



WACO - (Spl) - State policies to guide the Texas Farm Bureau's actions in the 57th Legislature next year were adopted by voting delegates to the organization's annual meeting Nov. 9-12 in Dallas.

Among the more important state-level issues on which policies were set by the convention are farm-to-market road construction, sales taxes, education and farm labor. Recommendations to the American Farm Bureau Federation convention in December on national matters were also adopted by the 678 voting delegates.
