Coach Bucky Walters Gorman Panthers won their fourth straight ball game by defeating the hard charging Hico Tigers last Friday night 30-0. The Panthers also kept their record of not having their goal line crossed this season.

The fire works started rather early in the game when Ronnie Page, the Panther's jitter-bugging quarterback, broke up the middle and rock and rolled 55 yards for Gorman's first touchdown. The try for extra points failed.

Using a primitive map to locate homes of the first dozen or so settlers in the county, Mrs. Hatcher continued by unfolding the story of the early development of the county, then told of the early days of Gorman, ending by summarizing more recent county advancement, and relating some of the more humorous incidents occurring in area history.

The second program part, "Slides of State Parks of Texas," was narrated by Mrs. Marvin Nix while Mrs. Gene Baker operated the projector. Presented in beautiful color pictures were examples of the appearance of Texas from every area

-- from the mountains and "Candle-of-the-Lord" cactus of the Big Bend National Park to the cypress trees and abundant flowers of the Caddo Lake State Park, from the humorous antics of the prairie dogs in the McKenzie State Park to the historical import of the San Jacinto State Park and the Sam Houston Memorial Park, and all made even more interesting and entertaining by little personal comments and stories of many of the areas, for Mrs. Nix had visited a number of the pictured places.

Harold Rodgers and Bobby Rodgers played real well at the halfback position. John Paul Bolt was outstanding on defense as he made several unassisted tackles.

Others seeing action were Larry Anderson, Richard Watson, Bobby Browning and Rodney Stephens. These boys played fine ball during the time they were in the game.

Coach Walters, after viewing the films of the game, stated "that Hico had a better ball club than it looked like during the action of the game." He added he was well pleased but at the same time realized the boys made lots of mistakes that could have been costly in a close ball game. He has been working the boys this week on their mistakes and expects the boys to improve each week as the season progresses.

This week the Panthers take on a strong Aledo team that beat the Panthers last year by one point. The Panthers will be going after their fifth win of the season and a large crowd is expected to follow them this Friday night.

Incidentally, for those who may not know where Aledo is, the best route is to go to Weatherford and from there go about 18 miles on the Ft. Worth Highway and a sign will tell you where to turn to reach Aledo.

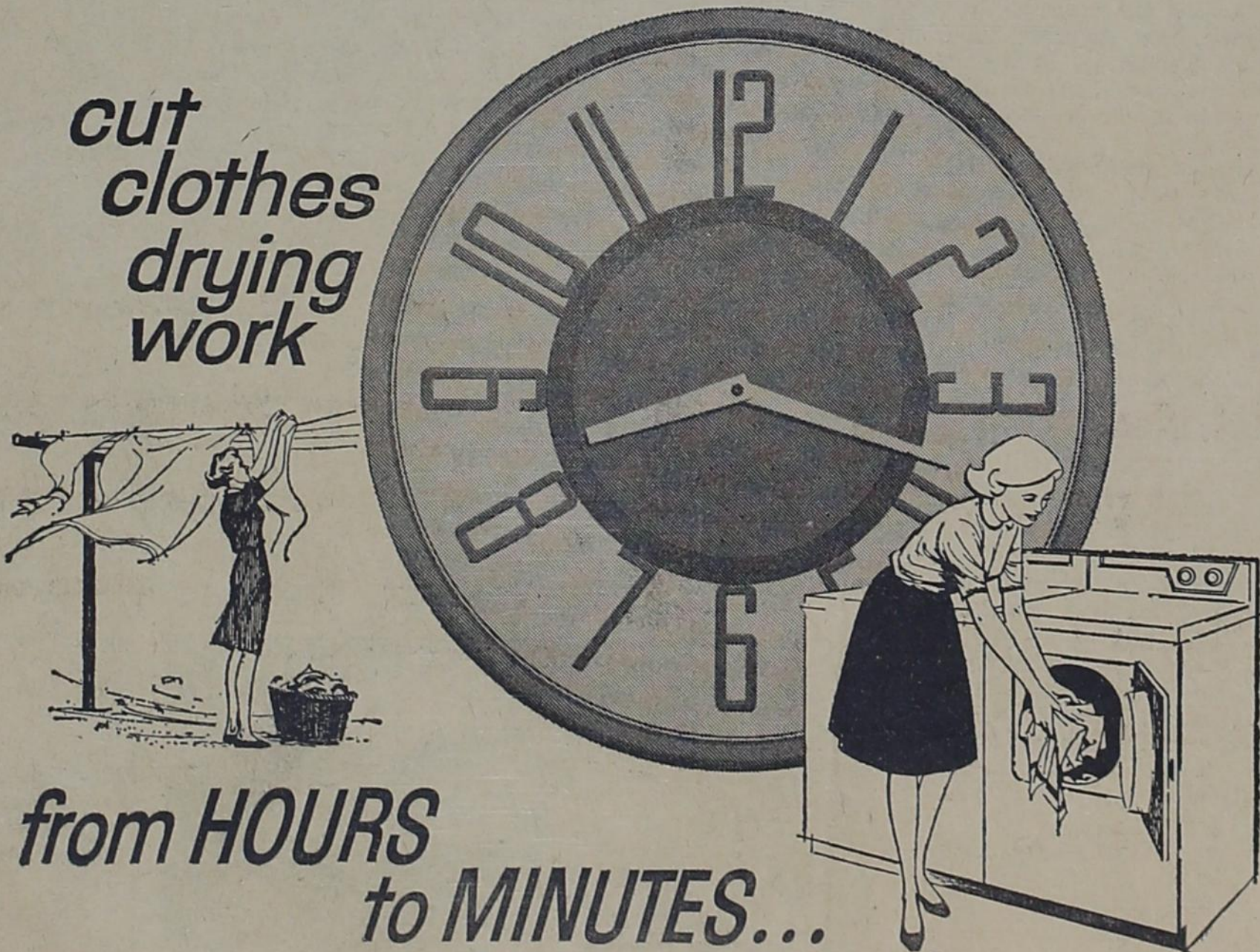

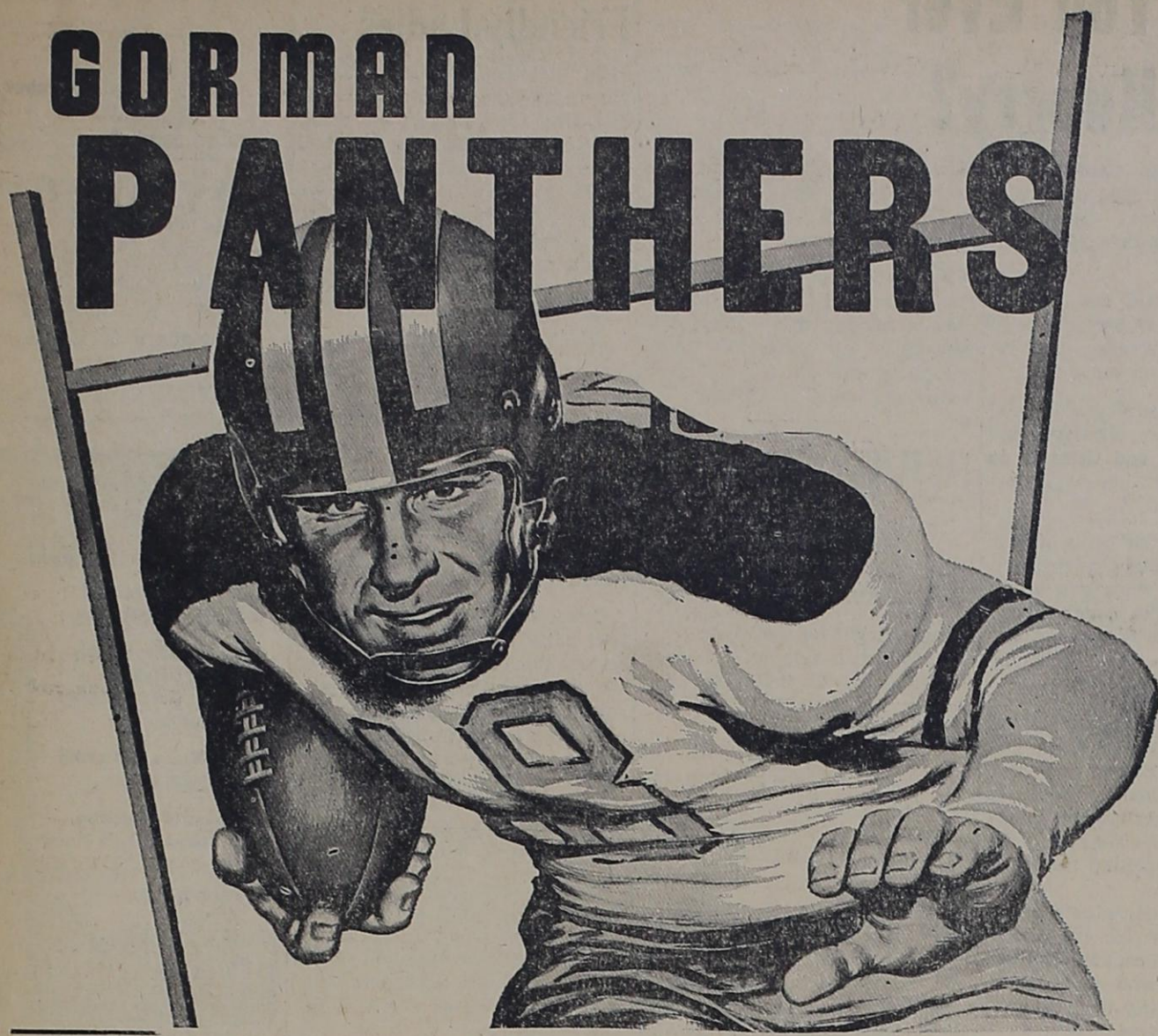

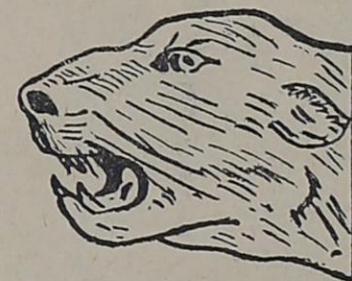

Have You Ever Been Hungry?

Visualize a line starting from your front door, made up of the hungry of the world - many ragged and disease-ravaged, with pinched faces.

The line goes on out of sight over continent and ocean, around the world - 25,000 miles - and returns to your front door.

On and on it stretches, circling the globe not twice, not five times, but twenty-five, and there is no one in the line but hungry, suffering humanity.

If you drove ten hours a day, averaging fifty miles an hour, it would take you three and a half years to cover the length of the present line. What is more, as populations increase it is expanding over twenty miles a day.

The CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program) program of Eastland County is one answer to this program of hungry people. In this program everyone has an opportunity to help alleviate the needs of people around the world who are hungry.

Here is what is being done in Eastland County for the CROP program. In each community there is a chairman who will contact the farmers asking them to give any number of bags of peanuts to CROP. The peanuts will be tagged and left with the buyer and later picked up and placed in a warehouse until they are shelled and sent overseas.

Either Tuley, Asst. Manager Ralph Fisher, Claims Supervisor Mary Paulette, and Field Representatives Don Austin, Howard Weatherly, Glenn McNatt and Fay Ford, depending on other commitments, can and will meet with a club for a talk or film showing and question-and-answer sessions.

Tuley said his office is still finding people who have lost money because of failure to keep up with recent changes in the law that could have been of earlier benefit to persons past age 62 or to survivors of persons whose deaths occurred after March 31, 1938.
