

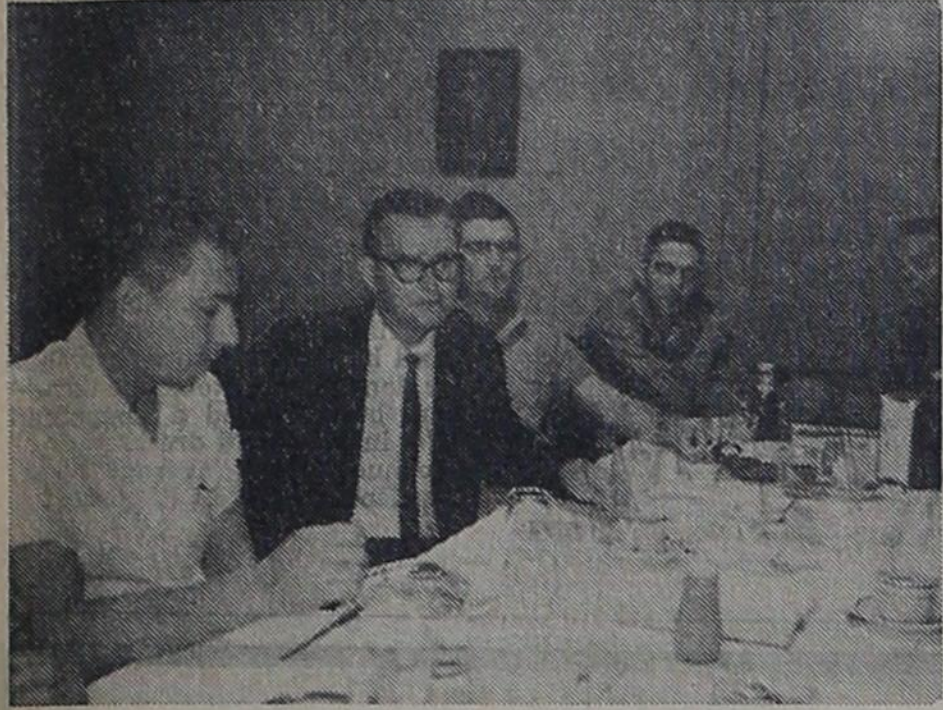

Change In Feed Grain Program

We have received a change in the regulations of the Feed Grain Program. The New Provision permits the Grain Sorghum, harvested, used as forage or silage or grazed to be counted toward setting up a base for the farm. Even though no grain sorghum is sold the farm should have a base established as it could mean considerable money to the producer. The crop years 1959 and 1960 are being used in setting up the base.

If a producer has grown Grain Sorghum for any use or Corn in 1959 or 1960 the acreage should be turned into the County ASC Office by Monday, March 27, 1961.

OVER \$1500 IN PRIZE MONEY AT CO. STOCK SHOW MARCH 24-25

Six hundred and one entries have been received by Keith Mc Donald, General Show Supt., for the Eastland County Livestock Show to be held on Friday and Saturday, March 24th and 25th at Eastland.

The entries include 28 fat steers, 25 breeding beef cattle, 30 dairy cattle, 48 breeding sheep, 50 Angora goats, 219 fat lambs, 148 fat hogs and 63 breeding hogs.

Farmers Urged To Join Farm Bureau

Farmers are currently engaged in a number of crucial Legislative battles, both in Austin and Washington, and the only way they can win is by joining together to gain strength by organization, says Glenn Justice, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. The local county Farm Bureau is staging its annual membership drive.

Farm Bureau is the best means farmers have for effective presentation and defense of their side of issues because it is the only organization which has full time representatives both in Austin and Washington. Through this representation members are kept informed of the progress of favorable legislation and are alerted to possible efforts to pass measures harmful to them.

Current state issues in which farmers have a big stake include the farm-to-market road building program, redistricting of legislative districts, farm labor, taxes and city annexation of farm and ranch properties, according to the Farm Bureau leader.

On the national level, there is a danger of development of farm programs detrimental to agriculture unless farmers succeed in making their position known.

Every farmer and rancher in the county is urged to join the local organization during this membership campaign. The drive ends April 13, 1961.

Over \$1500 in prize money is expected to be paid to the FFA boys and 4-H boys and girls at the show. Ribbons will be awarded winning entries and the grand champions will receive trophies.

There will be a parade in down town Eastland at 2 p. m. on Friday with first, second and third place bands, riding groups and floats winning either trophies or cash prize money.

We are very sorry that we made a misprint last week. We said that the girls were going out for track, but we meant volley ball.

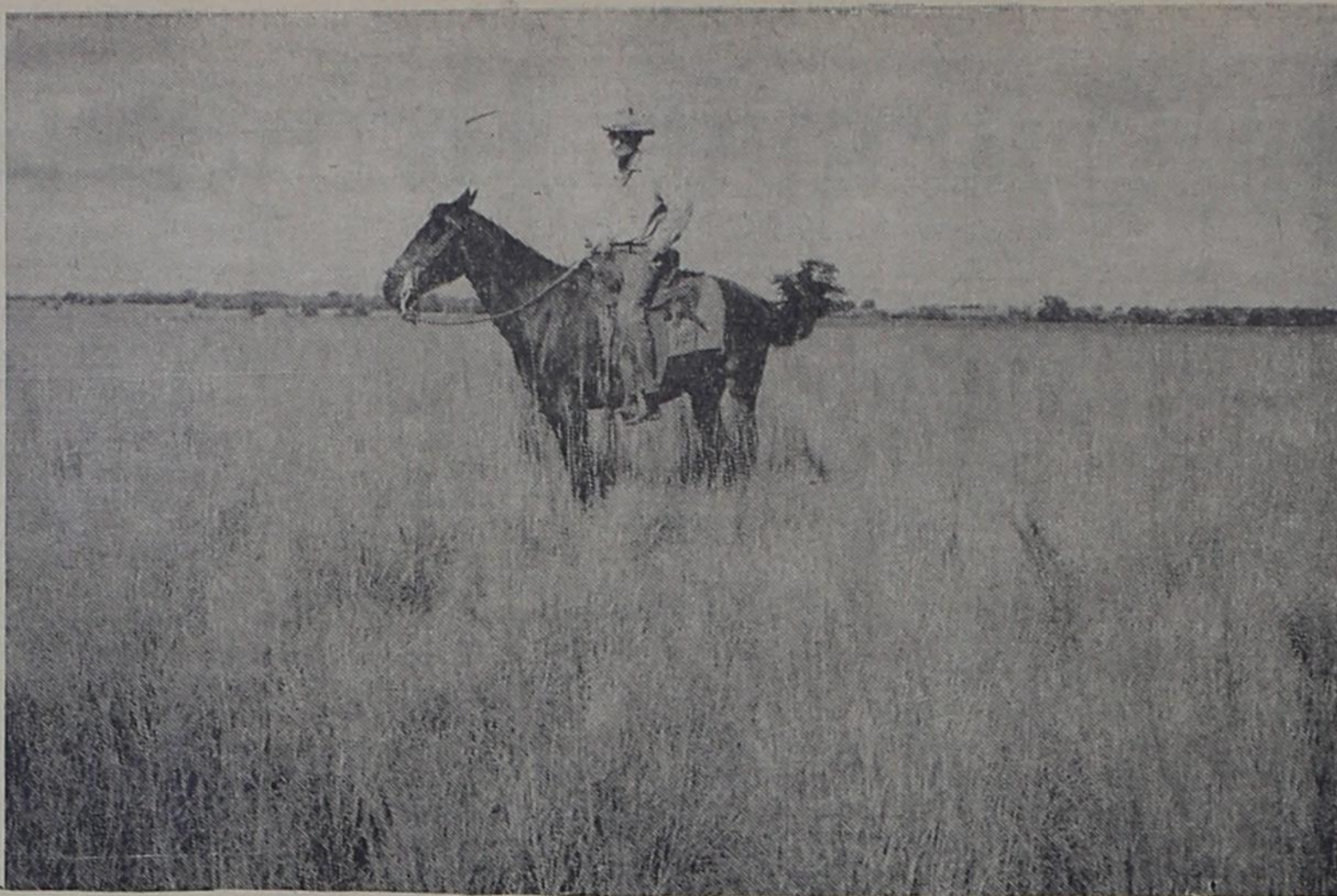
Our sick list for the week was Laverne Scitern.

Grass planting time has arrived. Our good subsoil moisture has made conditions better for grass seeding than they have been in a good many years. Several district cooperators have already seeded grass this year. Seed supplies are generally ample and reasonable in price.

Considerable seeding this year will be on land where mesquite were recently spot grubbed or root plowed. This land invariably needs reseeding after mesquite

control as the better grass species are seldom present on land badly infested with mesquite. Fortunately the soil disturbance from root plowing or grubbing creates a condition favorable for reseeding on at least a portion of the area. Advantage should be taken of this opportunity to add better grasses to the existing stands of grass. Reseeding of this type rangeland without soil disturbance is seldom successful. In this area Side Oats Grama and King Ranch Bluestem have shown especially good results in this type of reseeding operation.

Reseeding of old cropland is a great need in this area. The poor grass usually found on most old fields is a poor investment since much of this land could be producing palatable grass. In reseeding old fields which have become established in annual needle grass or other vegetation seed bed preparation to destroy the existing vegetation is essential. Very few young grass seedlings can survive the competition of annual needle grass. Most successful results are obtained by establishing some type of sorghum dead cover a year previous to seeding. Species with high seedling vigor such as King Ranch Bluestem and Weeping Love Grass can usually be established by direct seeding

after plowing the annual needle grass.

Coastal Bermuda is being sprigged this spring by several cooperators, primarily in waterways. Outstanding results can be obtained with Coastal Bermuda on sandy land, especially on land receiving extra water. Application of nitrogen fertilizer is essential for high production with this grass.

An essential step to the seeding of permanent grass in this area is complete deferment from grazing for one or more growing seasons after planting. Livestock will always select the most succulent, usually the greenest, most nutritious plants. This is invariably the young grass seedlings which are frequently pulled up from their roots by grazing.

Cost sharing for grass seed is available through the local ACP program. The Upper Leon Soil Conservation District has grass seeding equipment available for use of cooperators in this area.

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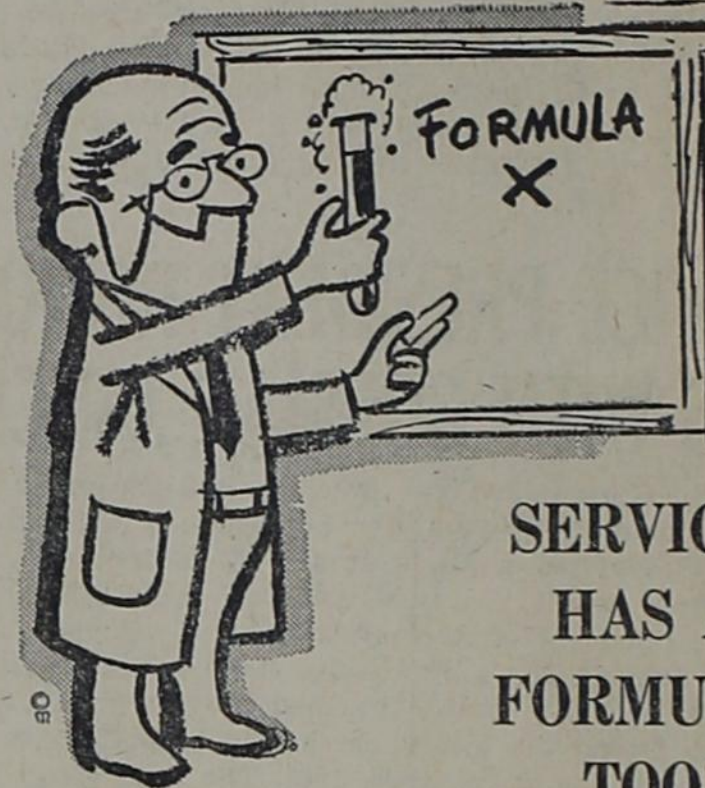

WORKING WITH WOOD

WOOD FLOOR MAINTENANCE IN HOMES

Wooden floors in a home are a mark of distinction and a sign of value. But a wooden floor must be properly maintained in order to retain its beauty. This is neither difficult nor costly. It does require regular inspection and care. Hardwood floors are generally finished to resemble the natural color of the wood. This is accomplished through the use of transparent finishes. There may be varnish, shellac, lacquer or wood sealers. When properly applied, quality finishes of these types will provide many years of service. The durability of these finishes can be improved by keeping them waxed. However, wax should be applied in very thin layers.

A wood floor requires refinishing as soon as any portion of the finish wears thin. Worn spots are more pronounced in areas of heavy usage, such as around door ways. All wax should be thoroughly removed before refinishing floors. Wax can be removed by scrubbing with a cloth moistened in turpentine or other paint thinners. After the floor dries, re-application of the same type of finish originally used can be made.

Only finishes of the same type are compatible. If one wishes to change from a varnish to a shellac or other type finish, the original finish must first be removed by sanding.

Fresh varnish, lacquer or shellac, is difficult to blend with the old coating since a thick layer is built up on the less worn areas. Therefore, one coat is generally applied over the worn area. When it dries, a second coat is added over the entire floor. After repeated maintenance applications, the thickness of these finishes builds up and color differences may become marked. It is then necessary to remove all the old coatings with liquid removers or by sanding. Then a new finish can be applied.

A sealer type floor finish may be refinished by applying fresh sealer to the worn areas. The excess is then wiped off and the retouched area is buffed with steel wool.
