Winners Listed In Fire Prevention Poster Contest

Sunday, October 8th opened Fire Prevention Week throughout the Nation.

October 8, 1871 will be remembered as one of the country's costliest days in fire destruction of both lives and property.

The Chicago fire, which took 250 lives, left 90,000 homeless, destroyed 18,000 buildings and cost more than \$200 million.

In observance of Fire Prevention Week Gorman Grade School students have been studying and making fire prevention posters.

Since 1947 the Gorman Insurance Agency has furnished prizes for the two divisions, also the fire chief helmets and Junior Fire Marshall Badges, for all students. The winners in the 3rd., 4th., and 5th. grade division were Rickey Sutton, first (\$4); Rebecca Goodwin, second (\$3); and Gary Burgess, third (\$2).

In the 6th, 7th, and 8th grade division winners were Dianne Dunn, first (\$4); Mary Martin, second (\$3); and Joyce Joiner, third (\$2).

These posters are on display at the First National Bank. Go by and see them and you are sure to learn some fire preventives.

In Chicago, at 558 De Koven St., the site where Mrs. O'Leary's cow reportedly kicked over a lantern in a barn and started the terrible fire, a \$2 million academy for training fire fighters has just been completed.

Tour Greens Creek Watershed Oct. 6

Mr. W. G. Kirk and Henry Lovall were among the 30 persons attending the watershed tour on October 6th. The Greens Creek Watershed at Dublin was inspected and also watershed dams.

13 structures are located on this watershed, which composes 67,200 acres. It has been in operation for several years.

It was estimated that \$17,000 in property damage was prevented on the first rain alone, which was an 11 inch rain that fell April 30, 1956.

The people making the tour were very impressed with the results. There were no complaints of any nature.

The participating farmers are well pleased with the results.

The dams were built with Federal funds and after the projects were completed they were turned back to the land owner without cost to him.

Besides conserving the soil resources, the structures afford possibility for irrigation and recreation facilities.

A Sabanna Valley group is attempting to create structures on acreage in excess of 200,000 acres. It is estimated that this would be more than 50 reservoirs to be constructed which would be in the drainage area of the Sabanna River, possibly all structures being located away from the actual stream.

The soil conservation office at Dublin will be glad to show the watershed to any interested parties, large or small groups any time they will visit the Dublin office.

Adm. Approval Given Leon River Watershed Plan

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 22 - Congressman Omar Burleson has announced that Administrative approval has been given the North east Tributaries of the Leon River Watershed Plan. This is a watershed protection, flood prevention project embracing 202,880 acres in Comanche, Erath, and Eastland Counties, in the areas of Cow, Armstrong and Resley Creeks, tributaries of the Leon River.

In accordance with Public Law 566, the Secretary of Agriculture has submitted the Plan to the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives for final consideration and approval. In view of adjournment, it will be the first of the next Session before the Committee will be able to take it up.

The estimated total cost of the project is \$3,025,952. Of this amount federal money in the sum of \$2,365,831.00 is provided, with the balance of \$660,121 to come from local and other funds.

Local sponsors of the project are the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District, Erath County Commissioners Court, and Comanche County Commissioners Court.

Members Urged To Attend County FB Convention Oct. 23

The Annual Convention of the Eastland County Farm Bureau will be held October 23, 1961 at the First Christian Church Annex in Eastland, according to Glenn Justice, president.

The farm leader said this will be the most important meeting of the entire year for the local organization. Resolutions incorporating the thinking of the membership on local, state, and national issues will be passed. Those dealing with local matters become the policies of the county Farm Bureau to guide it during the coming year. Resolutions dealing with the state and national issues will be forwarded as recommendations to the voting delegates of the state convention to be held November 12-15 in Galveston. There they will be acted upon and either accepted, rejected or amended. Those adopted become State Farm Bureau policies for 1962 (on state matters) and recommendations (on national issues) to the voting delegates of the American Farm Bureau Federation convention to be held in December in Chicago.

Only members of the Farm Bureau can participate in the organization's policy-making process which begins with the local county convention and culminates in the annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation. More than 1,600,000 farm families have an opportunity to have a voice in the formulation of the national Farm Bureau policies which are developed democratically through the series of conventions. Three out of every four organized farmers belong to the Farm Bureau.

After the local county FB forms its recommendation on state and national issues, it sends voting delegates along with other county Farm Bureaus to the state convention. Each county's voting strength is based on its membership. These representatives of county Farm Bureaus approve the state policies for 1962 and the recommendations to the national convention. The Texas Farm Bureau, in turn, sends delegates based on its membership strength to the national convention where the national policies are adopted. Texas, the fourth largest state Farm Bureau, has one of the largest voting blocs at the national convention.

Many important issues are confronting farm people now, and it is important for farmers to express themselves on these issues in a manner that will enable them to be heard, the county Farm Bureau president said. He urged all members to attend the meeting and participate in the discussion and voting.
