





At the present time we are paying \$2.00 per ton above support price for eligible peanuts delivered to our plant in Gorman, Texas or our warehouse in Carbon, Texas. We are also paying an additional \$2.00 per ton for all peanuts delivered in bulk to our plant in Gorman.

Our charges for cleaning and drying are the same as last year. They are as follows:

Cleaning - - - - \$6.00 per ton

Drying - - - - 8.00 per ton Cleaning & Drying - - 9.00 per ton


The above charges are based on the gross weight before cleaning and or drying. We now have 50 drying bins and two places to unload.

For those who wish to place peanuts in the loan, we have an approved warehouse and a contract with Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.


