

As Time Goes Marching on -

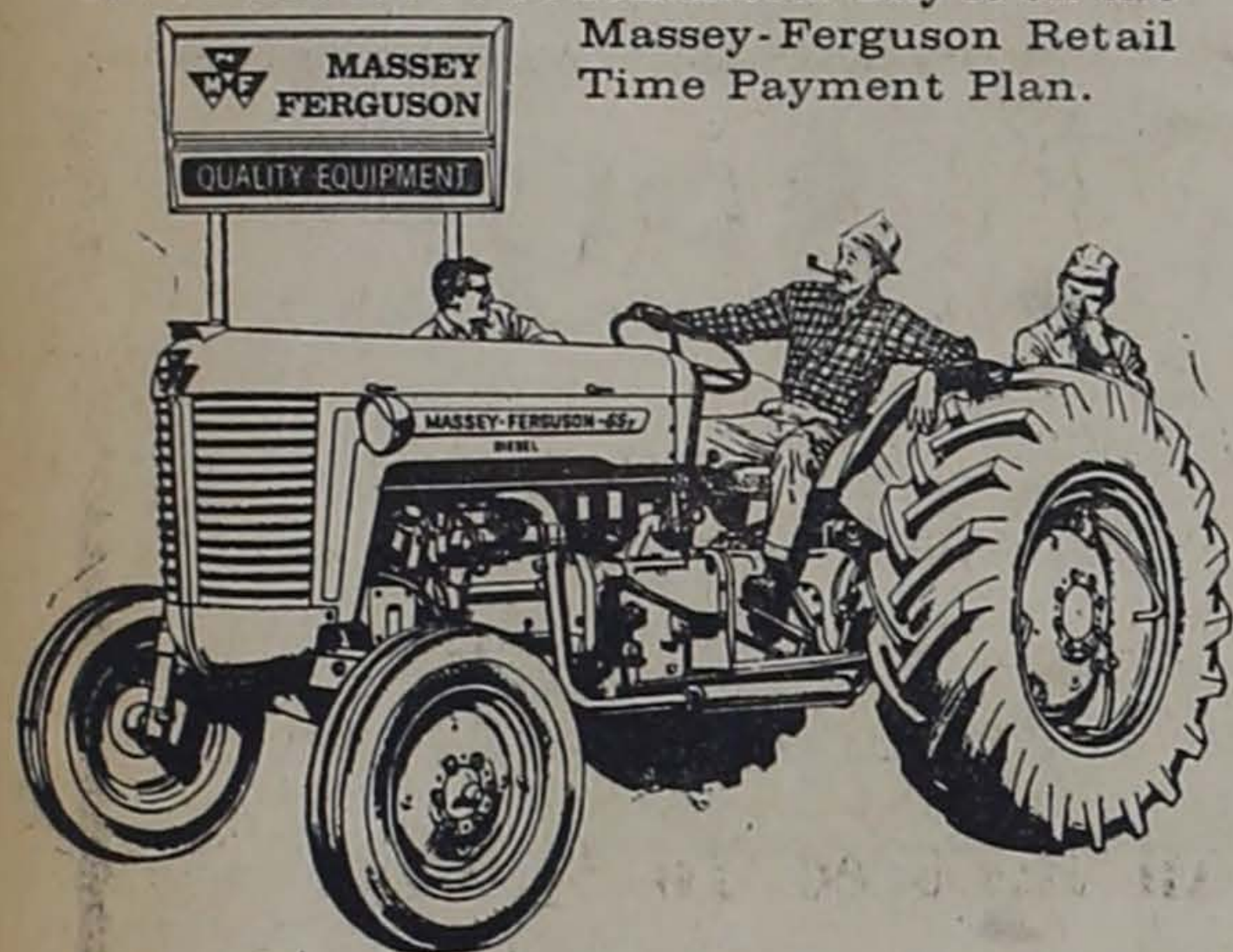

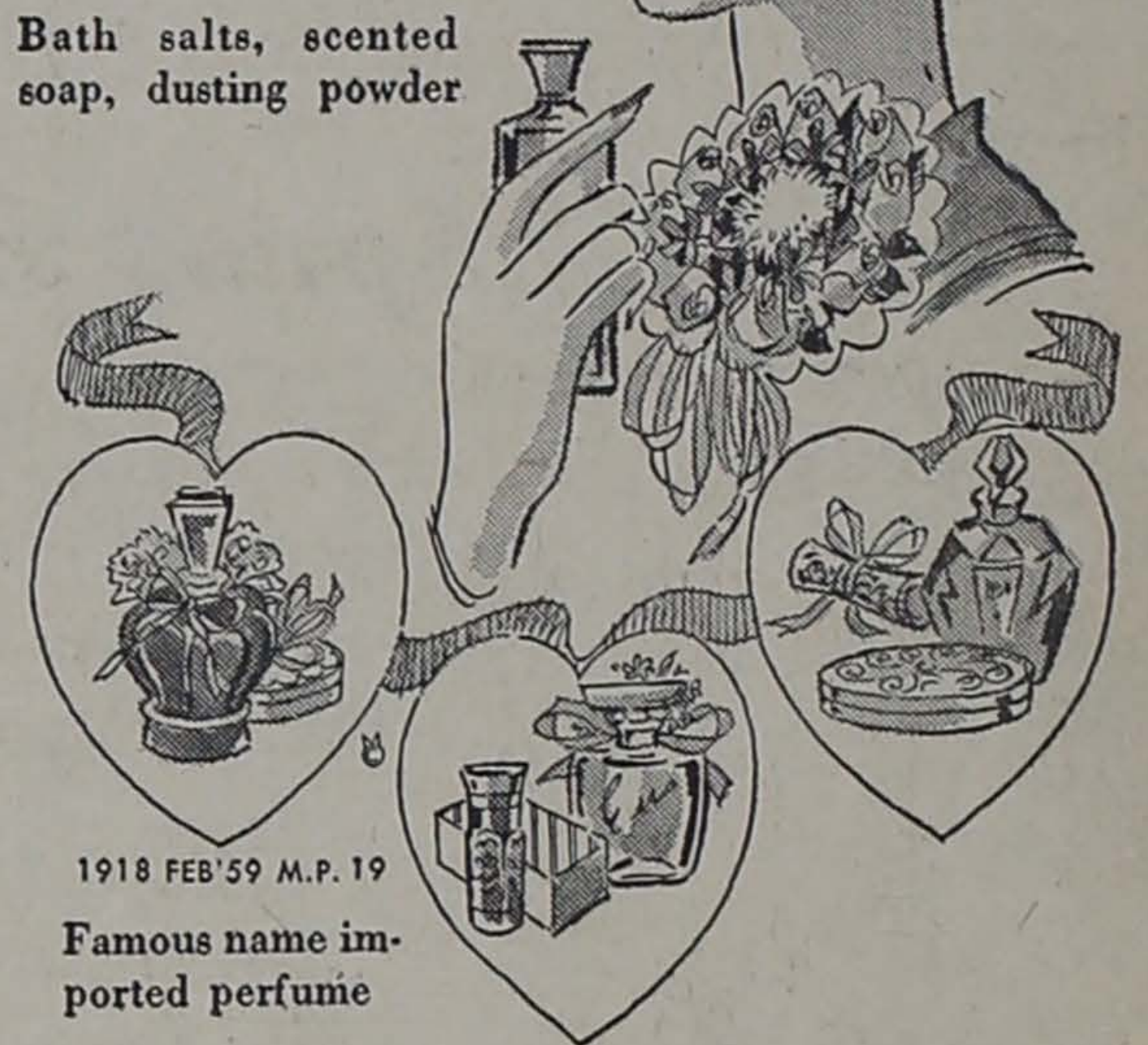

Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Cummins have purchased the E. J. Broom farm on Route 2. Mr. Cummins is from Farmington, N. M.

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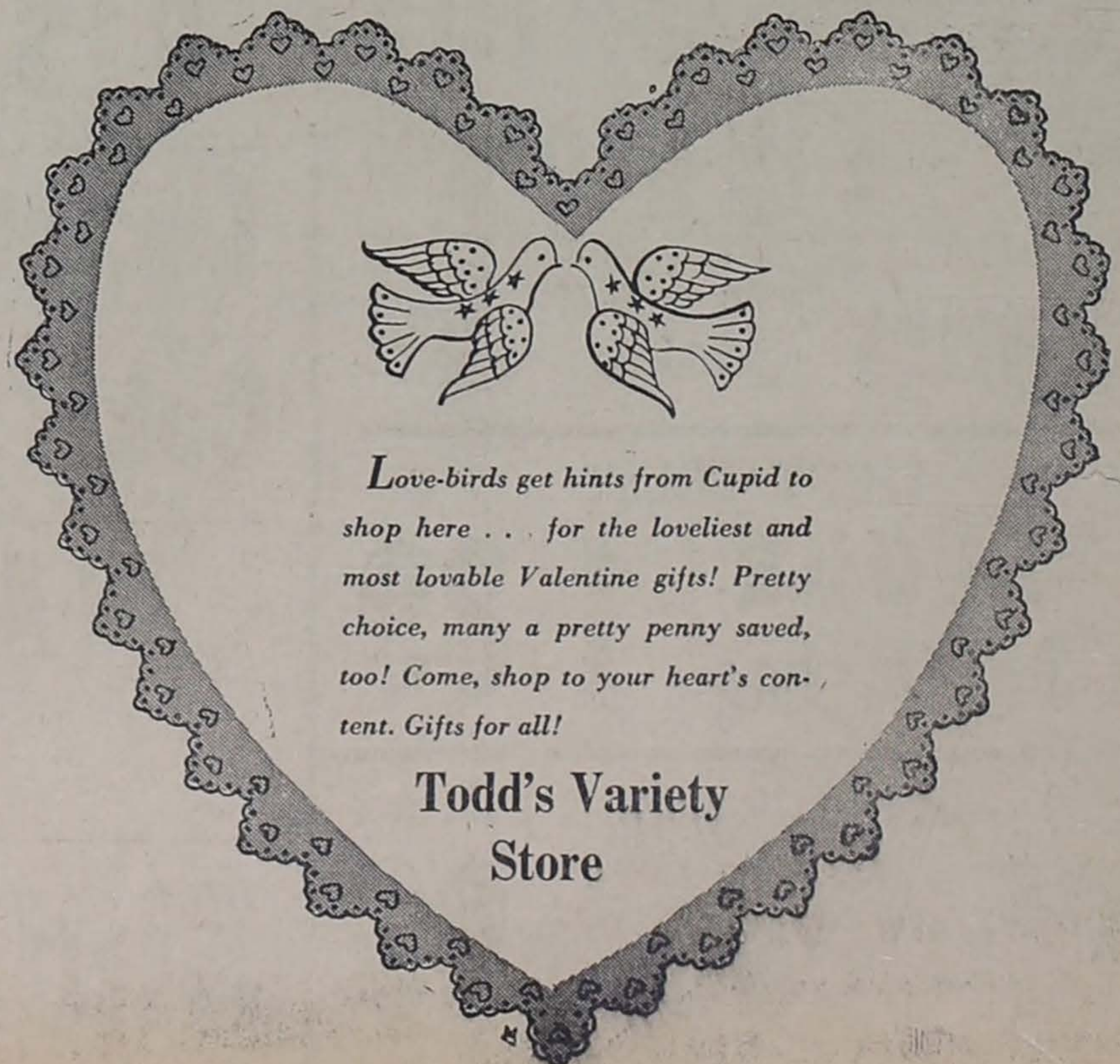

Mrs. W. M. Sims was in Eastland last weekend visiting her sister, Mrs. Curt Williams.



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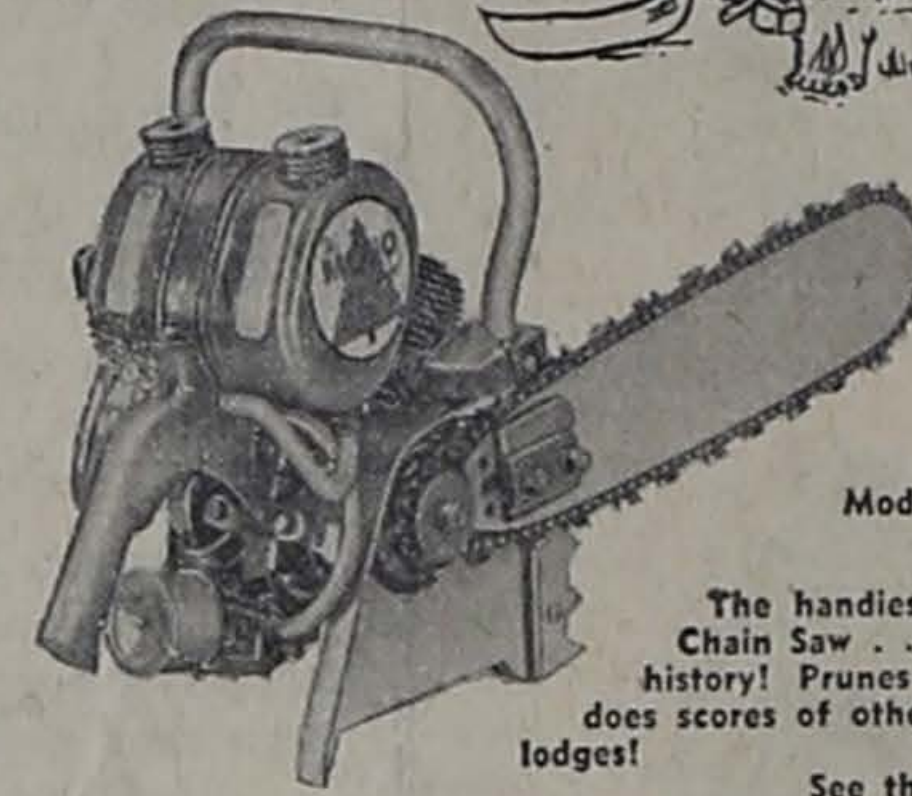
