Mrs. Hankins, looking over her students, each having lived three score years and more, delighted them with her gracious manner in acknowledging the tributes.

A native of Ranger and former school teacher in Eastland County schools, she recalled in an interview: "My first school teaching job was in Eastland. It paid \$30 per month. I really felt rich when I signed a contract for the next year in Thurber to teach for \$50 per month. Can you imagine paying only \$10 for room and board?"

Former Resident Recalls Early Days

Mr. O. C. Kinnison and his wife, Mrs. Anne Barton Kinnison of San Antonio, early day Eastland County school teachers, attended the Hankins College Ex-Student Reunion held in Gorman on June 3rd. Both are natives of Desdemona but lived in the Gorman area.

Mr. Kinnison's first school taught in 1903 was at Mountain Schoolhouse north of Desdemona.

In 1961 a motion to discontinue reunions of the Hankins Normal College ex-students (because of continuing decrease in number attending) was defeated by Kinnison's speech "I pledge to meet the last man."

Mr. Kinnison calls attention to the fact that "Discussion and palaver at the HNC reunion is strictly on an intellectual basis — as to what exes have done with their heritage — there is no mention of football heroics because students didn't waste their time with athletics."

At one time all major Eastland County offices were held by Hankins men.

Remembering the beginnings of Gorman Kinnison said, "When the Houston & Texas Central Railroad came through and laid the switch Dr. Adecock and Dick Mason rushed over from the Jewel Community and erected a drug store building which became a general store. Then Mason, whose name was synonymous with gin (cotton) built a gin and began laying off streets. These improvements and the sale of land by the H&TC resulted in the establishment of a post office, named for a railroad official whose name was Gorman."

9 Miles of Highway Construction Due In Eastland County

Contracts for a total of 9 miles of highway construction for Eastland County has been awarded.

A contract for 7.5 miles of construction on U. S. 80 has been awarded to an Austin firm, Collins Construction Co. of Texas, who submitted the low bid of \$109,944 on the project. Hot mix asphalt concrete pavement from Broughter Street in Eastland to F. M. Road 2461 southwest of Ranger.

The project is expected to take 60 working days, according to E. M. Pritchard, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.

A contract for 1.5 miles of construction on U. S. 183, F. M. Roads 101 and 717 in Eastland County has been awarded to a San Antonio firm, Cage Bros., who submitted the low bid of \$40,765 on the project.

Grading, structures, base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement in Cisco, between 12th and 13th Streets; in Ranger from the west city limits east to U. S. 80 and in Ranger from F. M. Road 101, north 0.20 mile, is expected to take 90 working days.

R. P. Haun, Jr., Resident Engineer at Eastland, will be in charge of both projects while they are under construction.

Gorman: Foster 417, Justice 291; Desdemona: Foster 60, Justice 98; Kokomo: Foster 14, Justice 42; Carbon: Foster 53, Justice 206.

In the District Clerk's race Roy Lane polled 3095 votes and Ann Justice received 1962 votes. (These totals does not include votes from Scranton box or absentee ballots.)

Mr. Justice will assume his new duties as commissioner on January 1, 1963.
