## TV COVERAGE P'NUT HARVEST IS SCHEDULED

A. B. Jolley, Dallas, Agricultural Director for Radio and Television Station KRLD and the Dallas Times Herald, will be in Gorman next Tuesday to make a television story on peanuts according to Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper, who has been instrumental in making the necessary arrangements.

The television story will be on the harvesting, grading, drying, marketing and storage of peanuts, it was said.

According to Cooper, Mr. Jolley and the technicians are expected in Gorman around 10 a. m. that morning. They will go first to the D. B. Warren, and perhaps other, farms to see peanuts being dug with a digger-shaker, the use of a side delivery rake and the combining of peanuts.

From there they will go to the offices of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association to hear the story of marketing of the nuts. They are expected to see the grading of nuts and from there will tour the drying bins, the shelling plant, the electronic picking machine of bad peanuts from the good ones, and the cold storage of the nuts at the Gorman Peanut Company plant here.

Others besides Cooper and Warren cooperating in the making of the television picture include Bob Green, Ross Wilson, R. C. Ashworth, and Melvin and Wilbur Shell.

It is not known when the picture will be shown on KRLD TV, although Jolley is expected to divulge this information while he is in Gorman.

Jolley was County Agent in Dallas County for 34 years prior to becoming the agricultural editor of the Dallas paper and director of agricultural activities of the radio and television station in Dallas. He has held this position for the past 8 years according to Cooper.

## GORMAN SCHOOL HEAD GIVES OPINION ON CONSOLIDATION

In a recent interview Bob Browder, superintendent of Gorman Independent School District, stated several reasons for his present opposition to the proposed program for consolidation of the nine Eastland County Schools.

"In the first place", he said, the committee who made the survey study for a possible consolidation said in its final report that they did not believe consolidation feasible at the present time. Among the members of this committee were three school superintendents, Travis Hilliard of Olden, Wendell Seibert of Eastland, and G. B. Rush of Ranger.

Secondly, in the light of present known facts and factors the curricula of the consolidated school cannot be an improvement on what we now have in our 10th, 11th and 12th grades without the spending of additional monies which we do not have and will not have provided for us.

Thirdly, there are at least two objectionable factors in the transportation problem. There is no getting around the fact that it will increase the school day of many transported pupils to a length of hours which is not good; and the expense of transportation will be additional considering the fact that the local schools will continue to pick up and deliver students of the first 9 grades.

Among the many other problems would be the necessity for a complete professional appraisal for equalization of assessed tax valuation over the entire county, which has been estimated to cost well up toward the \$100,000 mark.

Funds for the building, field-house and stadium would have to be raised.

These funds cannot come from the monies granted by the Incentive Aid Bill passed by the 1961 Legislature, as has been reported. Money from appropriations made by the Incentive Aid Bill can be used only for retiring present bonded indebtedness.

The purpose of the Eastland County Trustee-Administrators Association organized in Gorman October 12th, he said, was to gather all pertinent facts available regarding consolidation and to present the same to the people of Eastland County.

He added that Dr. James Whittington, proponent of the proposed consolidation, would be called upon to present a plan of operation which would include feasible sound financing.

He married Miss Jewel Watkins at Duster on August 10, 1919.

He was a member of the Church of Christ and a Veteran of World War I.

Survivors are his wife; two children, E. C. Huddleston of Odessa, and Mrs. C. A. Hyatt of Austin; two sisters and one brother, Mrs. J. M. Hill and Mrs. A. R. Burcham of Rising Star, Mr. Silas Huddleston of Lafayette, La.; and three grandchildren, Larry Huddleston, and Edwin and Janice Hyatt.

## Panthers Overtake Jim Ned 24-16; Host May Friday, 7:30

What was supposed to be a defensive battle turned out to be an offensive one here Friday night as the amazing Gorman Panthers spotted the Jim Ned Indians 16 points and came from behind in the third and fourth quarters to score 24 points. This victory put the Panthers in strong contention for the District 7-B title.

The Indians' first score came early in the second quarter when quarterback Smith hit Ronald McMillon with a pass and he carried it to the Panthers 13 yard line before Ronnie Page made a beautiful tackle to knock the ball carrier out of bounds when it looked for sure he would go all the way. Four plays later Smith sneaked over from the two and then passed to McMillon for the extra points to give the Indians an 8-0 lead at halftime.

Choosing to have their backs to the wind in the fourth quarter Gene Simmons kicked off to the

Indians following the half-time intermission and Smith received the ball on his 20 yard line and went the entire 80 yards for the Indians second touchdown. McMillon lateraled to Smith for the two extra points which gave them a 16 point bulge.

Just as it looked like the Panthers might fold, Harold Rodgers received the kickoff and returned the ball to the Indians' 34 yard line. This seemed to fire the Panthers up for the first time in the ball game.

Using six plays to go 34 yards the Panthers sent Joe Harrison wide for ten yards and Ronnie Page got five. Two plays later fullback Gene Simmons was not to be denied as he bulldozed 11 yards to the seven. On a play that completely fooled the Indians defense, Ronnie Page followed with a keeper for the touchdown. Gene Simmons added the two-pointer to make the score 16-8.

At this point the Panthers offense looked better than it had all season as fullback Simmons was grinding up yardage up the middle, halfback Harrison and Rodgers, and Page were going wide and carried the ball to the 3 yard line. From there Simmons shook loose from three men and carried two over for the score. He then added his second conversion which tied up the ball game, 16-16.

The rugged Panther line returned to their invincibility limiting Jim Ned to only 2 first downs the second half.

The winning touchdown came with slightly less than four minutes left to play when Jim Rodgers red-dogged the Indians quarterback and as he hit him he caused his pass to sail into the hands of guard Joe Bob Rodgers who returned it to the Jim Ned 28 yard line.

From this point Joe Harrison went all the way only to have the play nullified because of a penalty. On the next play Page faked to "Big Daddy" Simmons and kept the ball and went around end to the one yard line. The next play Page sneaked over for the score and fullback Simmons again bulldozed his way for his third extra two pointer and this made the score 24-16 and enough to give Coach Buckley Walters the sweetest victory of his coaching career.

Even though the score was larger than expected the defense were not without their moments. Butch Boyd, who was playing against Russell Atwood, 223 pound tackle, took care of the 6 ft. 5in. giant most of the ball game and probably played his best game of the year. Jim Rodgers did a great line-backing job, chocking off the Indian offense. Guards and Captains for the game, Terry Shell and Joe Bob Rodgers, did an outstanding job, and Glenn Seiter was a work horse during the entire game.

Gene Snider and Phil Puckett played their usual fine game at ends. Joe Edd Baze played most of the game on offense and did a creditable job and late in the game on defense was really putting the pressure on the Indians as he racked up the Indian passer time and time again.

The backs did a fine job. Halfbacks Harold Rodgers, Joe Harrison and Nathan Files did yeoman service. Quarterback Ronnie Page hit his peak in this game as testified by Coach Walters who stated his play selections were the best they had been all season.

And Gene Simmons, playing fullback for the first time, really proved to be a valuable asset to the Panther offense. Gene was the leading ball carrier with 104 yards and he got them the hard way. In fact, the Panther offense looked better all around than it has all year.

This was again a team effort and every player is to be commended on the way they came back when it looked like the Indians would run them out of the stadium. Congratulations are also in order for Coaches Buckley Walters and Garner Rice for the splendid way they have brought the team along this year.

The Panthers will meet May this Friday night at Brogdon Field. The Tigers always give Gorman an all-out effort and we look for them to be tough this week. Another good football game is in store, so let's all back the Panthers this Friday night.
