SERVICES FOR R. LEE KIRK HELD MONDAY



Funeral services for Robert Lee Kirk were held in the First Methodist Church at 3 p. m. Monday, August 7th, with Rev. John Dowd and Rev. Roy Johnson of De Leon officiating.

Interment was in Gorman Oaklawn Cemetery.

Mr. Kirk passed away at his home at 1 a. m. Sunday, August 6, 1961 following a heart condition of four years.

Born in a log cabin November 6, 1878 in Comanche County, near Gorman, a brother, John Kirk, owns the land now and the old home site was not far from where a niece, Mrs. Berenice Jeffs, now lives.

His mother was Drucilla Ann Thompson and father was Jasper Newton Kirk, who died when Mr. Kirk was six years old. One of 9 children, he started working when he was only 7 years old for S. P. Crawley, a brother-in-law. He remembered the Indians raiding their feed barns and taking their corn, and when it took a month to get supplies and groceries from Ft Worth and the trip was only made once a year.

He attended Big Valley School only part of the 6 months it was open each year.

He married Miss Ninnie David December 23, 1906 and lived near Gorman all his life except for two years when they lived on a farm between Sipe Springs and Rising Star.

Cattle was his chief interest though he did farm also.

He had land holdings in Desdemona when the oil boom came and still owned some oil producing wells.

A member of the Gorman Methodist Church, he was converted in a revival at Duster and joined the church here where his wife was a member. He was a member of the School Board for many years.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Edgar Higginbottom of Gorman; six sons, Dean and Glynn of Gorman, Ardell of Ft Worth, Odell of Pasadena, Robert of the U. S. Navy, and Weldon of Sweetwater; two sisters, Mrs. Beulah Higginbottom of Durant, Okla. and Mrs. Laura Haile of Gorman; two brothers, Frank and John N. of Gorman; and 17 grandchildren.

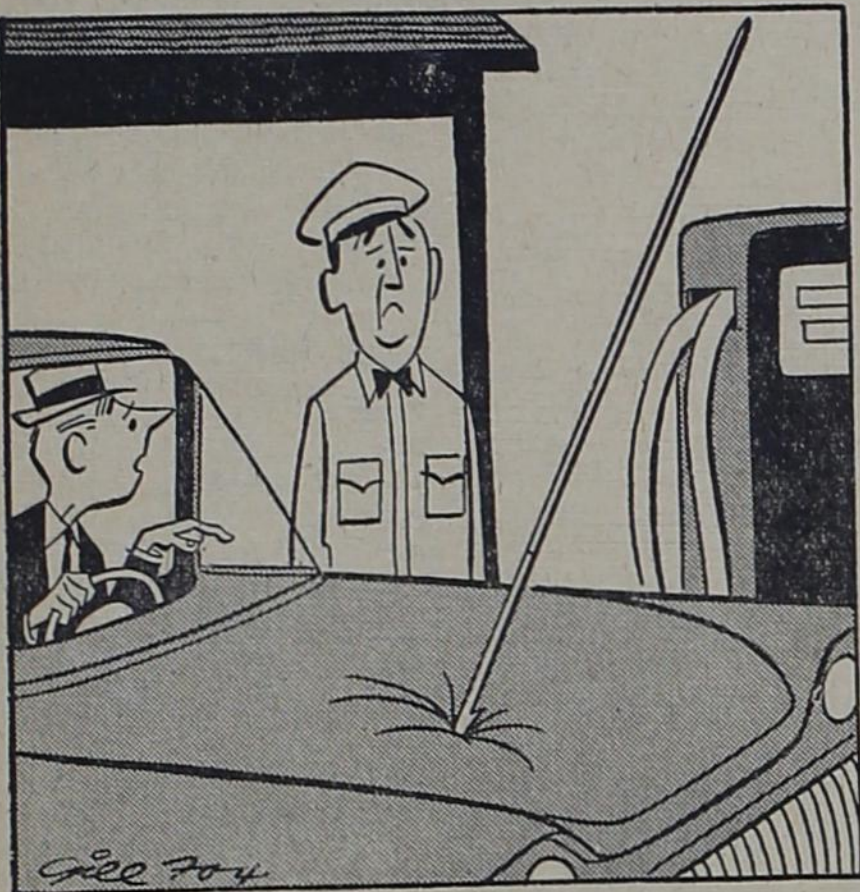

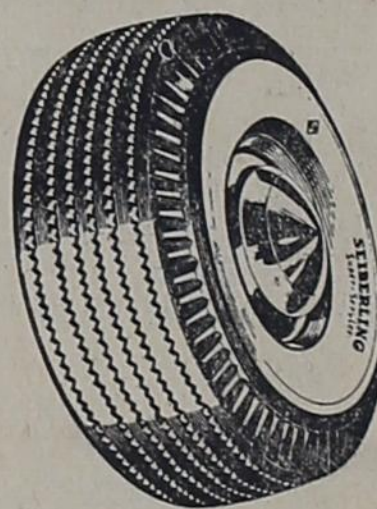

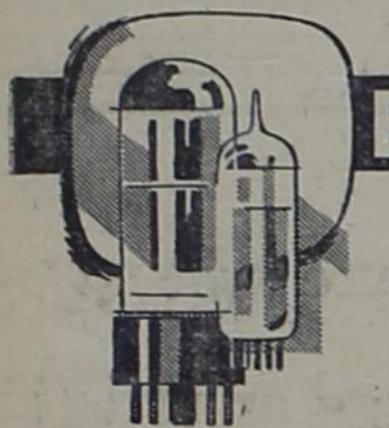
