## SERVICES FOR DONALD SELF SET FOR FRIDAY

Funeral services for Donald Ray Self, son of Mrs. Tine Self of Gorman, will be held Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the local Church of Christ with Bro. John Goble officiating. Interment will be in the Gorman Cemetery with Higginbotham in charge.

Donald Ray, home on leave from the U. S. Navy, is believed to have been killed instantly when the car in which he was riding left the Ranger-Gorman road near Alameda Wednesday night while he and four friends were returning to Gorman.

Other boys in the group were Kenneth Welch and Glendon Frasier, both Gorman High School students, Lawrence Cates of Gorman, recently discharged from military service, and Allen Valstead of North Dakota, who was visiting with Self. All of the boys carried by Ranger ambulance to the Ranger Hospital. Cates has been transferred to Abilene for bone surgery, his left leg having been crushed. Welch, Frasier and Valstead were not believed to have been seriously injured.

Survivors other than Self's mother are Jimmy Max Self of Big Spring and Bobby Gene Self of Kingsville.

## 7074 Voters Cast Ballots In Eastland County Area

Johnson Smith, County Clerk, stated that he had calls from some of the larger precincts for more ballots due to the heavy turnout for the General Election November 8. Smith said the voting had been almost as heavy this year as it was in 1952-56, although the county population has dropped about 3,000.

According to returns from the Court House Wednesday afternoon, voters in Eastland County split their ticket again giving Nixon-Lodge 3358 votes and Kennedy-Johnson 3058.

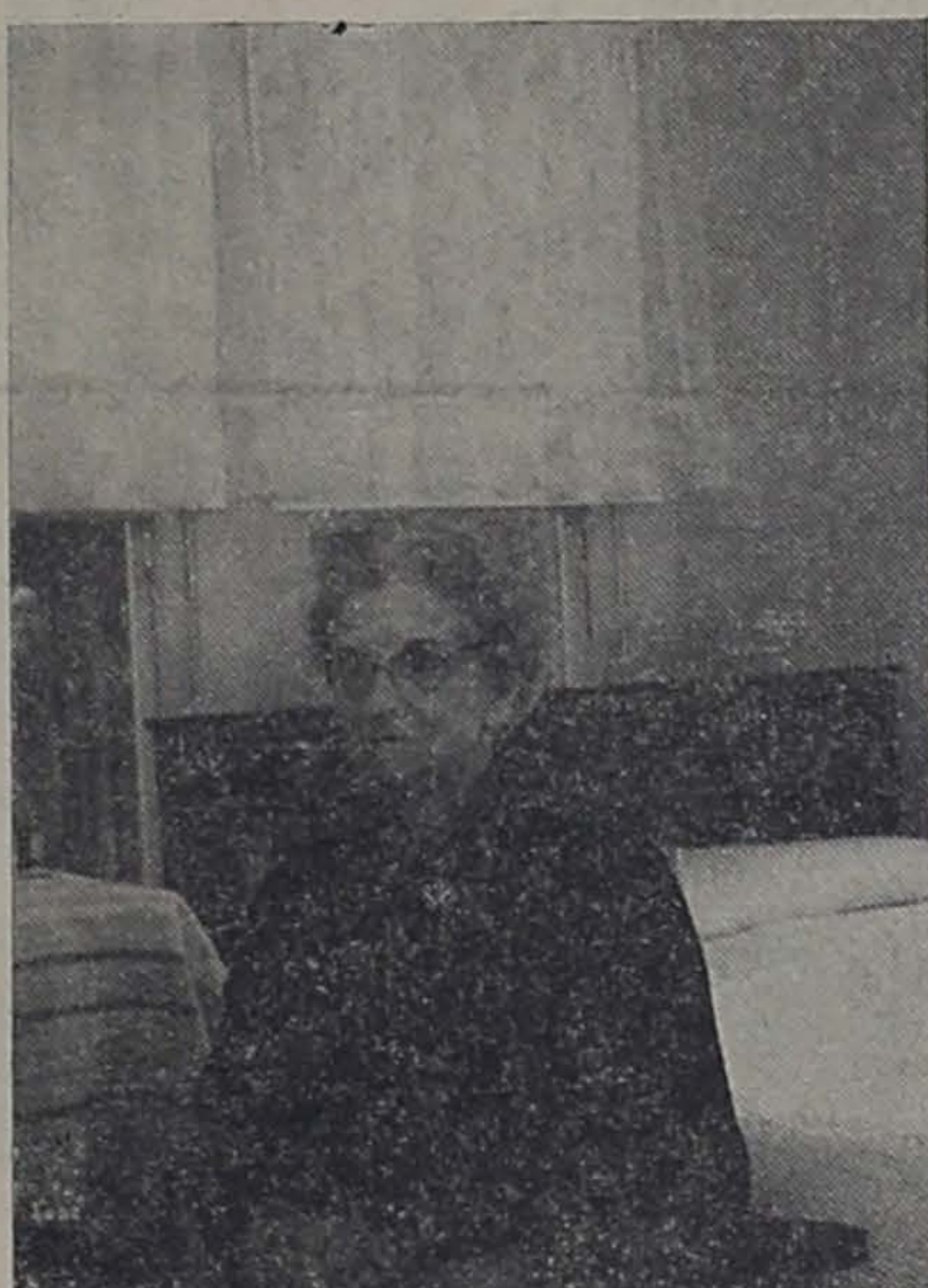

Actually the lady's groceries came to 52c — 29c for corn flakes, 23c for the milk. The farmer's share of the sale was only 13c, yet, this housewife's first impression was "farmers were getting rich."

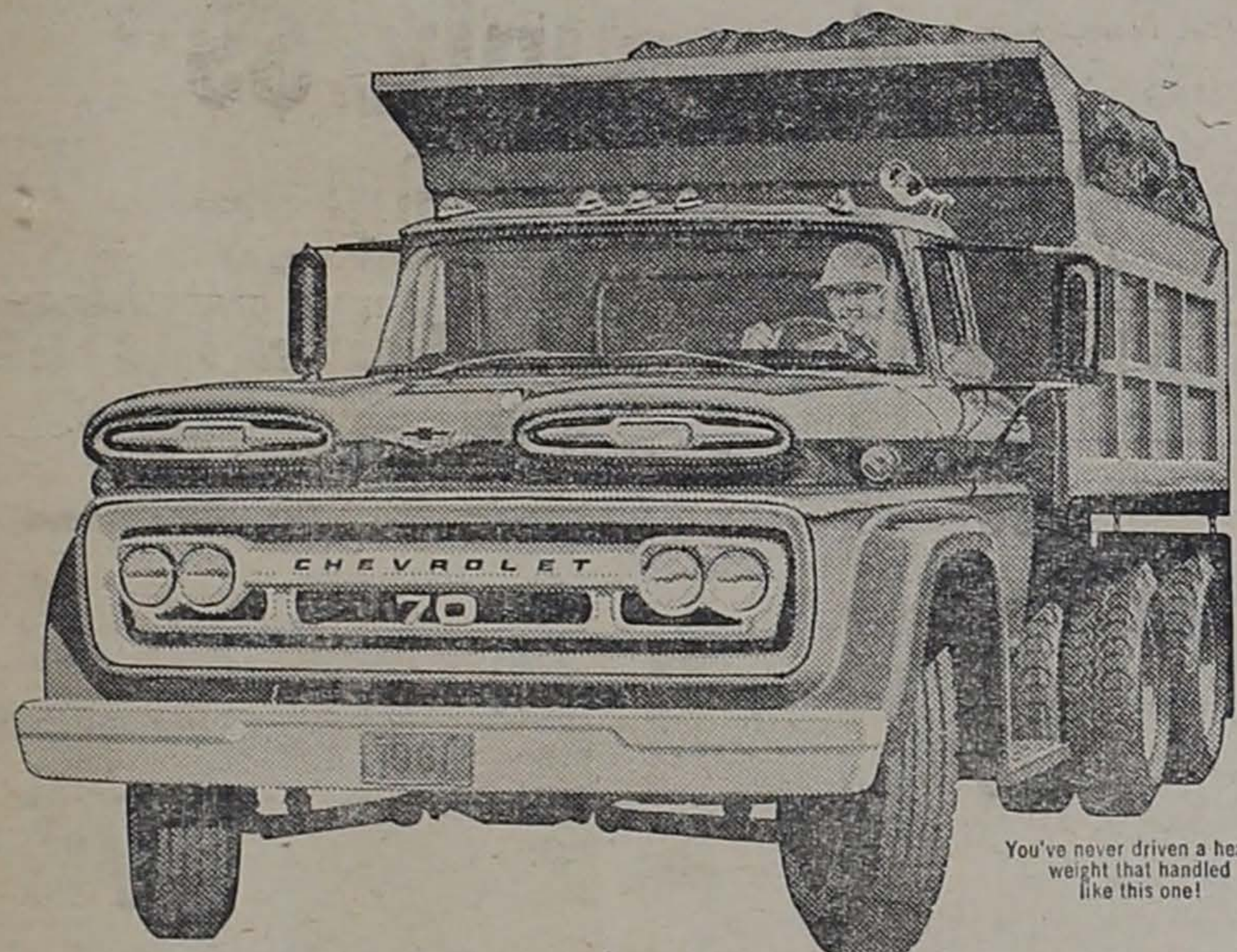

## SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS CAN BE PAID TO DISABLED PERSONS OF ANY AGE

Severely distabled workers no longer need wait until age 50 to become entitled to disability insurance benefits. Until now, a disabled worker under age 50 could apply to have his social security record frozen, but he and his family could not be paid monthly benefits until they reach ed age 50.

If you are a disabled person under the age fifty and have already had your social security record frozen on account of your disability, you should have received a letter by the end of Oc-

tober, 1960, explaining exactly what you need to do about getting disability insurance benefits.

If you are a disabled worker under age 50, but have never applied to have your social security record frozen, find out from your social security office right away whether you are eligible for monthly benefits. If you have worked under social security for at least 5 out of 10 years just before you became disabled, you should apply for benefits.

Disability insurance benefit checks for disabled workers under age 50 will be payable month of November, 1960, and will be mailed out early in December.

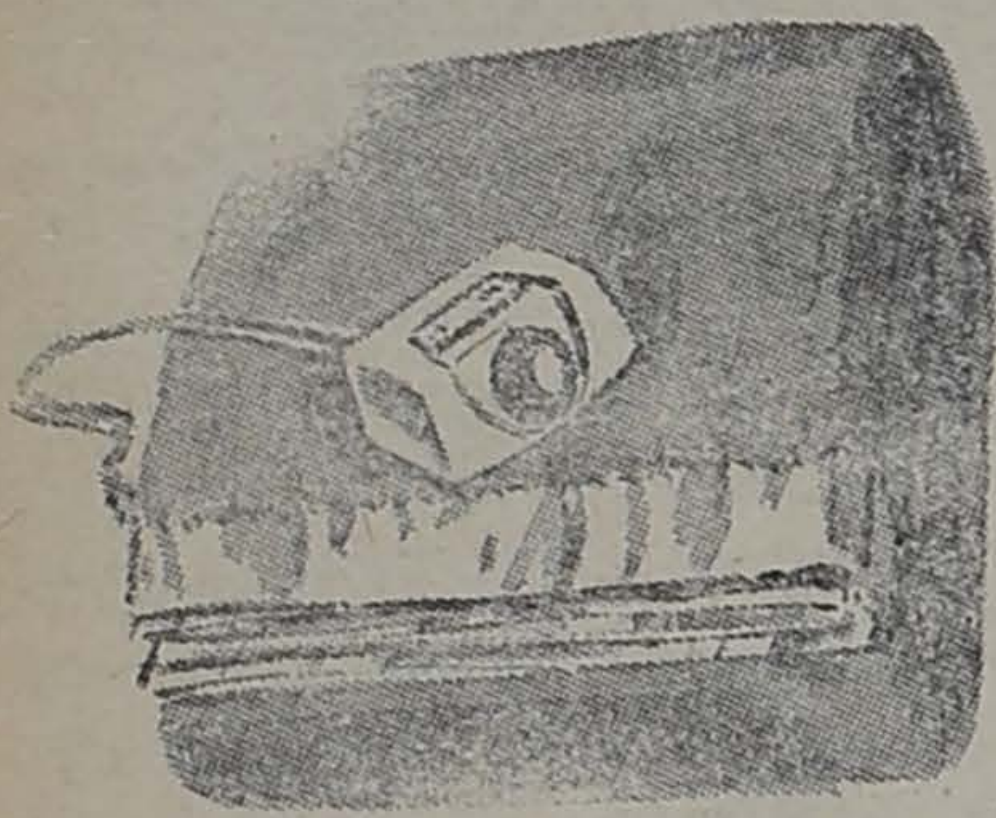
