### Starr Variety Is Talk of Peanut World, Says Spears

College Station — Hybrid is a word that has come to mean a great deal to crop producers. But a true variety, not a hybrid, developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is the subject of much discussion among Texas peanut growers these days.

The performance of the Starr peanut variety in statewide Experiment Station and on-farm demonstration tests during 1961 has literally put it in orbit, says Ben Spears, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Service. In 18 Experiment Station tests with three other varieties, Spantex, Argentine and Dixie Spanish, Starr produced 72 more pounds of shelled kernels per acre than the next best producer, Spantex. Its per acre value in 14 tests was \$131.45 compared to \$117.89 for Argentine, its closest competitor. Starr also has desirable kernel characteristics, Spears points out.

In 63 farm demonstration comparisons, including all peanut areas of the state, Starr again showed its superiority by out-yielding all comparison varieties on an average of about 20 percent, Spears said. The average difference in value per acre was as much as \$30, he added.

Starr was developed from a cross between Spantex and a variety from South America made by Superintendent B. C. Langley at the Stephenville substation in 1949. It was released for certified seed production in 1961 and named for W. B. Starr of Cisco in recognition of his many years of civic and farm leadership in that peanut growing area.

**WAGE RATES FOR BRACERO WORKERS SET**

WASHINGTON — The Labor Department has prescribed minimum wages of 70 cents an hour for Mexican farm workers imported to work in Texas.

Robert C. Goodwin, administrator of the Bureau of Employment Security, announced that the Labor Department will not supply Mexican farm workers to farm operators unless they receive at least the minimum wage rate prescribed.

Texas' wage rate is next to the lowest set for 22 states normally using imported Mexican laborers. Arkansas has a rate of 60 cents

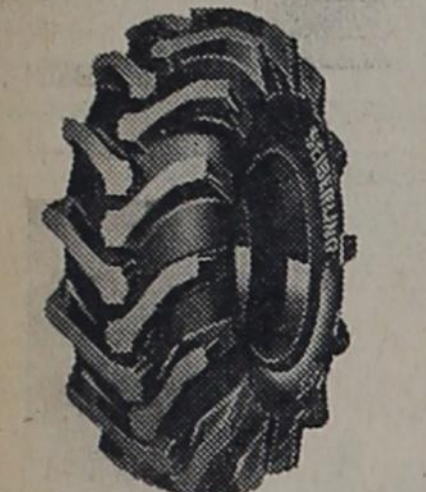
**10 COUNTIES IN TEXAS GET EMERGENCY RATING**

COLLEGE STATION — Dairy cattle, like humans, need salt. They can develop a salt deficiency, points out Shannon Carpenter, area extension dairy specialist, if their ration is salt short. Death is the final result of the continuous feeding a salt deficient ration, he says.

**SALABLE RECEIPTS OF STATE'S LIVESTOCK AUCTION MARTS UP SHARPLY DURING PAST MONTH**

AUSTIN — Salable receipts at the state's 172 livestock auction markets increased sharply during the month of March, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The salable receipt totals were compiled by Texas Animal Health Commission which inspects livestock consigned to the state's auction markets.

**Cattle and calves marketed through livestock auctions numbered 402,000 head during March compared with 278,000 head a month earlier. This represents an increased of 45 percent over a month earlier.**

Sheep and goat receipts during March totaled 77,000 head — 12 percent more than the 69,000 marketed through auctions in February.

Receipts of hogs at auction markets during March numbered 50,000 head compared with 44,000 during February.

**Meat Production Shows 7% Gain During February**

AUSTIN — Red meat production in Texas during February was 7 percent above a year earlier according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Production totaled 91.2 million pounds compared with 85.3 million pounds during February a year ago. Production during the first two months of 1962 totals 199 million pounds — 8 percent above the same period in 1961.

**Cattle killed during February numbered 105,000 head compared with 101,000 the same month a year earlier.**

Calves slaughtered totaled 51,500 head — down from the 53,000 killed the same month of 1961.

Hog Slaughter during February was 137,000 head — 6,000 above the number killed the same month last year.

Sheep and lambs slaughtered during February numbered 105,000 head — far above the 59,500 head killed a year earlier.

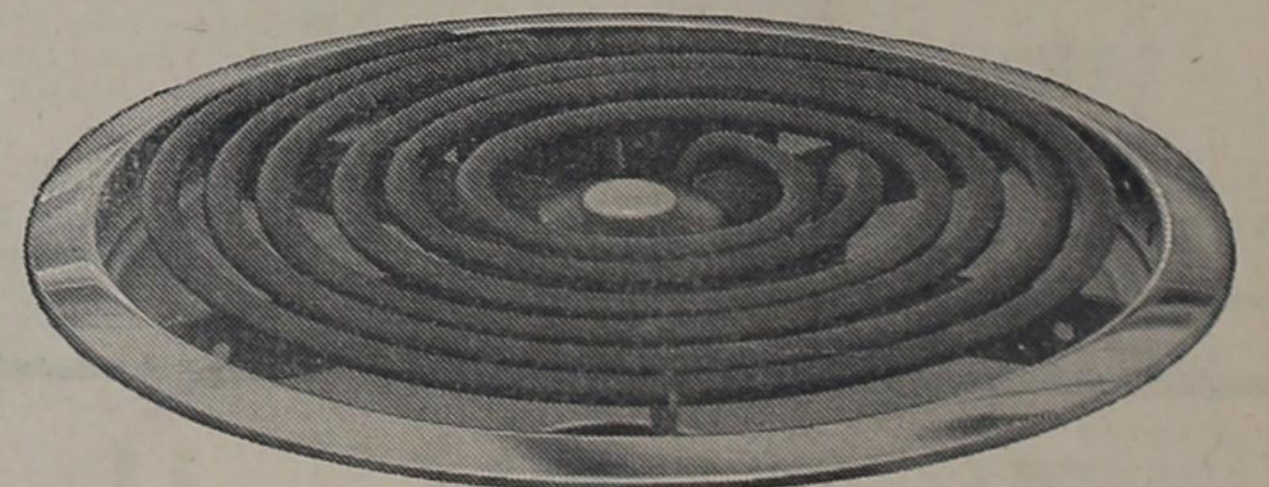

## TEXAS FAT CATTLE MOVEMENT UP, MARKET STEADY TO HIGHER

FORT WORTH — Texas cattle feeders marketed an increased number of fat cattle during March and although the market showed some ups and downs, prices at the close of the month were generally steady to higher.

High good and choice steers weighing 900 pounds and up were in best demand and looked 50 cents to a dollar higher, according to the monthly summary published by the Cattle Feeders Division of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. Heifers were about steady with the heavier weights in best demand.

Lloyd Bergsma, director of the Cattle Feeders Division, said both steers and heifers weighing 625 pounds and below and grading high standard and good were active on a fully steady market.

The intermediate weight cattle moved slowly, but at the end of the month, packer interest in this

type of cattle showed some signs of improving as a result of a considerably reduced supply.

"Higher slaughter cattle prices in Colorado and California has attracted a considerable volume of Texas fed cattle to those areas," Bergsma said.

In Chicago choice steer carcasses weighing 600-700 pounds were quoted at \$42.50 on March 30. The same day, 400-700 pound steer beef was quoted at \$43.50 to \$45 at Houston. This compares to \$43 to \$44 on March 2.

The highlight of the month in the feeder cattle market was the heavy movement of cattle from small grain pastures of the state, setting new highs in receipts at markets in the Panhandle.

The greatly increased supply of feeder cattle failed to cause a break in feeder cattle prices as buyers purchased the available cattle at fully steady prices.

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Some segments of official Washington seem quite concerned as to the front put up all over the world. This could be a reason why there is so much interest in U.S. collaboration with the European Common Market.

At least this inference could be drawn from a recent speech by Eugene Braderman, director, Office of International Economic Programs, Bureau of International Programs, Department of Commerce, before a convention of the Corset and Brassiere Association of America.

Mr. Braderman is all for cutting U.S. tariffs. He seems to feel the difference between U.S. and foreign wage scales is no serious consideration. He feels all such problems can be solved by "imaginative and enthusiastic selling."

As an example of "imaginative and enthusiastic selling" he stated that U.S. exports of bras and similar articles to Common Market nations increased from 18,500 dozen in 1956 to 88,400 dozen in 1961.

For an even more pointed example, he reported all exports of U.S. bras increased from 398,400 to 752,000 dozen.

This leads to interesting conjecture. Presumably, the U.S. is not exporting bras to iron curtain nations, and after deducting the amount shipped to Europe, there are still a lot.

This leads to speculation as to whether the U.S. government's National Federation of Independent Business

mental policy is now to teach Congo women to wear bras.

If so, this could perhaps account for the steady increase in federal employment. And perhaps, it could also explain in part why the men of the Congo have been so wild the past few months.

And while he seemed figure conscious in one direction, Mr. Braderman glossed over the fact that while America was exporting 752 thousand of the items, 2 million, 350 thousand were imported.

Let the idea grow that the U.S. has a corner on bureaucratic frivolity, it should be reported that while in solemn conclave in Brussels recently, the ministers of the Common Market appointed a committee to study bras. It was found the French product does not fit Dutch women, the Italian article does not fit French women, and German women cannot wear any from any other country. A spokesman reported it is essential to develop "an absolutely interchangeable bra."

It is not difficult to imagine a French bureaucrat in the Brussels meeting springing to his feet to cry out, "Alors, ma cheries, the Common Market must go forward with a common bra."

This column may seem ridiculous. It is. But it is factual. And perhaps better than anything else, it illustrates the fact that if Congress votes an alliance with the European Common Market, there is no phase of American life that will not be controlled, regulated, by U.S. bureaucrats working in concert with the bureaucrats of Europe. Bunker Hill and Valley Forge may yet prove out to have been in vain.

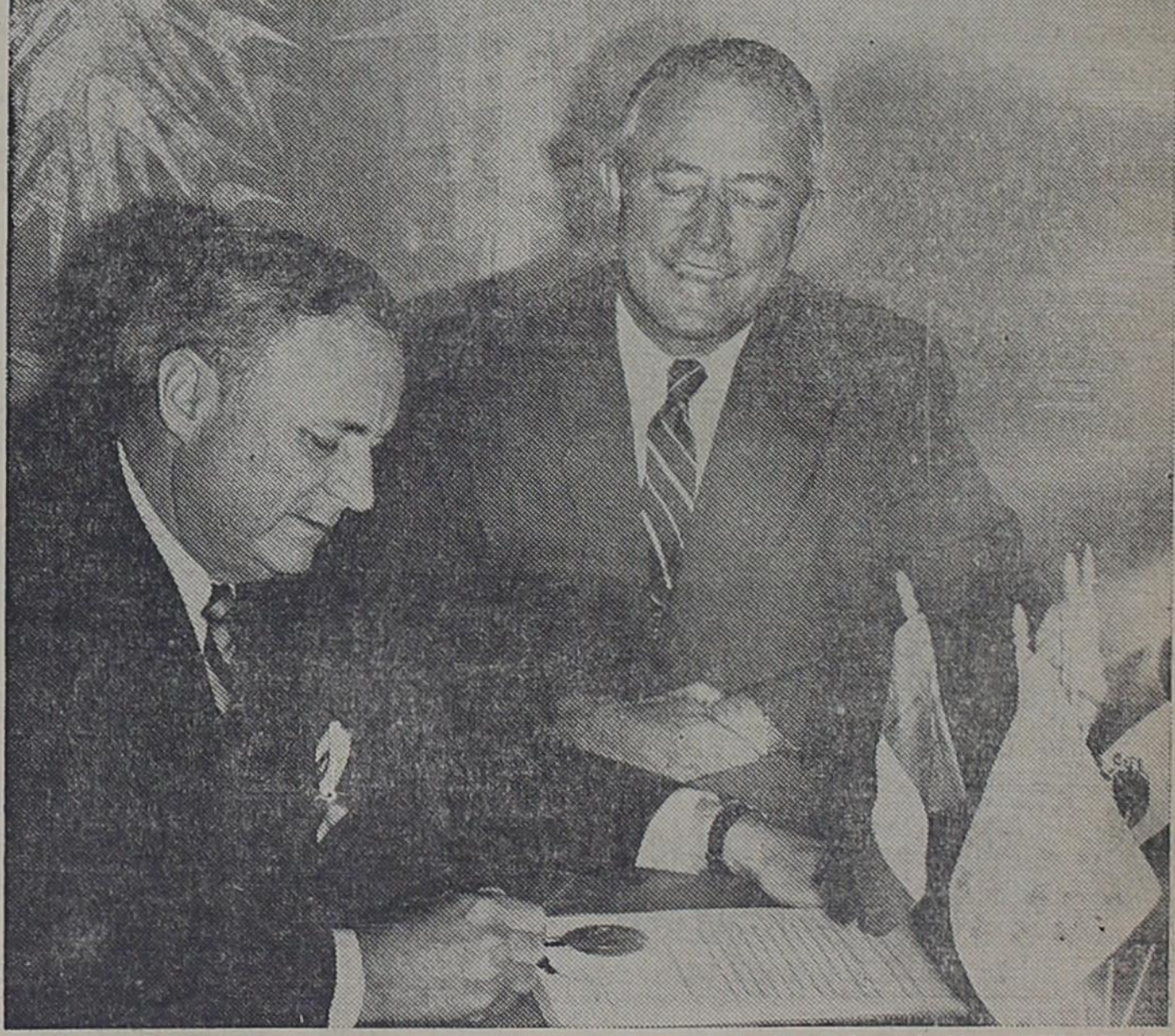

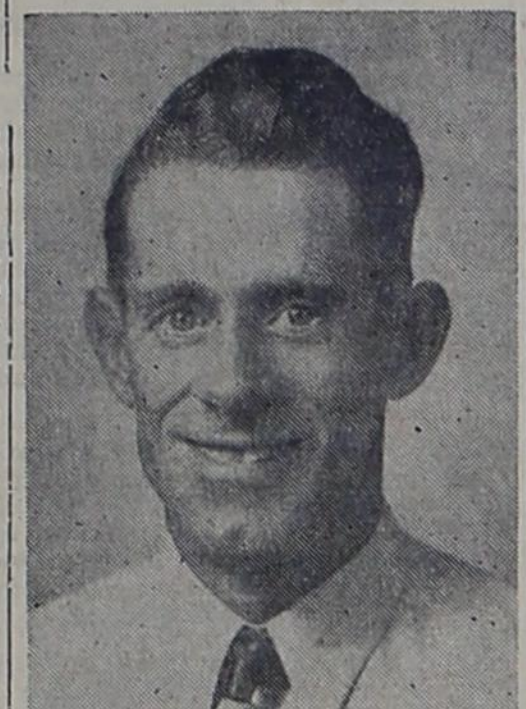

# GOV. DANIEL SETS 'LIVESTOCK MARKET WEEK' FOR MAY 7-12

Governor Price Daniel, recognizing the importance of livestock markets to the future agricultural growth and prosperity of the Lone Star state, has officially proclaimed the week of May 7-12 as "Livestock Market Week" in Texas.

# LEO WELDER IS NEW PRESIDENT TSCRA; CONVENTION STRESSES DEVELOPMENTS OF 'SPACE AGE'

FORT WORTH — The election of Leo Welder of Victoria to the presidency of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association highlighted closing sessions of the Association's 85th annual convention in Houston, March 21. Dolph Briscoe, Jr., of Uvalde is retiring president.

Fred Wulff of Brady was elected first vice-president, and Ben H. Carpenter of Dallas was elected second vice-president. Joe Fletcher is secretary-general manager, and Ernest Duke is assistant secretary. Both work in the TSCRA headquarters office at Fort Worth. J. W. Sartwelle of Houston was elected honorary

vice-president. The theme of the three-day convention was "Beef Production Opportunities in the Space Age," and a number of speakers outlined technological advances which promise to play a leading role in bringing about progressive breeding and management practices in the future.

The use of ultrasonic techniques in evaluating fleshing qualities of live animals was explained by Dr.

Judd Morrow, Director, and Don Wideman, a animal geneticist, Southwest Agricultural Institute, San Antonio. Morrow pointed out that the use of ultra sound is a big step forward in the process of developing adequate evaluation techniques to determine the amount of over-all carcass muscling in the live animal. This measurement is based on the correlation between ribeye area and over-all carcass muscling, and he showed visual slides picturing the differences in the amount of lean meat between ribeyes of beef carcasses.

Morrow explained the principles used in measuring ribeyes of live animals with ultra sound, and said, "Now, for the first time, the average livestock producer and breeder has an accurate method for evaluating fleshing in his breeding animals."

Dr. P. H. Stephens, director of research, Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, Wichita, Kans., introduced a somber note in the convention.

"Unless feeding profits on cattle cashed late next summer are larger than now appear possible and unless a repitition of superabundant forage supplies are also at hand, a decline of approximately 10 per cent in feeder cattle and calf prices next fall from last year's quotations is most likely to occur," he said.

"Looking further ahead, potential beef supplies at hand point to a 30 per cent decline in beef calf prices and a 50 per cent decline in beef cow prices sometime during the next three years," he stated. "Historically, the only device for halting a pyramiding of beef supplies similar to that taking place currently has been bankrupting losses comparable in this instance to those that might be experienced during a couple of years of 20 cent feeder calves and \$100 beef cows."

## U. S. Investment In Crop Supports Dips \$67 Million

WASHINGTON — The government's investment in price-supported commodities totaled \$7,718,496,000 as of Feb. 28. This was about \$67 million less than the investment a month earlier.

The investment was made up of \$4.8 billion in commodities owned outright by the Commodity Credit Corp. and \$2.9 billion in outstanding loans on farm products still held by producers.

The investment as of Feb. 28 compared with \$7.85 billion a year ago.

Corn in inventory totaled 1.2 billion bushels valued at \$1.45 billion. Loans on 777 million bushels were valued at \$866 million.

The corporation's total net loss from all operations, including adjustments to reserves for losses, amounted to \$1.3 billion for the eight-month period ended Feb. 28 as compared to \$864 million for the same period a year earlier.

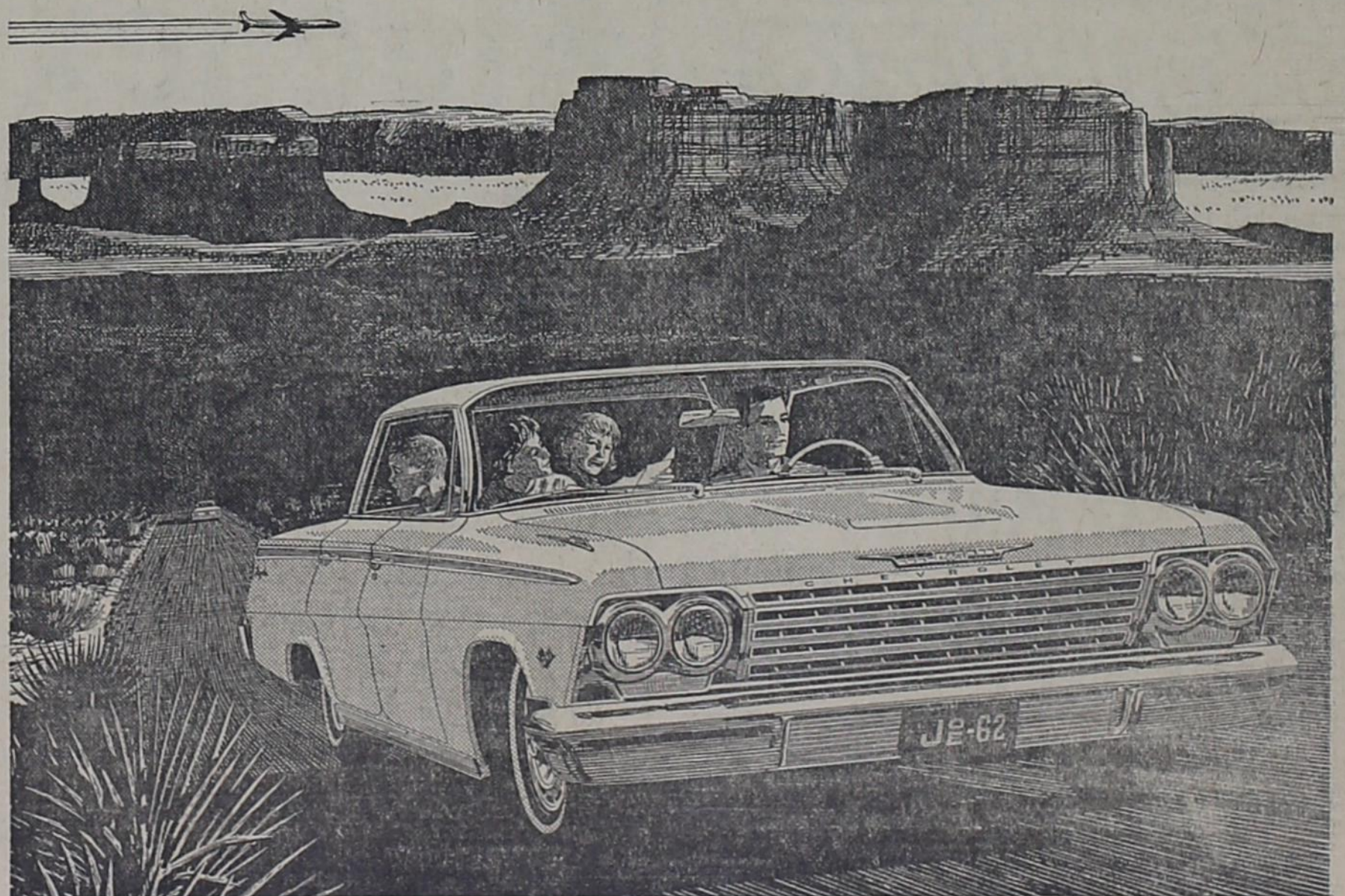
