

By Love Possessed On Screen Sept. 3-5 At Weeping Oak

One of the most important films to come out of Hollywood in years, "By Love Possessed" is based on Pulitzer Prize Winner James Gould Cozzens' best-seller of that name. A book hailed by critics as a major literary achievement, the filmization stars Lana Turner and will be on the screen at the Weeping Oak Drive In Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 3-5.

Miss Turner, who is one of the most glamorous and popular personalities on the screen, has in the role of "Marjorie Penrose" the challenging portrayal of a passionate and lovely woman who is torn between her love for her husband and her husband's law partner. Co-starring with Miss Turner are Efrem Zimbalist, Jr., who in his initial major film role appears likely to become the first television performer to achieve boxoffice stature in motion pictures; and Jason Robards, Jr., exciting stage actor who electrified Broadway audiences with his work in "The Iceman Cometh," and many other plays. Zimbalist plays "Arthur Winner" while Robards is cast as "Julius Penrose," his law partner and Miss Turner's husband. Others prominently cast in the film are George Hamilton, Susan Kohner, Barbara Bel Geddes and Thomas Mitchell.

The film is in wide screen and color.

WORKING WITH TREE HEIGHT GROWTH

If a tree branch was ten feet above the ground when the tree was 10 years old, how high would that same branch be when the tree becomes 20 years of age or older? The limb would be 10 feet above the ground regardless of the tree's age. The answer applies to the height of a spike driven into a tree and then measured years later. The spike, like the tree limb, will not rise higher from the ground as the tree grows older.

Height growing of trees is not a stretching process. It is an adding or building process which originates in the tops of the tree tops. Each a year a clock of wood grows over the entire tree. Consequently, the base merely gets thicker and height increases only at the tree top. Thus, tree height growth is similar to the stacking of inverted ice cream cones, one over the other.

SCHOOL FOR LOST CHILDREN AT SIX FLAGS

The sign scrawled on the window of the Johnson's Creek School House at Six Flags Over Texas, says "Skool closed, gone cotton pickin'!"

However, visitors walking down the Republic of Texas street past the bright red and white school house, can see what appears to be classes going on as usual - children writing on the blackboard, reading books at their desks or perhaps playing with building blocks.

The truth of the matter is the Johnson's Creek School is not a school at all but a place where lost children are brought until claimed by their parents. Two full-time nurses are always on duty here along with acting school "marm" Miss Linda Gullino to take care of these lost youngsters.

"The ages of these youngsters run somewhere between three and nine years," reports nurse Margie Mass. "You really can't help smiling at the sight of some of these tiny tots waddling in, one hand tightly clutching the arm of the big and friendly security guard while the other wipes away the tears. After assuring the child that everything is going to be all right, we ask them what their name is and what their parents look like. One four-year-old boy answered the question by saying, 'My name is Freddie and my mommy looks like Miss Kitty on Gunsmoke.'"

Another wee lass with big blue eyes would not give her name but allowed mother was blond and was wearing sun glasses.

"The kids usually have a ball in here," continued nurse Mass, "playing with all of the toys and in about twenty minutes or so

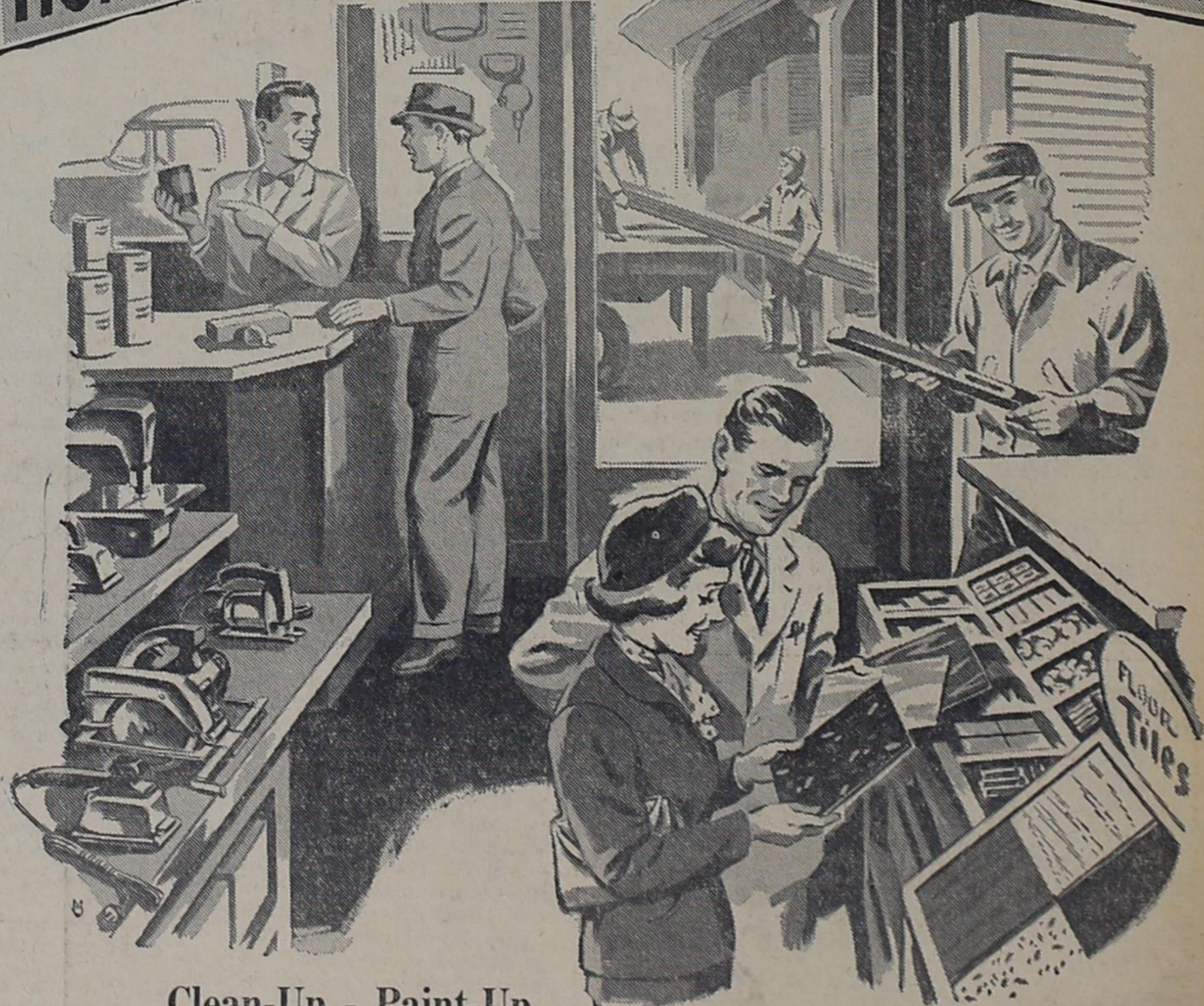

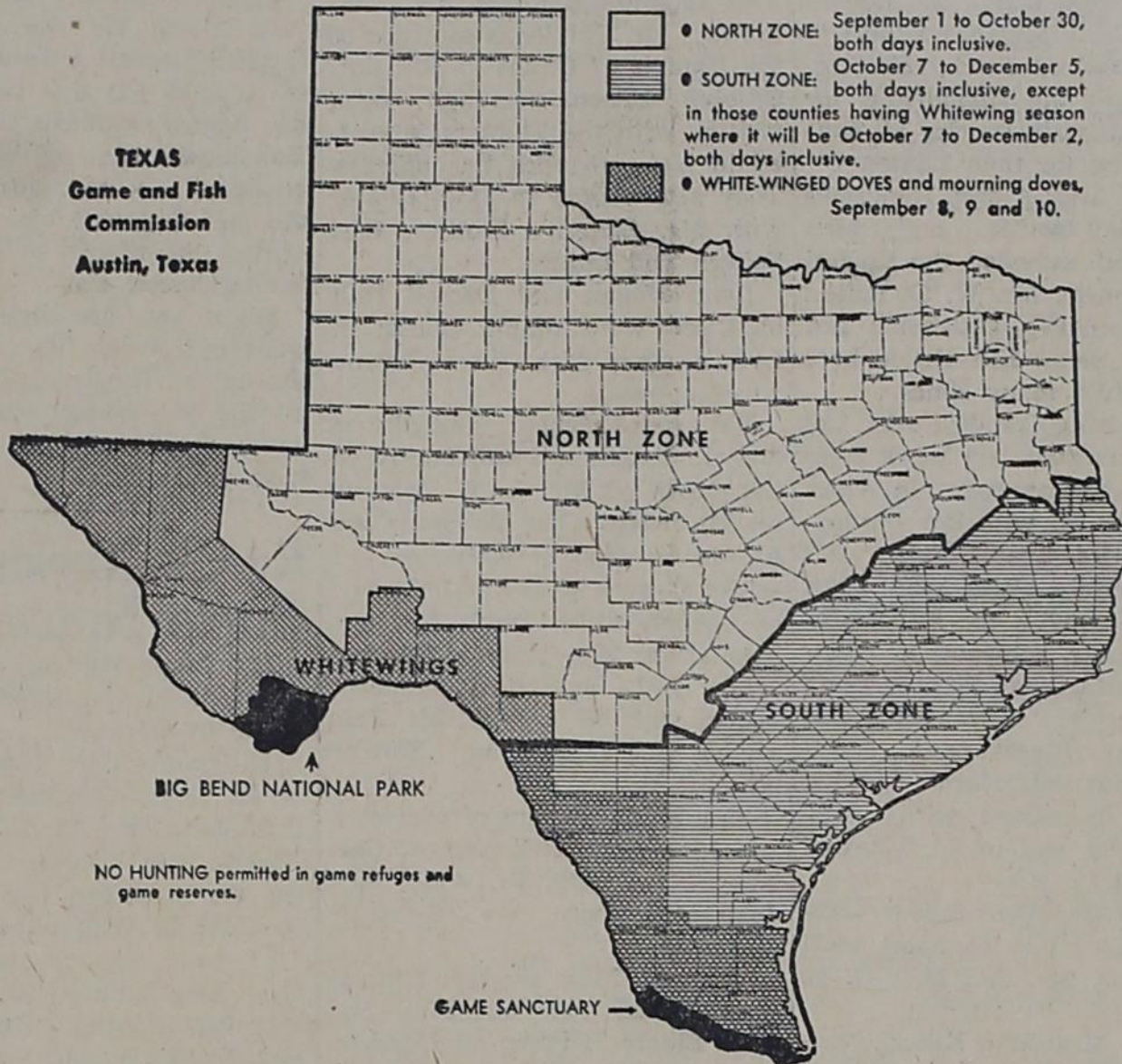

**MOURNING DOVE - WHITE-WINGED DOVE
Open Seasons 1961**

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—15. Possession limit—not to exceed 30.
WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.
NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—20, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.



SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U.S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary," and the Big Bend National Park in Brewster County.
 SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.
 SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-wing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 8, 9 and 10 (consecutive days) only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.

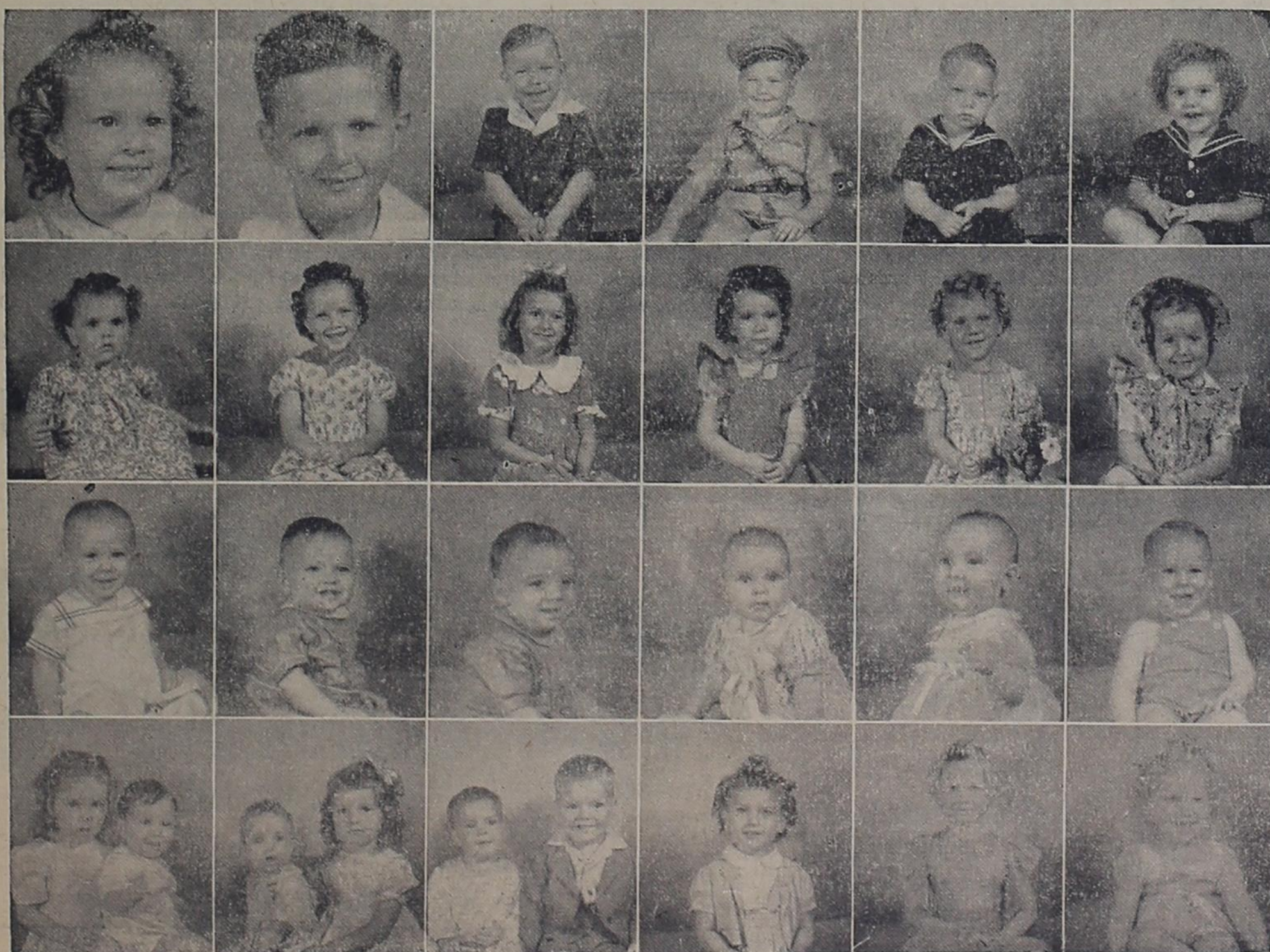

Eastland County Farm Bureau members were among the ten counties represented at the Policy Development Planning Meeting, which was held August 25 at the Chisholm Restaurant in Brownwood. This is an annual meeting that is designed to give information and suggested plan of action for the County Farm Bureau Policy Development Committee.

Mitchell Campbell, Policy Development Chairman, Rt. 2, Gorman, plans to have area meetings throughout the county in order that the policies be studied and discussed at the "grass root" level. Dates of these meetings will be announced at a later date.

Farm Bureau policies are built by membership, and if the policies are on county problems or on state and national issues, they are based on recommendations adopted by a majority vote.

It is the process Farm Bureau has developed to make it possible for farmers everywhere who produce any kind of a commodity - anyplace - to meet, study, debate, and rally around a sound solution to their problems. Every Farm Bureau member is urged to review what Farm Bureau is for and against, select the issues they are interested in, study the facts, forget the fiction, and arrive at a sound solution that will be good long-term goals for agriculture. These issues may be presented at the Policy Development Commu-

ity Meetings or to the Policy Development Chairman. Policies will be voted on by the entire county at the annual convention in October.

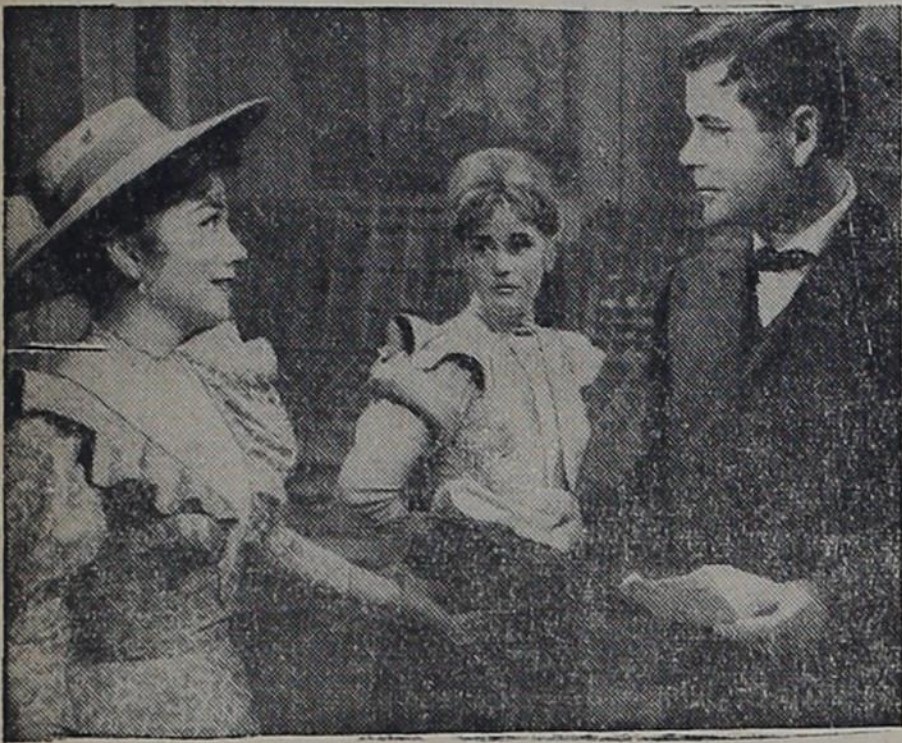

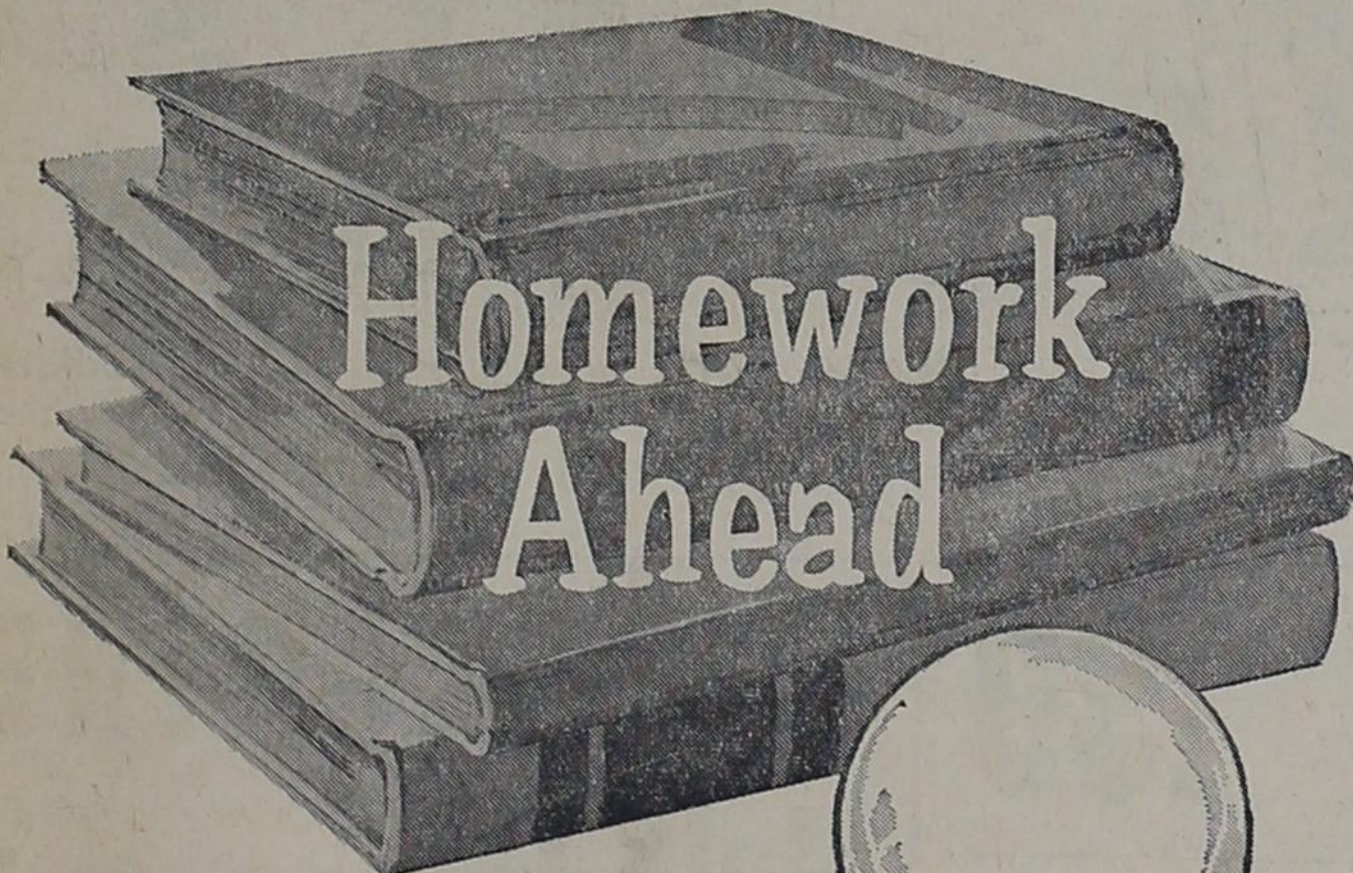
