POST OFFICE HELPS COUNT LIVESTOCK

Rural mail carriers from the Gorman Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 16.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster G. W. Baze explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Baze said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: D. R. Clark, Route 1; A. O. Clark, Route 3, and Roscoe Reeves, Route 2.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.

"This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the Post Office and the Agriculture Department since 1924," concluded Mr. Baze.
