1961 BAG REQUIREMENTS STRESSED

All peanut growers are asked to take special note of bag specifications as set out under the 1961 peanut price support program. Growers should place emphasis upon the use of bags which are thoroughly clean. It is not necessary that new bags be used. However, it is required that the bags be clean - free from residues, filth and noticeable stains. It is also specified that the bags be sound, free from holes and uniform in size with approximately 2 bushel capacities. Bags are to be made of material weighing not less than 7 1/2 ounces nor more than 10 ounces per yard. This means that mesh or net bags are not acceptable because open weave type bags do not adequately protect the peanuts from insects and rodents.

Because of increased demands upon the industry to improve storage methods, growers are requested to assume their share of responsibility. A very vital part of this responsibility is the use of good bags in marketing the crop. The bag requirements described in the preceding paragraphs will be a part of the storage contract between warehousemen and the Association. This is only one part of the storage contract aimed at insuring desirable storage conditions, but this particular requirement is the one which calls for the cooperation of all growers. In order to be sure that peanuts are eligible at marketing time the grower should devote as much attention to the eligibility of his bags as he does to moisture, foreign material and damage in the peanuts. It is hoped that all peanut growers can see the importance of marketing the most desirable product possible in a clean, sound package.

FACTS ABOUT FALLOUT PROTECTION

Fallout is tiny pieces of dust and debris, which are made radioactive by nuclear explosions. When a hydrogen bomb is exploded close to the ground, thousands of tons of these tiny particles of dust and debris are sucked upward high into the air. They help form the mushroom cloud which is always seen with one of these explosions. Some of this radioactive matter spills out of the cloud near the explosion. Most of it is carried by the wind for many miles. Eventually it settles to earth. It is called fallout and continues to give off radioactivity until it decays.

Fallout could settle anywhere. Winds could carry it to every part of the country. But if you are exposed to much of it long enough, it can make you seriously ill, even if the radioactive particles do not settle on you. A mass of material between you and the particles, is needed for protection. Weather and radiological experts will estimate the path and speed of fallout after an attack. They will tell you how much time you have to protect yourself. If you don't get the word, play it safe. Seek the best available shelter if there has been a nuclear attack.

The best protection is an underground shelter with at least three feet of earth or sand above it. Two feet of concrete will give the same protection. If the shelter has an adequate door and an air filter, it will give you almost complete protection.

An ordinary house without basement probably would cut the radiation in half, if you stay on the first floor near the center of the house. Remember, the more dense material you put between yourself and the fallout, the better protected you are. This can be earth, sand, or other material. In a pinch, it can be stacks of books, magazines, newspapers or filing cabinets.

Fallout will sift into your house or shelter like dust. Stop up the doors and windows tightly. If you think you have been in a fallout area, wash yourself and your clothes thoroughly. If you can't wash your clothes and dispose of the water, leave your clothes outside.

Remember, your chance to live through an atomic attack depends on you. All places, no matter how small, is subject to radioactive fallout. You are the one to decide whether you want to start now preparing a fallout shelter for you and your family.

Farmers To Give Peanuts For CROP Program

CROP is a way for Texans to show their Christian concern for the hungry people of the world.

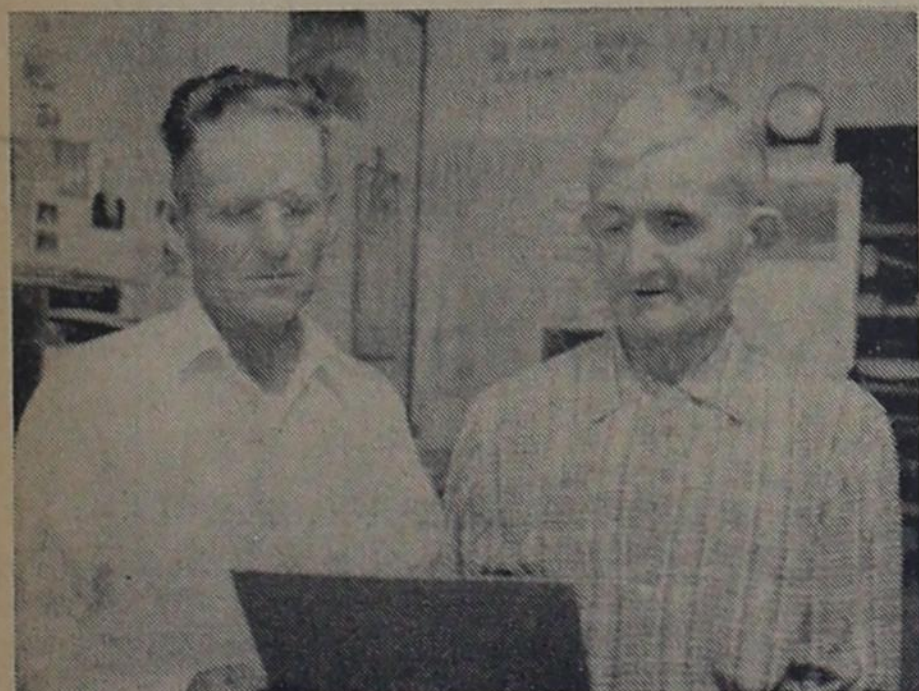

THE BOARD FOOT

One of the chores of our school days was the learning of various units of measurement. This sometimes difficult task, it was explained, was necessary to prepare us for the problems of daily living.

Can you visualize the confusion which would result if we had no standard means of measuring time and distance, large and small, or the weights and volumes of solid, liquid and gaseous materials? Most of us are well acquainted with such common units as inches, miles, ounces, gallons, pounds, tons, acres, and cubic feet. However, because of the nature of some products or the custom imposed by years of use, other specialized units of measure are also employed. One of these units is the board foot.

The board foot unit is used for measuring lumber quantities, particularly for 3-inch sizes and wider. Narrower widths are measured in lineal or running feet. Board feet take into consideration the length, width and thickness of boards. A board feet represents a piece of lumber 1 foot long, 12 inches wide and 1 inch thick. When multiplied together, a factor of 12 is obtained. Thus, if a piece of lumber is measured in feet for length, and in inches for width and thickness, and these dimensions are then multiplied together, the board foot volume can be determined simply by dividing the product by 12. For example, a board 6 feet long, 4 inches wide and 1 inch thick has 2 board feet. Another board 14 feet long, 8 inches wide and 2 inches thick has 18 2/3 board feet.

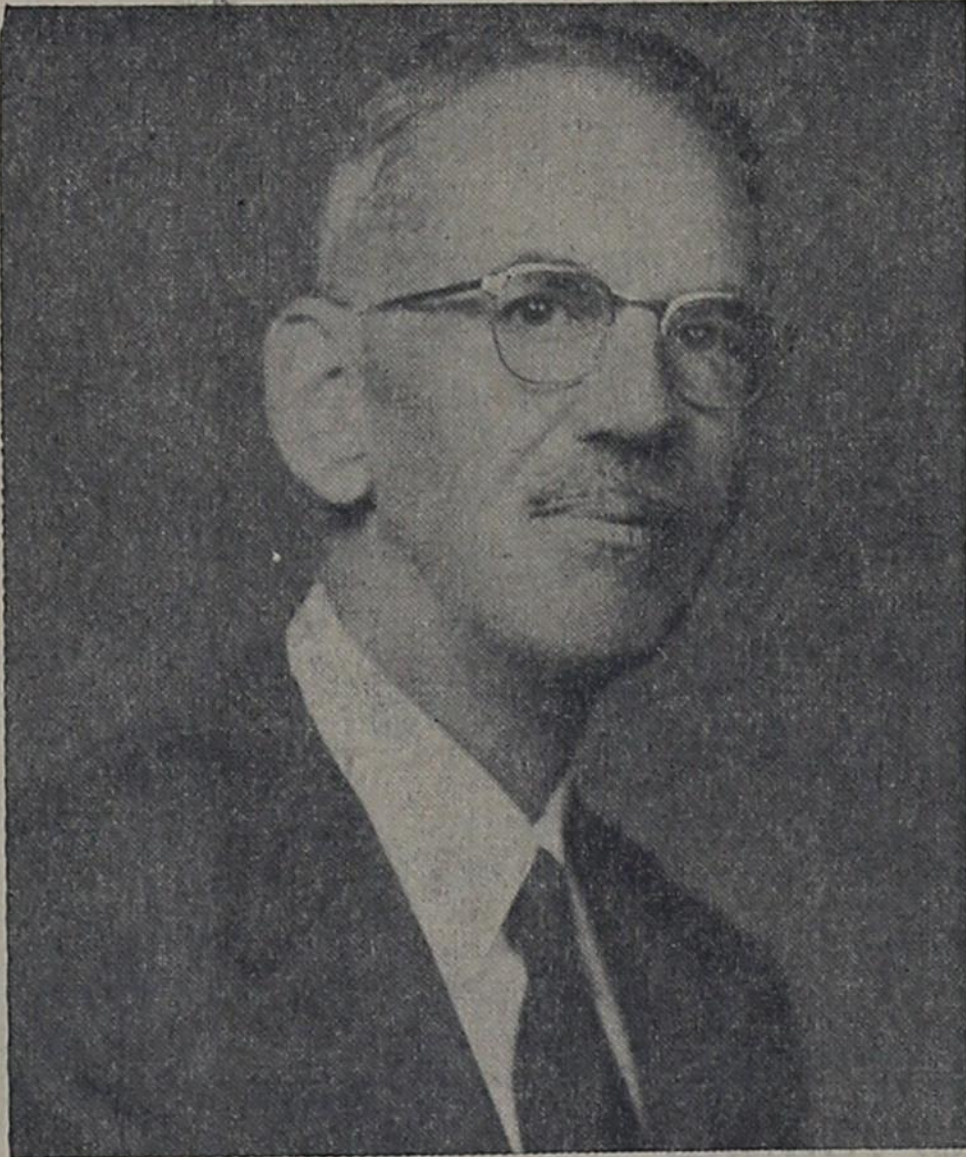

\$100 Million Increase Possible For Texas Farmers

Many Texas farmers can increase significantly their net income by utilizing more fully presently known technology, according to Director John E. Hutchison of the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He said that farm families could increase their annual net income at least \$100 million by using the most advanced technological and management practices. Hutchison's statement followed an evaluation of first-year results in Extension's intensified soil fertility program which was launched early in 1960.

Initially, 12 counties represent-

ing different major land resource areas were selected to participate in the pilot project. They included 4 counties on the High Plains, 3 on the Coast Prairie and 5 in Northeast Texas where both Blackland and sandyland were involved. Emphasis was given to crop production practices important to those areas. These included the use of fertilizer based on soil tests, planting the best varieties of crops, effective insect and disease control, appropriate soil and water conservation measures and other practices based on the best research information available.

Results were obtained by comparing net profits from crops grown under advanced technological methods with income from carefully controlled check plots where usual farming practices were employed. Increased net income reported ranged from \$1.86 per acre to \$52.07 per acre. In one county, Red River, 47 demonstrations indicated that net income of the county could be increased \$2.9 million if all farmers followed recommended practices.

"If results in the 12 pilot counties are indicative of what can be accomplished on a state-wide basis, it means a potential equivalent to an important new industry in each Texas county," Hutchison said.

The immediate success of the pilot project already has prompted 17 additional counties to initiate an intensified soil fertility program and many others are making plans to follow suit. "The key to the success of this venture was the active participation of local people under the direction of County Program Building Committees," Hutchison emphasized. In each county, local agricultural and civic leaders assisted the county extension staff in carrying out the program. USDA personnel and soil conservation district supervisors also played an active role.

Carl Eschenburg, Jr., Floresville Peanut Festival Chairman for 1961, has announced that this year's festivities will be held September 22 and 23. Mr. Eschenburg formerly served 3 years as parade chairman, building the parade to its present maximum participation.

Miss Judy Sheehy has been selected as Queen of the Festival. She is a spring graduate of Floresville High School, and will enter Lamar State College at Beaumont this fall.

Parade Chairman, Earnest Fannin, stated that the initial planning committee expects this year's parade to be bigger and better than ever.

Publicity Chairman Sam Fore, Jr., Editor of the Floresville Chronicle-Journal, points out that John B. Connally, present U. S. Secretary of the Navy, served as escort for the queen of the first Floresville festival held in 1938.

Festival Chairman Carl Eschenburg, Jr., is well known in South Texas agricultural circles. He is the John Deere Dealer in Floresville and is associated with his mother in the operation of a ranch in Atascosa County and farms in Wilson County.

CHECK STATIONS FOR DEER KILL ARE DISCONTINUED

AUSTIN — Deer checking stations generally over the state will be discontinued during the next hunting season. This has been announced by H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Last year a full-scale deer check station was maintained at Llano, and others in Northeast Texas.

They were manned by biologists seeking information about the age and other characteristics of the deer killed. These check stations also established the number of deer taken, both in does and bucks and the number of hunters who took them.

Maintaining the check stations is expensive to the Commission. Also, in many instances, it has meant the hunters had to go out of the way to check their kill.

"The results, however, were most helpful and helped us to establish biological information necessary to our research work," the director said.

BIG ELECTRIC "TIE-LINE" TO BE POWER-ful PARTNER IN PROGRESS

Customers of the Texas Electric Service Company power system will benefit by construction of a strong electric power "tie-line", which will extend from the Permian Basin area through the Fort Worth-Dallas area and to Houston. This will bring about one of the nation's largest and strongest reservoirs of power.

The new "tie-line"—a 345,000-volt transmission line nearly 800 miles long and six times greater in electric power capacity than any other line now operating in the Southwest—is to tie together more firmly the power systems of Texas Electric Service Company, Houston Lighting and Power Company, Dallas Power and Light Company, and Texas Power and Light Company.

Added efficiency and economy of operation will be possible for each of the companies when the line is completed, and it will mean that, in the event of

an emergency in any of the four utility systems, much larger blocks of power will be available from the other areas than through present interconnections.

Texas Electric now is building its part of the line from Fort Worth to the Permian Basin area in West Texas. It will be part of the company's integrated power system and operated initially at 138,000 volts.

The section of the "tie-line" from Houston to the Fort Worth-Dallas area will be started in 1962 and will be pushed to early completion.

This new transmission "tie-line" is another example of planning and building ahead to assure plenty of dependable, low-cost electric power for continued progress of the more than 100 cities, towns and rural communities served by the power system of Texas Electric in The Opportunity Frontier of Texas.

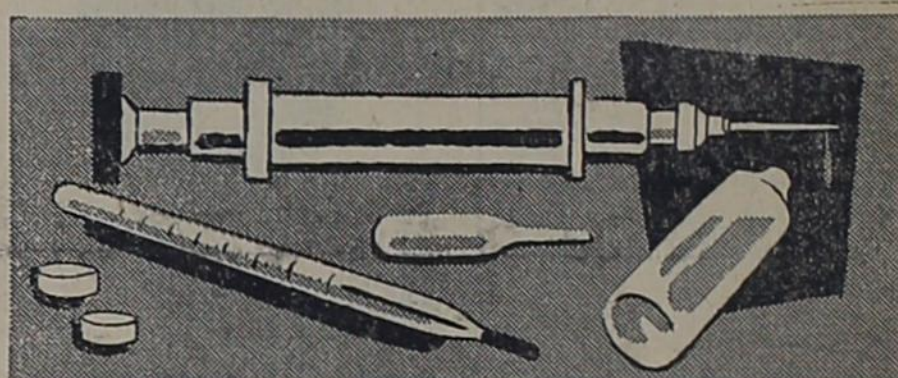

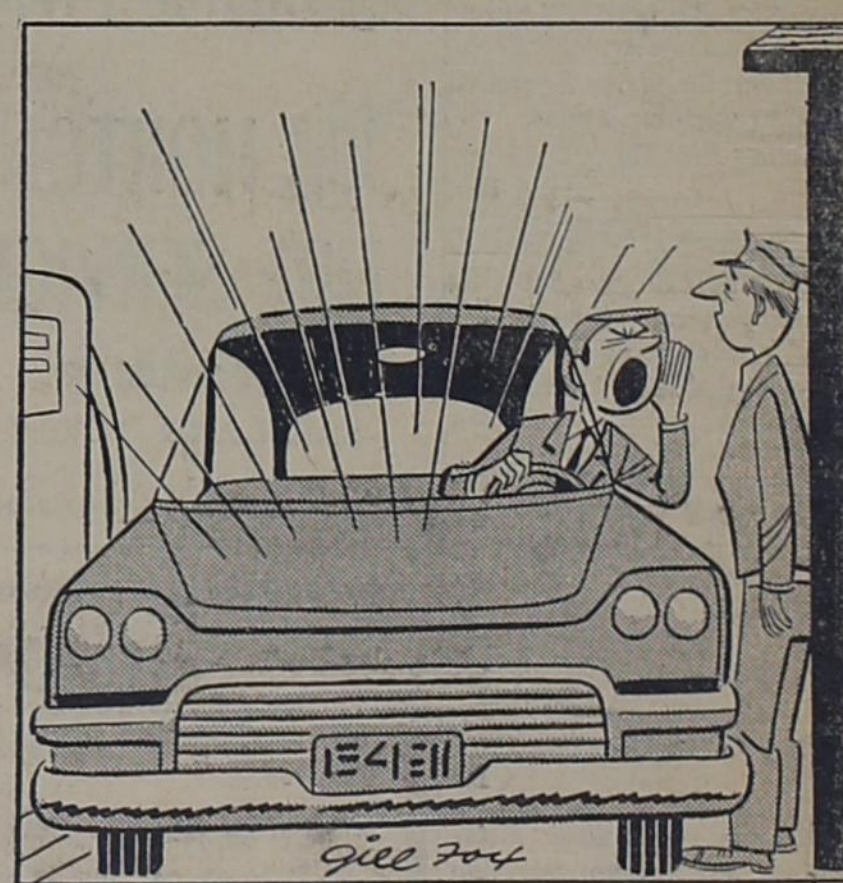

"I want to sing, Daddy." These words spoken by my three-and-a-half year old daughter were her greeting to me when I called home one day from out of town.

She was happy, so she wanted to sing. I listened to at least four unrecognizable verses after which she stopped, caught her breath and said, "I'm happy now."

My little daughter has discovered something that most of us have forgotten - everyone can be happier by singing.

Today's inhibitions, unknown by us as children, deter most of us from bursting out in song when in the company of others.

But there isn't one of us who

doesn't want to sing. Singing is as natural to a human being as crying or laughing. Secretly, many of us, as untutored as we may be, love to sing. No one knows how many secret songsters applaud their own efforts in the privacy of their bathrooms or while driving alone.

The best music to get the bathroom artists singing in public, as a family get-together, or group singing to inspire everyone, is hymns.

Singing hymns leads us to a higher plateau of devotion - of understanding God's love and our fellow man.

For instance, a stranger in Bermuda got on a public bus filled with children returning from a Sunday School picnic. They were singing hymns and he recognized "In The Garden." He sang with the young choristers and found he was no longer a stranger.

"Something happened. I don't know what it was," he later told me. "A bond seemed to unite all of us on that bus."

I think I can explain that "feeling" of our visitor to Bermuda. When it occurs, there's no mistaking it.

I've sung hymns with skeptical teenagers who've started off thinking that this is just "about as square" as you can get. But something happens. When it does, you no longer hear yourself. All you know is that seventeen youngsters sound like a hundred voices.

Watch thousands entering a stadium, or a few hundred gathering in a church for a hymn sing. At the beginning of the program you can see them as individuals wrapped up in their own lives, their own problems.

Many have come just to listen, to be in the audience, but the moment comes when they can not be passive. Everyone seems to be singing and suddenly those who have come to listen are singing too.

MISS GLORIA PITTMAN WORKING ON MASTER'S DEGREE AT UNIV. OF TEXAS

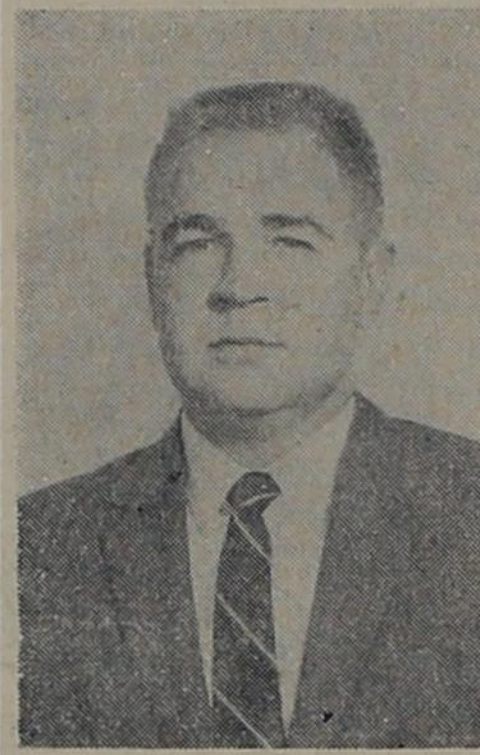
