

muttered, with a flip of his hand. "What is it anyway?" Audrey reached into her purse, pulled out the cigarette lighter and



McCoy points out that any way one looks at it, this country will need a substantial increase in beef cattle numbers in the next two decades. And somebody will es the weight of the evidence is make money out of it. In all likelihood, cyclical ups and downs will continue—in both production and prices. But the beef industry is on more solid footing than most agricultural enterprises in the long pull, McCoy believes.
