## FINAL RITES FOR CLATIE MILLER ON SATURDAY

Funeral services for Gordon Clatie Miller, 55, who died unexpectedly Thursday afternoon, May 18th at Graham General Hospital after a brief illness, were held at Oliver Springs Church on Saturday, May 20 with Dr. J. H. Wright of Grand Prairie and Rev. A. D. Kyle officiating.

Interment was in Oliver Springs Cemetery.

Miller had worked at his job as linotype operator at The Gorman News during the day. He became ill Thursday afternoon and was taken to the hospital where he died a short time later of a heart attack.

Clatie moved to Gorman with his family from De Leon in 1924. He attended Gorman High and was later associated with the Gorman Progress where he learned the art of printing, excelling in linotype work.

He was married to Thresa Linder in 1929 in Colorado City. He was employed on the Lampasas Leader at the time and they made this place their home for 10 years.

To this union two children were born: a daughter, Sarah Lynn, and one son, Johnny Weldon.

In 1930 Clatie was baptized into the Baptist Church and a member of the W. O. W. Lodge.

He was a Veteran of World War II. Following the war he was employed on the Dallas News, residing in Grand Prairie where he owned his home.

He and his family had resided in Graham for the past three years.

Survivors include his widow; one daughter, Sarah Lynn; one son, Johnny, a student at Graham High School; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Miller; one sister, Mrs. W. L. Garrett; and one brother, Robert Miller, all of Grand Prairie.

## GORMAN HOUSING PROJECT OF 12 UNITS APPROVED BY PHA

Public Housing Commissioner Marie McGuire has announced that the Housing Authority of the City of Gorman, Texas, will shortly sign a financial aid contract with PHA for 12 new low-rent homes to be built under provisions

of the Housing Act of 1959. PHA will execute an annual contributions contract with the Housing Authority providing for the construction of the new homes at an estimated total development cost of \$168,208.

The Housing and Home Finance Agency approved execution of the loan contract as required by law. A workable program for long-range elimination of slums and blight in Gorman had previously been approved, making it eligible to apply for various types of federal assistance in carrying out its civic improvement campaign.

Under the terms of the contract, PHA may lend 90 percent of the total development cost to the Housing Authority. This loan will be repaid with interest by the Authority from the proceeds of the sale of its long-term bonds to private investors. The contract with PHA also provides for annual contributions by the Government to help keep rents within the means of low income families.

## The Power of Memorial Day

by Dr. Norman Vincent Peale

I had the privilege of growing up in small Ohio communities in the early part of this century, and one of my most inspirational memories centers around Memorial Day and the old soldiers of the Civil War.

To me, Memorial Day was one of the most moving of all the national holidays. I was stirred by the speeches and martial music from the bandstand or cemetery on what we called "Decoration Day." There was something about the newness of life that the Spring had brought; soft sunshine falling on the fresh green grass of early summer, the misty hills in the distance, the sound of stirring national songs, and above all, the softly flapping flag in the gentle breeze as the speaker told us of our country, the deep devotion of its heroes, and recounted once more the stirring episodes of our heroic past.

And many a lazy summer afternoon, I sat on the coping around the old courthouse listening to the veterans of the Civil War tell of their experiences in the epic struggle between the States. A boy's imagination quickly sent him off behind long columns of blue or grey, and to him, such names as Antietam, The Wilderness, Shiloh, and Gettysburg became very real and meaningful.

Those old soldiers used to talk gratefully of Lincoln's insistence that those who had borne the heat of the battle and the burden of the struggle, the widow and the orphan, were to be given not charity, but their rightful due as the dependents of those brave men who had fought to preserve liberty and to keep the Union intact. It was regarded as a sacred duty of the nation, and the nation kept faith with its veterans.

In those days, as now, were many who had been disabled by the struggle. Their ability to compete in life had been reduced by wounds suffered in battle. Even as a boy I remember hearing how it seemed they were thought of only on such days as Memorial Day, when orators, fervent in their patriotism, remembered, if only for a day, the long continuing sacrifice made not by those who had died in battle, but by the disabled who were to live for many years following the great struggle.

The heroes of World War I and World War II and the Korean War are, of course, men who, with no concern for themselves, gave their lives that freedom might live. We can never do them adequate honor. And, we must never forget them. They died in their young life, forsaking the opportunities of the years that the rest of us might live and develop our highest hopes and dreams.

However, there are other living heroes who deprived themselves of either physical, emotional, or mental health for us and for their fellow countrymen. It would be as wrong for us to neglect or forget them as their buddies who today sleep on some Pacific Island or in a European cemetery. A hero dead or a hero maimed and disabled are both due our equal gratitude and our unceasing devotion.

We must never forget that the most effective way of honoring those who have died is to remember the living disabled, that their lives may be rich and full. They are a great asset to our country as the living embodiment of devotion to freedom. A country is recreant indeed which does not everlastingly keep alive grateful appreciation to those who suffered disability to perpetuate everything that we Americans hold dear.

There could be no better time than on Memorial Day to resolve that we shall gratefully support the honored men and women who have suffered disability from the wars of the United States.

The reunion will include an assembly in the high school auditorium, luncheon and the monument dedication, with Rev. Earl Lightfoot of De Leon speaking.

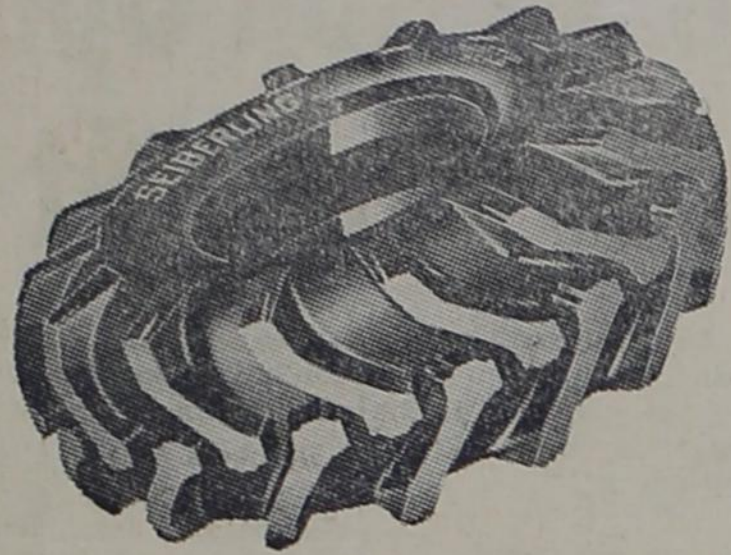

**Tips on Touring**

**Bits and Pieces**

Throughout the year, I receive many excellent safety and travel tips from my readers and women I've met during a lecture tour. Here are a few of their choice bits of advice:

If you leave your car outside on cold winter nights, park it with the engine away from the wind. Leave the car in gear (or "park" for automatic transmissions), with the handbrake off, to avoid freezing.

For daytime driving on snow-covered or icy roads, wear sunglasses.

Contrary to what you may think, rising temperatures make icy roads more slippery. With regular tires, a car going 20 miles an hour on glare ice needs 114 feet to stop when the temperature is 0° F. The same car, when the temperature is 30°, needs 235 feet. Best bet: reinforced tire chains. They stop the 20 mph car in about 77 feet, regardless of temperature. So says an expert from the National Safety Council.

On your next trip, use duffel bags to replace extra suitcases. Duffel bags can be crammed into trunk compartment spaces where more rigid luggage would not fit. And they make good laundry bags for soiled clothing.

When you stop the car with the engine running, shift into neutral — so nothing will happen if the driver, or passenger, accidentally steps on the accelerator. This is especially important when you take on, or let off, a passenger.

Be careful if driving with dangling bracelets or full, deep sleeves. They can catch on selector lever or blinker signal arm.

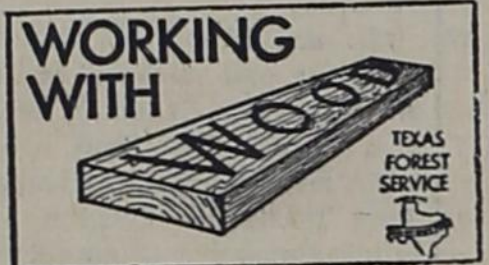

**Wood Weathers The Storm**

The expression "as stout as a tree" suggests basic physical strength. From it, we visualize a secure foundation and powerful resistance to the forces of the elements. The same is true of lumber, the structural product of the tree.

When building a home of wood, we do not ordinarily associate the lumber with the strength of a tree. Yet, proper construction with wood will provide a home more resistant to the ravages of hurricane-like forces than is possible with other costlier materials.

Storm wind velocities of over 120 miles per hour can occur in most areas of our country. Such construction, with a uniformly distributed lateral supporting weight of about 25 pounds per square foot, throughout the building, will withstand heavy horizontal wind forces and powerful uplifts and down drafts. Weight alone will not hold down a house.

The resiliency of wood imparts the necessary flexibility to properly built frame structures. Wood helps resist the shock and stress of hurricane forces. This is not possible under other forms of construction.

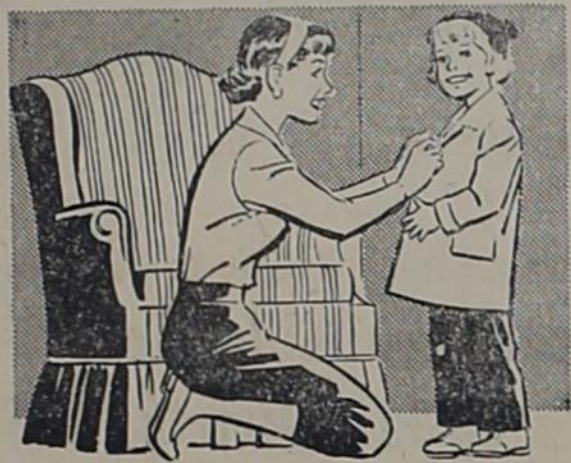
