Panthers Roll Past Coyotes 40-0; Host Hico Friday Nite

It has often been said that "A slow start makes a fast finish". The Panthers must have read that quotation just before entering the game with the Richland Springs Coyotes last Friday night because, in the first quarter, they were sluggish and never generated much steam. And it was not until late in the second quarter that the Panthers moved 66 yards with Ronnie Page tip-toeing his way down the sideline to score Gorman's first touchdown. Halfback Joe Harrison went around end to score the extra points and the Panthers led 8-0 at half time.

After an exchange of punts Harrison went up the middle for two yards to climax a 69 yard drive and he again carried the ball for the extra points.

The next score came on a beautiful executed pass play from quarterback Page to Harrison for 16 yards and another score. Fullback Jim Rodgers got the extra points to make the score 32-0.

The final tally of the game came when Page heaved a thirty yard pass and end Phil Puckett made a beautiful catch to give the Panthers their final touchdown. Again Harrison legged it over for the two extra points to make the final score read 40-0.

The rugged Panther line again displayed some rugged defensive playing as ends Phil Puckett and Gene Snider both did an outstanding job; tackles Butch Boyd, Gene Simmons, John Paul Bolt, and Glen Scierm hit hard, jarring the ball loose on three different occasions. Guards Joe Bob Rodgers, and Terry Shell, played their usual outstanding game.

Others doing yeoman service were Bobby Browning, Harold Rodgers, Bobby Rodgers, and Richard Watson.

Again it was a real team effort with every boy contributing his part in the 40-0 victory.

Joe Harrison had one of the best games of his career, scoring two touchdowns and four two pointers. Ronnie Page was the leading ball carrier picking up 164 yards on 15 carries for an average of 10.99 yards per carry. Joe Harrison got 94 yards on 13 carries for an average of 7.02. Jim Rodgers got 35 yards on 11 carries for a 2.01 average, and Harold Rodgers, who did a fine job of substituting for the injured Nathan Files, got 38 yards in two carries and a whopping 19 yards per carry.

Joe Edd Baze played most of the game despite a broken finger and did a fine job. We are still wondering if Joe Edd's would handicap his centering the long snap on a kicking situation, as the Panthers did not have to kick a single time during the entire game.

And the rugged Panther line only allowed the Coyotes five first downs and one of them came on a penalty and allowed only 23 yards rushing and made it three games in a row without being scored on.

Incidentally, the Panthers drew 185 yards in penalties, receiving 10 fifteen yard penalties and 7 five yard penalties.

Next Friday night the Panthers will host stronger opposition when they tangle with the always tough Hico Tigers. Last year the Tigers played the Panthers a real tough ball game.

This weeks game should be another top notch affair and a large crowd is expected to turn out to see the Panthers try for their fourth win of the season.

The Touchdown Club will make films of this game and will show them next Monday night at 7:00 at the High School Auditorium.

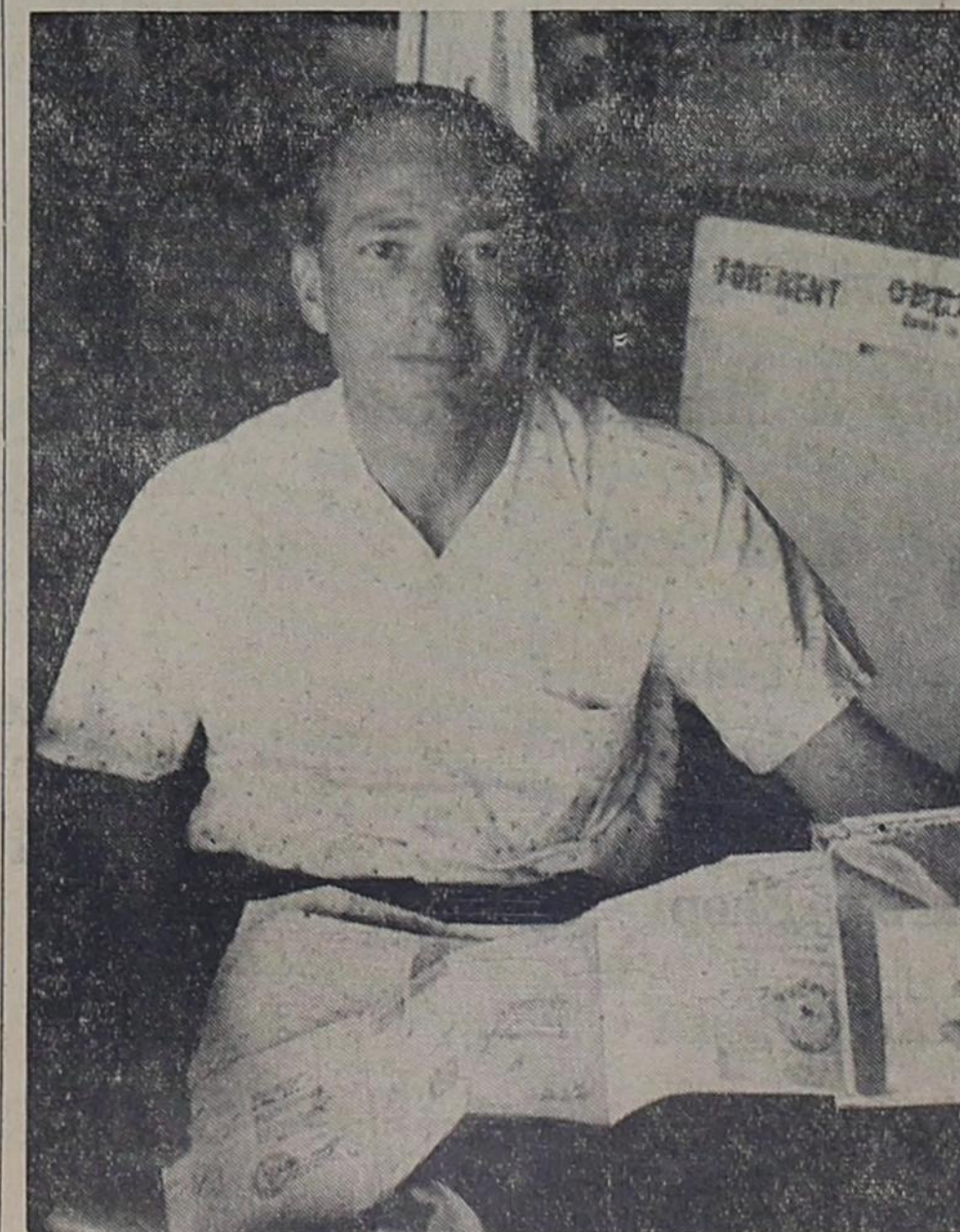

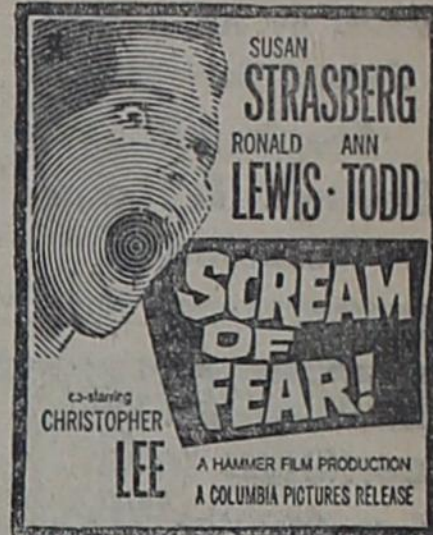

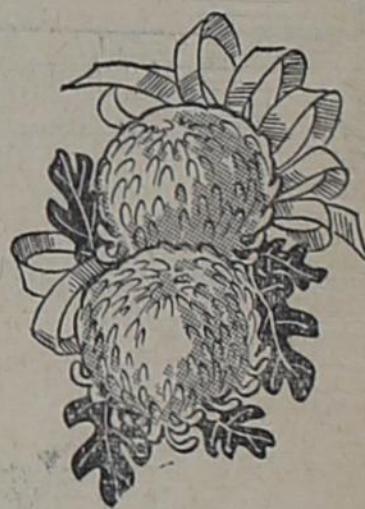

New Hwy. Projects For Eastland And Comanche County

District Highway Engineer E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood visited the Progress recently and stated that the Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$87,000 for construction of new Farm-to-Market Road mileage in Eastland County as part of the 1961 FM Road Program.

Pritchard said 4.5 miles from U. S. Hwy. 183 at Scranton, 5 miles north of Rising Star, west to a road intersection will be built. The work will be under the supervision of R. P. Haun, Jr., Senior Resident Engineer, Eastland.

In Comanche County \$100,000 has been approved for expenditure on construction of 2.7 miles from FM 587, 1.0 miles west of De Leon, southwest to a road intersection. This includes a new bridge over the Sabanna River. This work will be supervised by Glenn G. Trotter, Supervising Resident Engineer of Comanche.

The work authorized for these projects is part of the \$15-million FM Road Construction Program which will involve 133 counties throughout the state. Some 600 miles of new farm roads will be built.

Unlike previous farm road construction programs, this one is for one year only instead of two years. The Highway Commission said the reduced one-year program is the

result of Governor Price Daniel's recent veto of a \$15 million farm road appropriation which would have come to the Highway Department next year.

The Governor recently vetoed the Colson-Briscoe farm roads allocation for the second year of the current biennium on the grounds that there should be more flexibility in the use of the funds in order to provide for proper maintenance of the farm roads system.

In approving the 1961 farm roads program, the Commission said it is vital that the 1962 Colson-Briscoe appropriation be reinstated at the forthcoming special legislative session if the Highway Department is to continue the Farm-to-Market Road Program at the current pace.

The Commission reiterated its hope and belief that the legislature at the special session will see fit to reinstate the second-year farm roads appropriation together with statutory provision for adequate flexibility in the use of farm road funds for maintenance, as recommended by Governor Daniel.

The Commission said that maintenance of all FM Roads had been paid for out of trunk highway funds since the inception of the Colson-Briscoe program in 1949, and that this was advisable during this period due to the necessity for construction of many new miles of FM Roads. However, the Commission pointed out that the problem now is the adequate maintenance, improvement, and reconstruction of the 34,000 miles of Farm-to-Market Roads that have already been built. The Department has now reached the point where a portion of the total earmarked FM road funds must be used for maintenance purposes, the Commission said.

District Engineer E. M. Pritchard said a total of 16.3 miles in this highway district would be involved in the program at a total cost of \$382,000.

PROPERTIES OF WOOD

Working with wood is fun. Wood has many properties with which most of us are familiar. It has color, lustre, grain, texture, hardness and weight. The variation in these properties makes each piece of wood distinctive. These properties vary between any two trees of the same species and even within any one tree. The greatest variation, of course, is evident between trees of different species. Consequently, it is important to use the proper wood for a specific purpose.

One example of variation may be seen by examining the weights of wood from various common tree species. The weight of wood is a good indication of its strength. The following values represent pounds per cubic foot of the dry wood.

Kinds of Wood	Weight
Oaks and Hickories	48
Longleaf Pine	40
Sweetgum and Maple	37
Loblolly & Shortleaf Pine	35
Douglas Fir	31
Redwood	27
