## 1600 Students Are Expected To Enroll At TSC This Fall

STEPHENVILLE, (Spl) — A forecast of an enrollment of 1600 students for the fall semester at Tarleton State College was made today by college officials.

This figure would be an increase of more than 200 students over the 1961 fall semester. College officials pointed out that room reservations in both men's and women's dormitories are running well ahead of last year. They hasten to point out that additional space is still available in most dormitories. A new \$400,000 completely air-conditioned women's dormitory is presently under construction. It is expected to be completed early in December.

With the addition of this dormitory a total of 116 additional spaces will be available for women.

Indications point towards 700 freshmen being present for the first day of orientation on September 10. This compares to 633 freshmen on the same day last year.

Registration will be on September 12-13. Night school enrollment will be held at 7 p. m. on September 12, in the Science Building Lecture Room.

Tarleton State College will add the fourth year of college work this fall and will graduate its first class in May.

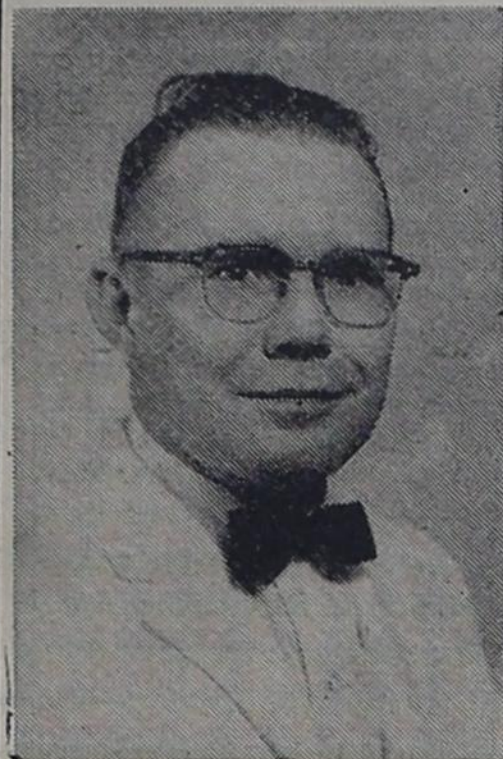

## STREET PAVING PROJECT UNDER WAY; NEW WATER WELL DRILLED

For the past several weeks the City Commission of Gorman has been formulating plans for the paving of certain streets and resurfacing other streets. We are now ready to actually do the work and with the cooperation of Morgan Bennett, his men and equipment, we have two streets almost ready to top.

The Commission would like to express their deepest gratitude to Morgan for his help and assistance, for without it, we could not pave one block of street.

We realize that many streets are in dire need of improvement, but to meet our expressed obligation to the Housing Authority, we thought it best to pave those streets in direct contact with the Housing Authority lots. We had to have a starting place — but it will not be the end — as we are able, other streets will be improved.

As you know we only have limited funds for improvement and many segments of our water, sewer and streets need to be repaired or replaced. We must do what we can as we can and this

**NEW WATER WELL**  
The City Commission recently hired the services of Roy Parker to drill and case a new water well one block north of Dick Foster's store. At the present writing, the well is drilled and cased and a sample of water sent to the Texas Department of Public Health for analysis. If the report is normal, a new electric pump will be installed and the City will put on flow it's eighth well, which will greatly increase our water reserve during the hot months.

**Fat Cattle Market Down During May, Receipts Swell**

FORT WORTH — May was marked by unseasonably warm and dry weather and was accompanied by declining prices in the fat cattle market and in the dressed beef trade.

The latest monthly summary published by the Cattle Feeders Division of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association pointed out that steers grading standard and low-good and weighing above 700 pounds were hardest hit, and at the month's end were selling \$1 to \$1.50 lower. Calves weighing 650 pounds and down continued in good demand and were steady to 50 cents lower.

The drought condition which is becoming critical in many areas is beginning to force the movement of range cattle. At the end of May, feeder cattle were moving in increased volume with the price trend downward.

Although the lower feeder cattle prices has caused some renewed interest by feedlot operators in the purchase of feeder cattle, lower fat cattle prices has resulted in the margin being relatively unchanged, according to Lloyd Bergsma, director of the Cattle Feeders Division.

Bergsma said there appears to be no backlog of finished cattle in Texas feedlots and a considerable number of the cattle on feed have been contracted for delivery during June and July at prices about steady with those being paid early in May.

The below normal rainfall in many areas of the state was causing the movement of some cattle from ranges to feedlots earlier than expected.

In the dressed meat trade, choice steer beef was being quoted at prices fully \$1 lower. On May 25, choice steer beef 600-700

pounds was quoted at \$41.50 to \$42 in New York. This compares with \$44 to \$44.50 for the same carcasses April 27.
