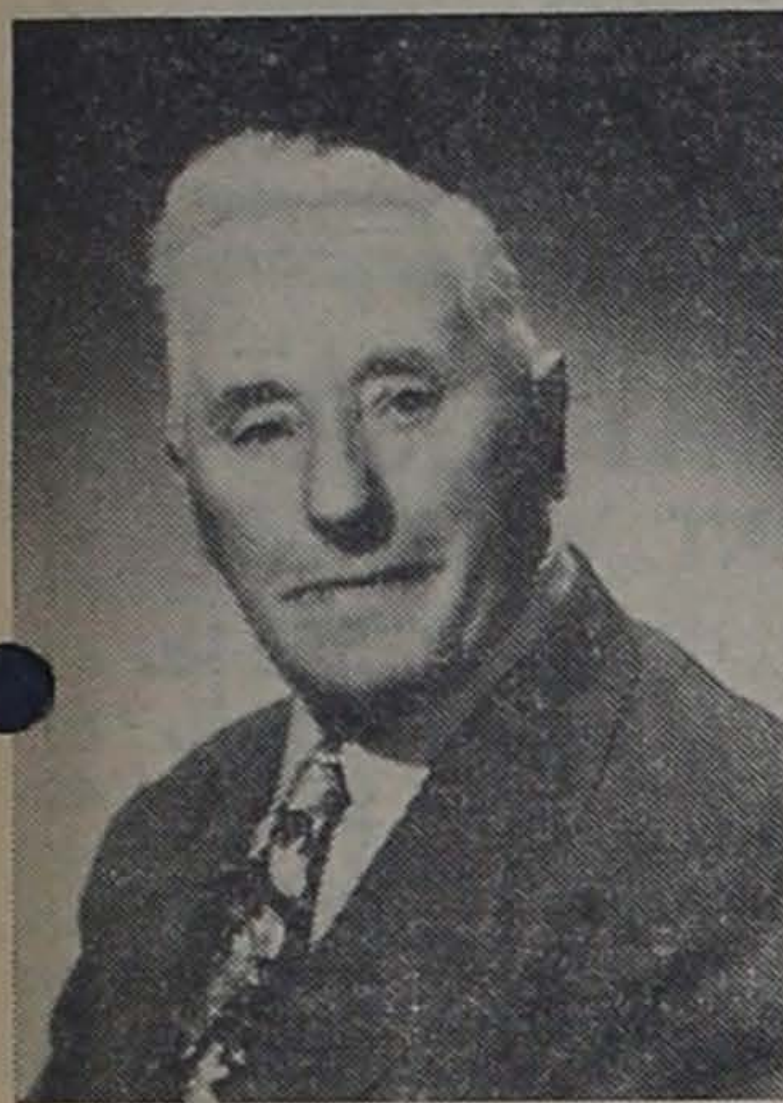
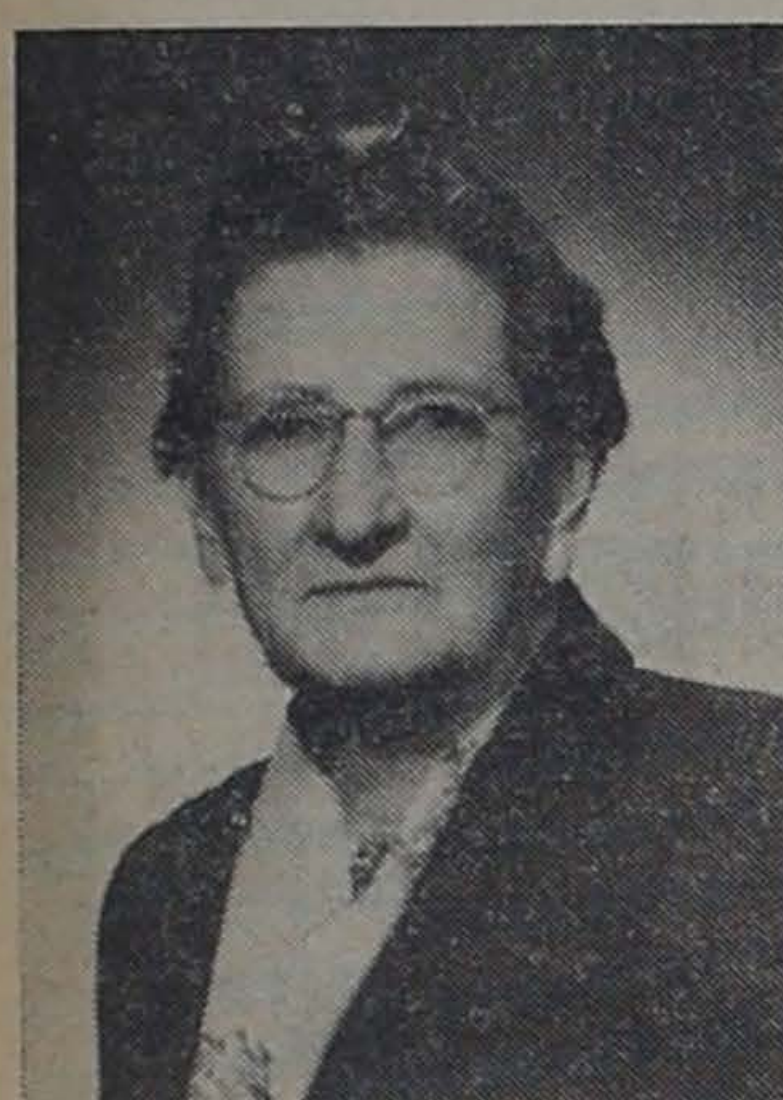


Gifford Grays Celebrate 63rd. Wedding Anniversary Monday, November 14th

On Nov. 14, 1897, Rev. W. R. King joined Mary Linda Pearce and Thomas Gifford Gray in holy wedlock. Throughout the years this couple have worked hand in hand farming and taking an active part in civic and church affairs. They are members of the Baptist Church. Although Mr. Gray has retired from farming he is still active as a buyer of peanuts for the Gorman Peanut Company and is usually the first man on the job every day.

The couple first lived on her father's farm which now belongs to John Browning and Dean Kirk. Later they moved to town where Mr. Gray ran a float hauling supplies. They moved to their present home in 1920.

Mr. Gray, known as Giff to most folk, served as County Commissioner from 1929 to 1936 and people in this precinct still talk about the fine way he handled this office. Mr. Gray also served ten years as City Commissioner and ten years as Trustee on the Gorman School Board.

He was also a member of the School Board in the late Twenties.

The couple have three daughters: Mrs. A. C. Maddock, Denton, Mrs. J. R. Mathews, Corpus Christi, and Mrs. P. C. Lightfoot, Sweetwater; and four grandchildren, James Gray Mathews of Corpus Christi; Mrs. Robert Dickson, Abilene; Mrs. James Gist, Denton, and Mrs. Nelson Smith of Jacksonville, Arkansas.

Humble Football Coverage Set For Thursday & Sat.

The Texas-Texas A&M football game will be broadcast and telecast on Thursday (Thanksgiving Day) by Humble Oil & Refining Co. over WFAA-TV, Channel 8, Dallas starting at 1:15 p. m. (cst). The radio coverage will be broadcast by Kern Tips and Alec Chesser starting at 1:15 p. m. over KRBC, Abilene; WFAA-WBAP-820, Dallas-Ft. Worth; and KSTV, Stephenville.

Telecast of the Army-Navy game and broadcasts of two SWC games will be sponsored Saturday by Humble.

The Army-Navy game will be telecast from Philadelphia beginning at 12:15 p. m. (cst) over WFAA-TV, Dallas and KPAR-TV Sweetwater.

The SMU-TCU game will be broadcast from Dallas by Ves Fox. Radio time will be 1:45 p. m. (cst) over KWKC, Abilene-1340; KERC, Eastland-1590; and KSYD, Wichita Falls-990.

The Baylor-Rice game will be broadcast from Waco by Kern Tips. Radio time will be 1:45 p. m. (cst) over KRBC, Abilene-1470; WFAA-WBAP, Dallas-Ft. Worth-820; KZEE, Weatherford-1220; KWFT, Wichita Falls-820.

When football fans all over Texas tune in to the broadcasts of the 4-A and 3-A quarter-final high school football games next weekend (Dec. 3) they'll probably recognize the announcers.

One will be Kern Tips, one of the nation's top sportscasters, reporting the action in his own inimitable style.

Tips, as well as all the other Humble sportscasters will be bringing the action to radio fans. And this year Humble has purchased exclusive rights for the play-offs of the two top high school leagues from the quarter finals through the finals.

The final 4-A game will be telecast live over a regional network of TV stations with Kern Tips and Alec Chesser describing the action and color.

State Policies Are Adopted By Texas Farm Bureau Conv.

WACO - (Spl) — State policies to guide the Texas Farm Bureau's actions in the 57th Legislature next year were adopted by voting delegates to the organization's annual meeting Nov. 9-12 in Dallas.

Among the more important state-level issues on which policies were set by the convention are farm-to-market road construction, sales taxes, education and farm labor. Recommendations to the American Farm Bureau Federation convention in December on national matters were also adopted by the 678 voting delegates.

Delegates recommended that no changes be made in the present system of allocating funds for farm-to-market road construction. They further stated that present funds now earmarked to build and maintain roads should not be eliminated or diverted.

In the controversial field of taxation, the delegates defeated a proposal for a state sales tax and favored, instead, more economy in government, plus enforced collection of personal property taxes. The TFB is already on record favoring a tax on natural resources.

As for education, the convention favored local control of public schools, especially regarding financing and curriculum. They urged that the youth be taught more about the "true history of our country, our Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and our free enterprise system."

Another major issue at the convention developed over a proposal for a constitutional amendment to permit a compulsory checkoff, by force of government, to finance research and promotion programs of various commodities. The delegates turned it down flatly.

Several important resolutions on labor were approved. One recommends state legislation regulating transportation and housing of migrant agricultural labor. This is intended to pre-empt this field and prevent federal intervention. Another resolution says that the TFB should begin an immediate investigation to determine farmers' rights and what protective measures can be taken against attempts to "force unionization" on farm workers.

In line with this, the convention went on record opposing licensing of crew leaders. The adopted resolution states: "An obvious aim of those who would license crew leaders is the forced and final unionization" of agricultural workers, particularly "stoop labor." The delegates said that "while we defend the right of farm workers to organize and bargain collectively, it must be recognized that extreme fluctuations in weather and in farm commodity prices make it impractical, if not impossible, to impose industrial standards or industrial union wage scales and working conditions upon agriculture."

In other matters, the delegates also:

1. Recommended that pink bollworm regulations, especially in regard to okra harvest for seed, be tightened.
2. Favored the theory of competitive rating in casualty insurance "because we believe in the free enterprise system."
3. Opposed the present merit rating (point) system for casualty insurance.
4. Favored continuation of research for the control and eradication of anthrax, vesicular exanthema, foot and mouth disease, brucellosis, wheat poisoning, cattle grubs, blow fly, sand burn, and also scabies and scrapie in sheep.
5. Recommended that livestock entering state be subjected to strict enforcement of inspection regulations at the state boundary.
6. Recommended that mineral rights separated from the land be registered each year or terminated.
7. Reaffirmed previous policy on dis-annexation of farm land from city limits if utilities have not been provided within a five-year period.
8. Favored the publishing of re-

The show has been held in the above city since its inception except one year when it was held in Ranger, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Doss Alexander, Pioneer, is vice president of the grower group; Ben McKinnis, Eastland, is Secretary-Treasurer. Directors include C. E. Smith, Rising Star; J. W. Sitton, Cisco; W. D. Thurman,

Cisco and C. T. Barton, Rising Star.

Site for the annual show is determined by a vote of the members of the pecan association and those who exhibited entries at the previous years show.

The pecan bake show always held in conjunction with the affair will again be under the direction of the County Home Demonstration Council.

Mrs. Peggy Gallahger, Cisco, will again head a committee to select the county pecan queen. This pecan queen contest has attracted wide attention in the past. WOOD WARPING

Warp is a common term applied to lumber which has changed from its flat form to a bent shape. Thin boards tend to warp more rapidly than thick boards. Frequently, the condition is not the fault of the lumber, but results from improper conditions of use. Properly manufactured and seasoned lumber, when applied in a dry condition and kept dry, will not warp.

Warping can assume several forms. Cupping of lumber describes a condition which resembles a soda-straw cut in half lengthwise. Bowing refers to a lengthwise appearance of lumber which assumes the curved shape of a rocker on a rocking chair. Crook is the same sort of deformation as bow, but in an edgewise direction. Twist is the condition of lumber somewhat like that of a twisted leather strap. Warping often causes wood to tear loose from its fastening.

Warping of lumber can be controlled by treatment with water-repellents, by use of paint or other finishes, and especially through the installation of dry lumber and the maintenance of a suitable moisture content level.

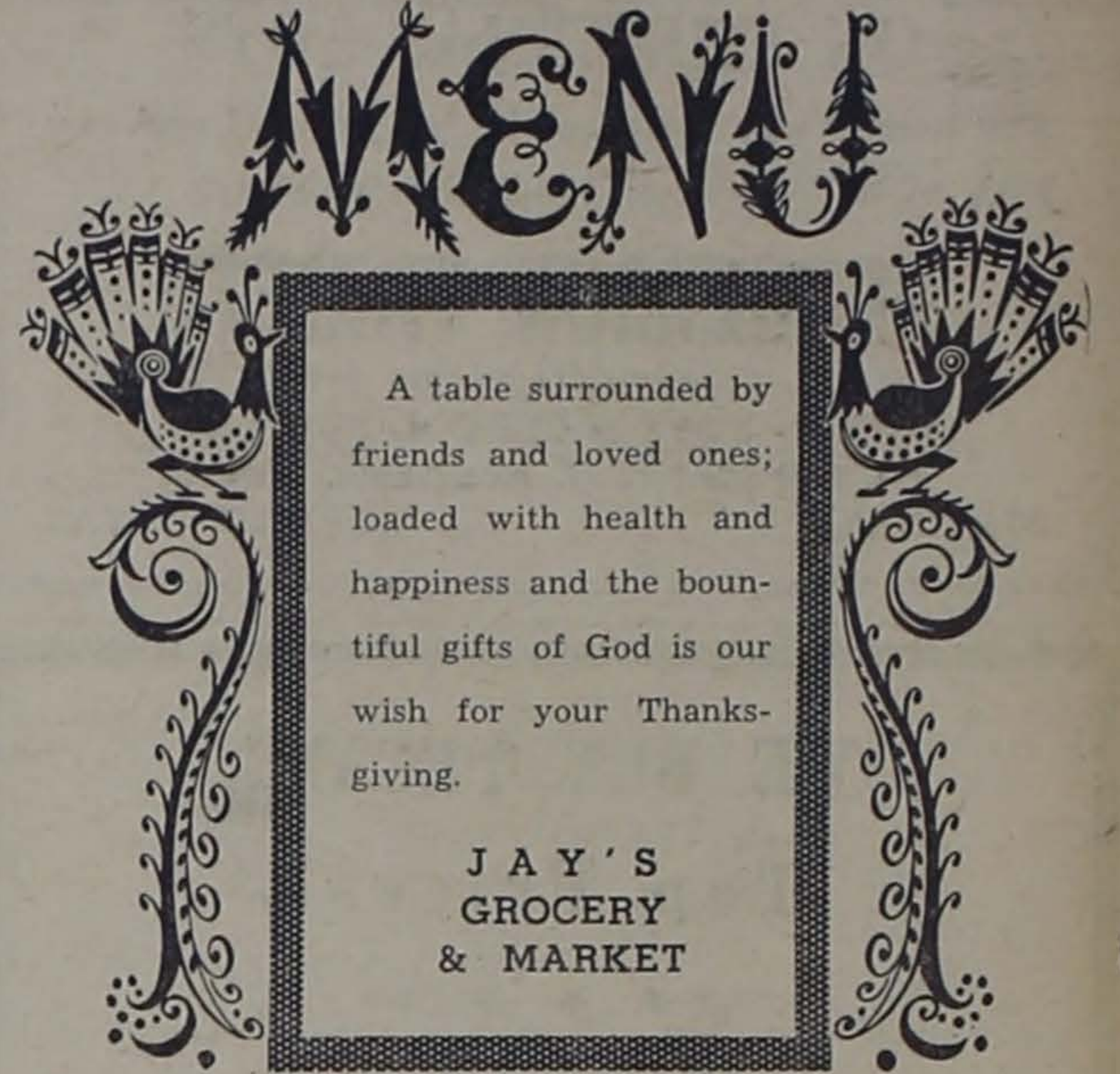

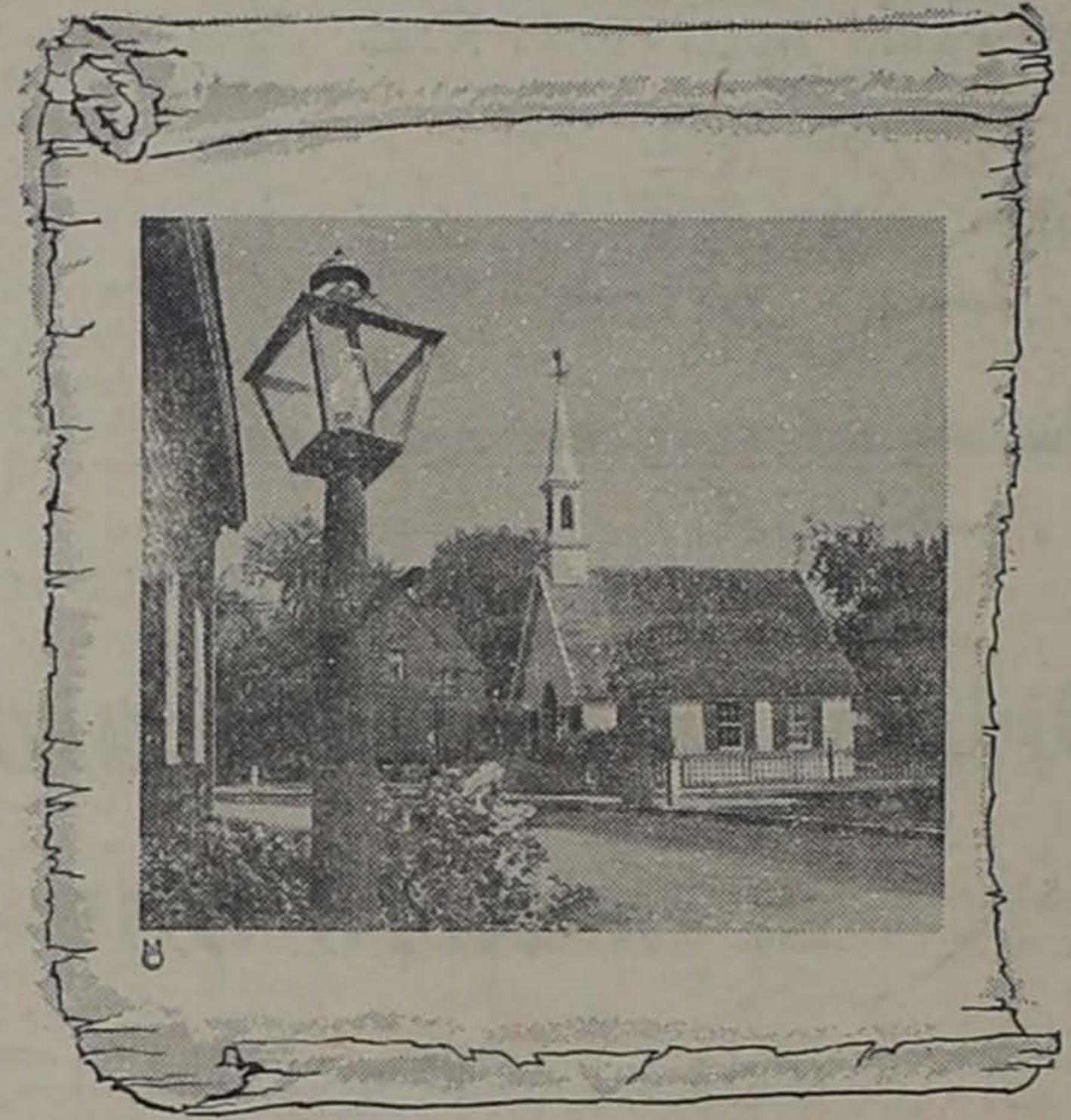

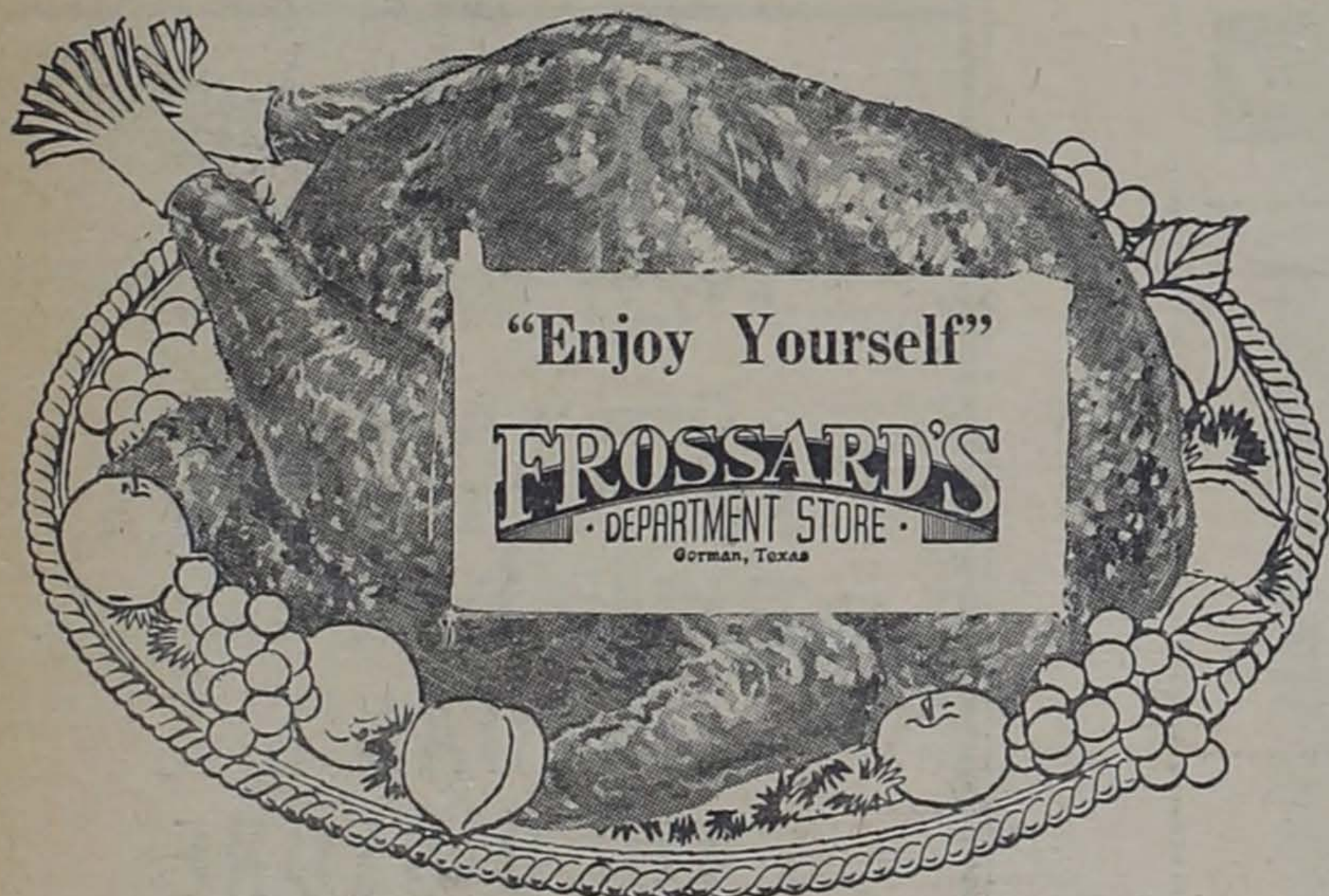
