

EASY PEACH COBBLER

5 cups sliced fresh peaches
1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup light corn syrup
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon butter
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 package easy cornbread mix
1/2 cup milk
1 egg - unbeaten

1/2 cup milk
1 tablespoon sugar

For base, place peaches in saucepan; add salt, syrup, nutmeg, butter, cornstarch, water and lemon juice. Cook over low heat until peaches are tender and mixture is slightly thickened. Pour into an 8-inch-square baking dish.

Heat oven to hot (425 F). Put 1 egg and 1/2 cup milk into bag of mix. Mix quickly by working the bag vigorously with the fingers until the egg is well blended.

Squeeze bag to empty batter evenly over top of peach base. Be sure peach base is completely covered. Sprinkle tablespoon of sugar evenly over top. Bake in pre-heated oven 20 to 25 minutes and serve warm with whipped cream or ice cream. Makes about eight servings.


