SCOTT BAILEY SCHOOL BILL INTRODUCED

Representative Scott Bailey of Cisco introduced his Budget Balance School Bill shortly after the convening of the first called session. The Budget Balanced Bill, Bailey stated, is an economy measure and in keeping with the Governor's call for the first called session.

The Budget Balanced Bill was explained as follows: Under the present laws, the revenues are placed in the State Available School Fund by both Constitutional and Statutory provisions. These funds are distributed to the schools of the state as the per capita apportionment provided by law. The plan of financing the Foundation School Program calls for charging the Foundation School Program cost in each district with the amount of the Available School Fund that has been allocated to the District.

In this process, approximately \$1,475,000 from the Available School Fund is paid annually to districts that show a budget balance, which, because of adequacy of local revenues, have no need to participate in the Foundation Program funds. Therefore, these monies do not contribute to the financing of the Foundation School Program.

The effect of the Budget Balanced Bill would be to reallocate these monies to the Foundation School Program Fund, which are presently allocated to the State Available School Fund by Statutory provision.

Bailey maintained that the enactment of this bill would make about \$500,000 annually available for the use of the smaller school districts, which are financially in need of help.

DE LEON CITY COMMISSION OPPOSES CREATION OF HOSPITAL DISTRICT

The De Leon City Commission is composed of W. B. Nowlin, Mayor, R. V. Bond, Charles Morgan and Clyde Brinson.

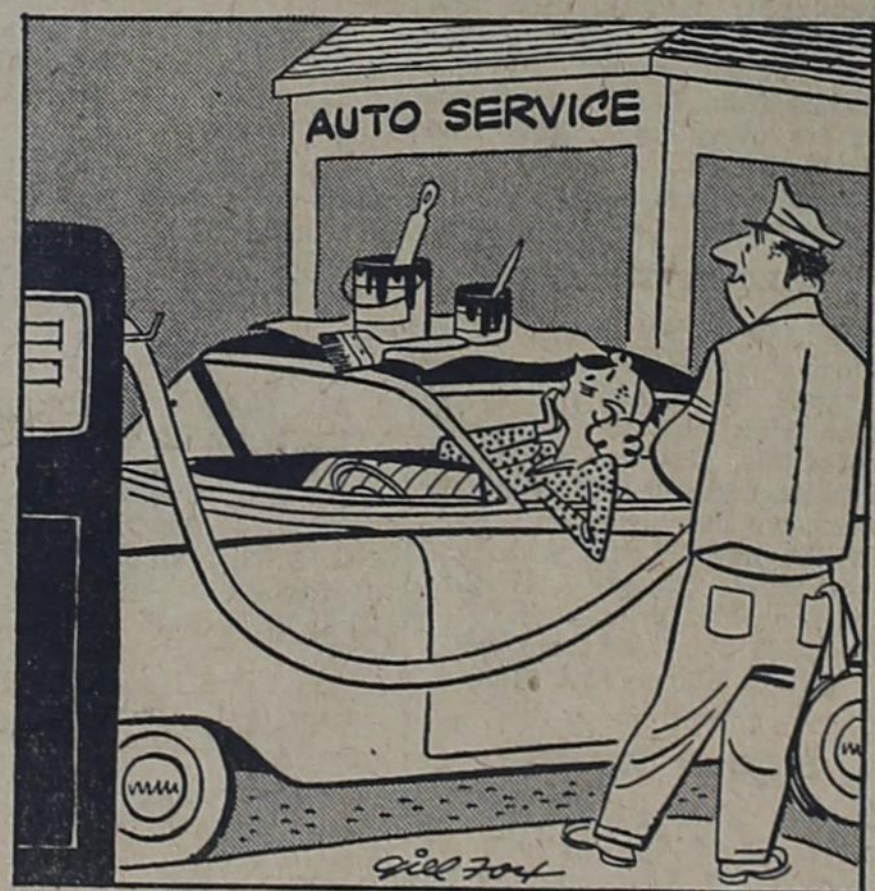

WOOD PLASTICS

The use and value of plastics in our daily lives is growing rapidly. Few of us realize the part that dissolved wood plays in providing the cellulose raw material from which many plastics are made. Some of the more familiar products include cellophane, photographic film, rayon, artificial sponges and meat casings.
The application of wood for producing plastics may be likened to the process by which metals are liquified and then molded or otherwise fabricated into countless shapes, sizes and products. The convention of wood into plastic materials enhances wood's utility and overcomes its size and shape limitations.

To obtain the pure cellulose needed for these products, wood is chemically treated with a weak acid or an alkali. This process dissolves out most of the non-cellulosic materials. The remaining fibrous mass of cellulose is known as pulp. This wood pulp is further refined and the resulting pure cellulose is liquified.

In the production of rayon, the viscous cellulose is forced through tiny perforations in a spinneret which is immersed in a hardening acid solution. A filament of pure solidified cellulose, known as rayon, is produced from each hole of the spinneret. The filaments are then twisted into thread to produce the material used for much of our clothing.

In the manufacture of cellophane, the viscous cellulose is forced through long slits, rather than holes as for rayon. The solidified sheets are then squeezed between rollers in a continuous operation. This film can be dyed to any desired color and rendered moisture proof for wrapping and other similar products.
