

Peanut Industry To Receive TV Publicity On Saturday

The Southwest peanut industry will be given a considerable boost on November 4, 1961, at 1:30 p. m. during the Farm Review, narrated by Mr. A. B. Jolly, Farm Director, KRLD, Dallas, Texas.

Recently Mr. Jolly brought his television crew to the Gorman area, where he filmed the various operations in getting farmers stock peanuts from the producer to the end-user. He first filmed the digging, shaking, windrowing, and combining operation on the D. B. Warren farm near Gorman. At the same farm he viewed the demonstration plot of the Starr variety recently introduced at the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, Stephenville, Texas.

Next, Mr. Jolly interviewed Mr. Ross Wilson, Manager, Southwest Peanut Growers' Association, relative to the functions performed by the Association in the marketing of farmers stock peanuts over the Southwest. Mr. R. C. Ashworth, Supervising Inspector, Texas Federal State Inspection Service, then demonstrated the grading process used to determine the quality of farmers stock peanuts.

Films were made of peanuts being received by the Gorman Peanut Company. Documentation was made of the drying and cleaning equipment and operation as well

as bulk storage facilities, the shelling operation, and the "electric eye" automatic pickers. Cold storage facilities were also visited.

Films of this coverage will be a part of Mr. Jolly's regular Saturday program on November 4, beginning at 1:30 p. m. on Channel 4 TV, Station KRLD in Dallas. Mr. J. M. Cooper, County Agent, Eastland, Texas, who coordinated the entire operation, and Mr. Ross Wilson, Manager, SWPGA, will be interviewed on this program and will review points of interest during the film.

All those interested in peanuts are urged to watch this program.

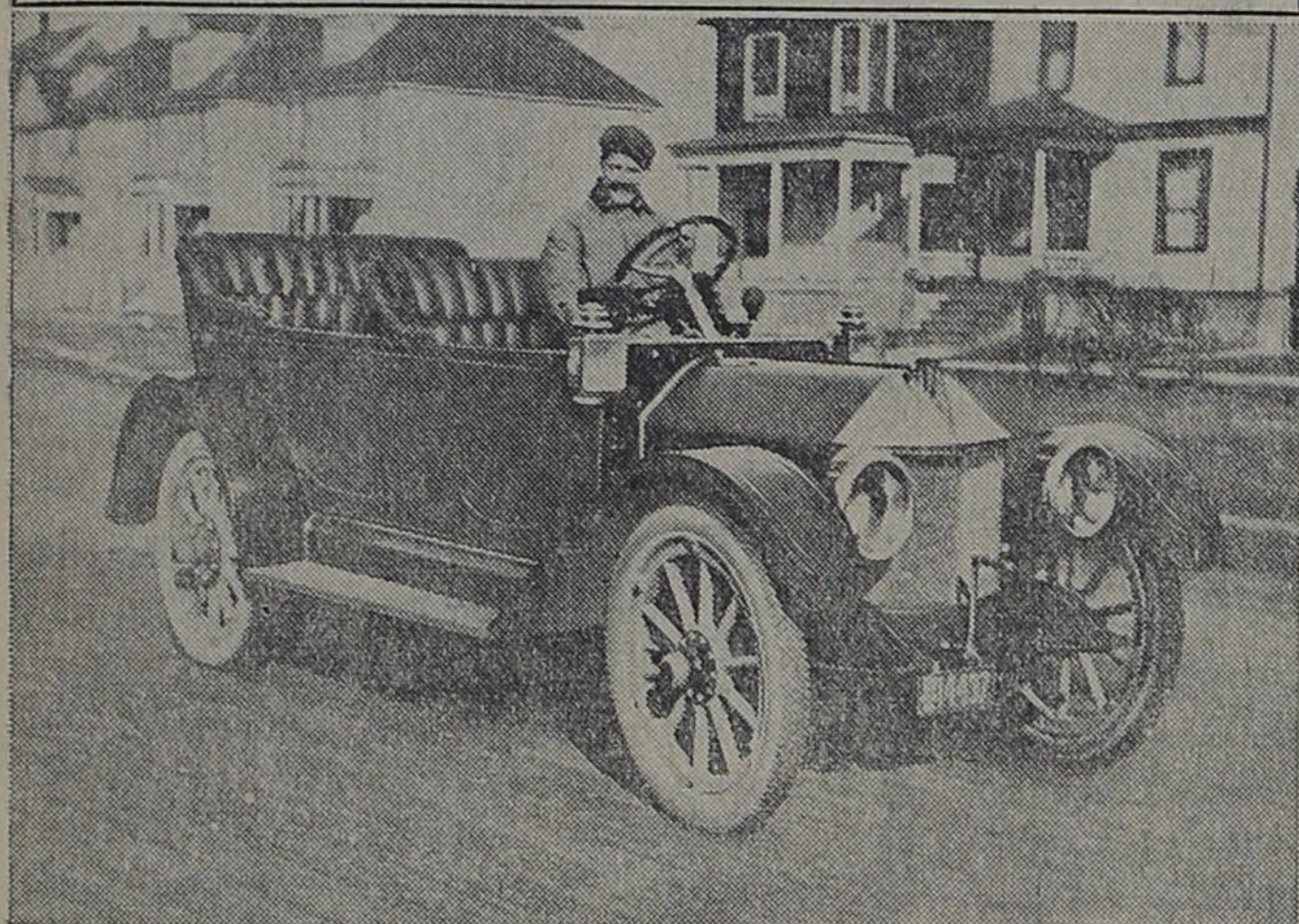
