The usual street parade will open the festival and every business, club, or community has an invitation to enter this parade. There is no entrance fee and chances of winning a prize are good.

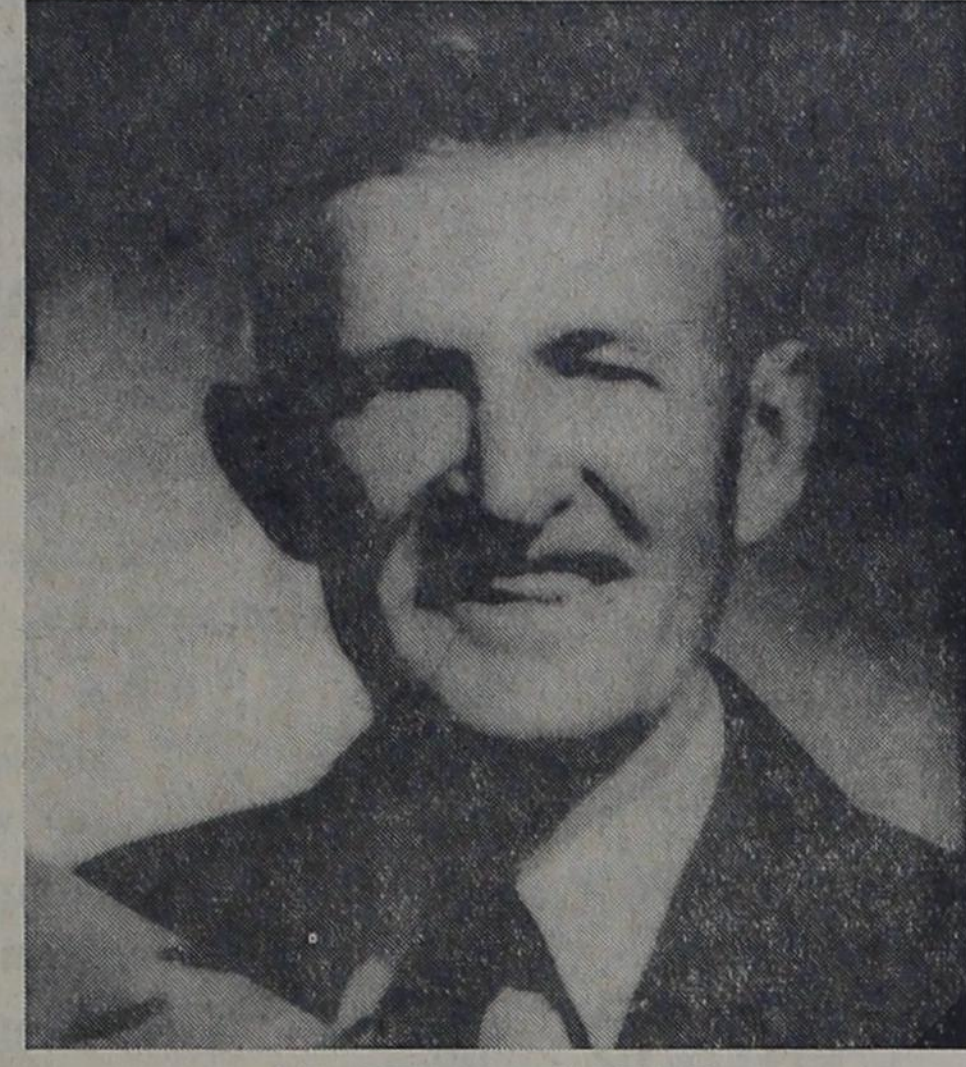

Funeral services for Mr. Ben R. Burdette, 73, were held Sunday, July 2 at 2:30 p. m. in the First Baptist Church of Gorman with Rev. A. D. Kyle and Rev. Don Turner of Cross Plains officiating. Interment was in the New Dublin Cemetery.

Mr. Burdette suffered a heart attack early Wednesday morning, June 28, and died at 6:30 a. m. in the Blackwell Hospital.

Mr. Burdette, a native of Meridian, Texas, moved to Dublin in 1903. He attended and graduated from the Dublin High School. He was a quarterback on the Lions football team and was an outstanding baseball player.

His baseball ability won him a scholarship from Daniel Baker College of Brownwood. Ben studied pharmacy for two years at Daniel Baker and upon completing two years there was employed by Overton Drug Store in Dublin to fill prescriptions.

Oakland Cemetery Road Fund Rises

The Oakland Cemetery Road Committee, composed of W. E. Dennis and Ira Tom Frasier of De Leon, and Davis Smith, E. E. Rachel, R. C. Dennis and E. L. Curb of Gorman, wish to thank each of you who have contributed to this fund.

Comanche County Commissioner for Precinct Four informed the members of the Oakland Cemetery Association at the time of their regular meeting last spring (May 6, 1961) that he did not have the money to build an all-weather road from Oakland Cemetery to a conveniently located Farm-To-Market Road. It became necessary then that we raise money by private subscriptions to supplement the available country road fund to assure the construction of an all-weather road to the cemetery.

To date we have on deposit in a local bank \$889.50 which will be used to pay for materials that are needed in building concrete dips, bridges, and/or other road materials. As to the exact location of this all-weather road, that privilege was reserved by the Comanche County Commissioner's Court. Likely locations for the road are East from the cemetery to a FM Road or South from the cemetery to intersect with a FM Road.
