

## Panthers Play At Eden Friday For Bi-District

### Peanut Harvest Is 75% Complete

Approximately seventy-five per cent of the peanuts in this area have been harvested. Though the yield per acre is some less than last year's crop the farmer will receive as much per acre money-wise as last year due to the approximate \$30 a ton increase being paid this year.

The average grade this year has run between 60-65, the top being 75, which is slightly lower than last year's high, according to Mr. R. C. Ashworth, of the Federal State Inspection Service.

The new drying system at the Gorman Peanut Co. has eliminated one of the farmer's major problems.

The Gorman Peanut Co. has paid a bonus this year on both sack and bulk peanuts.

The plant is shelling one hundred tons of peanuts per day and will continue at this rate for some time.

Weather conditions have prevented the continuation of the peanut harvest for the past few days, however as soon as the weather clears sufficiently harvesting will be completed in a few weeks.

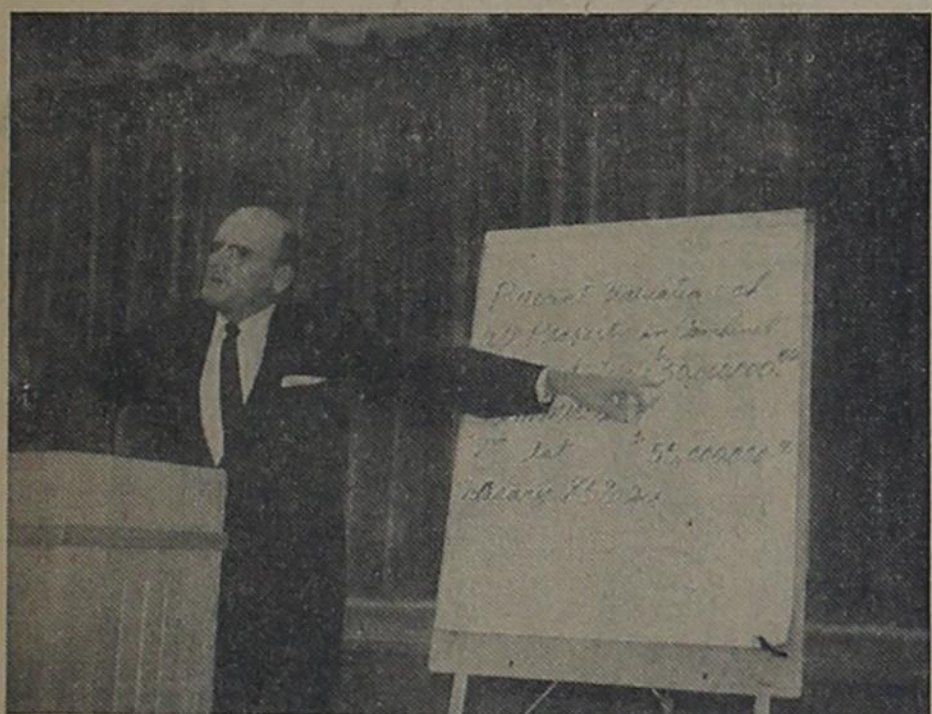
### T. G. Grays Observe 64th. Anniversary

Mr. W. M. Brogdon, President of the Business Men's Club, presided as toastmaster and introduced the speaker, Mr. Covington, Safety Engineer for Lone Star and former Ranger School Board member, spoke concerning Eastland County School Consolidation. Having studied the proposition from all angles and visiting and talking to officials of schools comparable in size student-wise to Eastland County's proposed school, Mr. Covington was well qualified to discuss the subject.

Incentive aid, approximately \$173,000, would be accumulated by the elimination of eight superintendents and eleven teachers and could be used only for retirement of old building indebtedness. To hire back needed teachers, Vocational Ag., Homemaking teachers, band directors, coaches, class room teachers, etc. that would not be allocated by the state would have to be paid out of local tax monies and has been conservatively estimated at \$211,000. Hiring back these teachers would be a board option procedure, but the figures arrived at were done so on the assumption that each child would surely be offered at least what he is now offered. Then, too, there would be the need for administrative assistants, clerical and secretarial aid that would have to be paid out of local taxes. No specific mention of integration has been made, but it is anticipated that such a county school as has been proposed would have to be integrated.
