## Seibert Speaks At WSC Meet Monday

If you remember, it was cloudy and chilly last Monday evening, but it was regular meeting night for members of the Woman's Study Club, so ignoring the weather completely, the ladies gathered up a group of guests and went right along "New Boulevards To Learning" to the home of Mrs. O. R. Buchanan. Inside was the warmth of a lovely home all done up in a party mood, plus the pleasure of the club in having friends and guests present.

Club President, Mrs. Ray Rankin, welcomed all the guests, with a special welcome to Mr. and Mrs. Wendell T. Seibert of Eastland, then presided during roll call and for very brief necessary business. Calling attention to the program, Mrs. Rankin continued by presenting the guest speaker, Supt. of Eastland Schools, Mr. Seibert.

Mr. Seibert spoke concerning a question that has recently become very controversial in Eastland County, "School Consolidation." He urged that he wanted his discussion to be very informal so that anyone could bring out any question as the talk proceeded. Mr. Seibert first explained "Senate Bill 80" or "Incentive Aid" - - it would be the money that the state would save on the difference between the teachers now allowed the county schools and the lesser number of teachers that would be allowed the county consolidated school, based on student average daily attendance records, and the county consolidated school would receive such money for ten years - - but the amount could fluctuate quite low if average daily attendance dropped, and the money could only be used to retire the county schools bonded indebtedness or to pay for new buildings. Actually, based on current average daily attendance, and if this figure did not drop down, the amount of money received from incentive aid would be just about enough to cover present bonded indebtedness allowing no money left over to pay on new construction. Also, if transportation, buses and their accompanying expenses, cost more under consolidation than is presently allowed, then incentive aid would drop accordingly.

Mr. Seibert then went on to discuss the number of teachers needed under the consolidated system. Where as the state would allow only 133 classroom teachers, through a careful study of the students in the county, it appears certain that at least 40 additional teachers would have to be hired out of local tax money at a cost of \$4,500. per teacher per year, totalling \$180,000., to offer the students only what is now being offered.

Mr. Seibert continued by discussing the many other problems that would be created by consolidation, much more on the problems of finances, integration, transportation (a big problem that not anyone has been willing, as yet, to attempt to solve, beginning with the necessarily early hour routes, to costs, to unpaved muddy roads, to getting such extra curricula students as football players home later than regular students, etc.), equal county tax evaluation and rates (it has been estimated that the cost of hiring experts to work out fair and equal evaluation on a county wide basis would cost as much as \$100,000), board representation (did you know that once the county voted for consolidation, then elected a new county school board, such board would have authority to consolidate any or all elementary schools?), new construction, both of a new high school and new elementary units in some of the towns, and many other points.

There were, of course, numerous questions from the group, which Mr. Seibert fully discussed.

Refreshments were served buffet style, assorted cake (at least 6 or 7 kinds), coffee, cold drinks, grape juice, and of course, there were nuts and whipped cream. And while everyone ate, there was still much conversation concerning school - - whether large or small, local or consolidated, the school is one common vital interest to everyone.

## Fire Hall Project Nears Completion

The final touches are being added to the Gorman Fire Hall remodeling job and should be finished this week, according to Fire Chief, J. O. Thompson.

Thompson and the fire department members are responsible for getting the work started on the remodeling project.

The Fire Department had almost \$900 to begin with and different clubs and organizations have contributed the balance.

A total of \$3000 has been spent on the project and it is a building in which Gorman can be proud of. This is a city building and is used by the entire community.

Two rest rooms have been installed, new floor covering, sheet-rocked throughout, and painted, some door changes, and even new curtains have been added.

The front of the building will also have new doors and the exterior as been painted.

## Gorman Fire Key Rate Up 3 Cents

Property owners in Gorman will pay an additional 3 cents per \$100 on fire insurance policies, since the State Board of Insurance has raised the key rate for Gorman from 51 to 54 cents.

The fire key rate is the amount of basic premium paid per \$100 of fire insurance. The Board sets rates on the basis of its examiners' inspections of fire hazards and then deducts credits for preventive techniques.

Gorman's key rate rise was the second issued this year. The Insurance Board charged the city 61 cents for hazards which included deficient water supply and fire hydrants, inadequate building laws and absence of professional firemen.

A 12 per cent credit for effective fire prevention techniques and public teaching methods brought the rate down to 54 cents.
