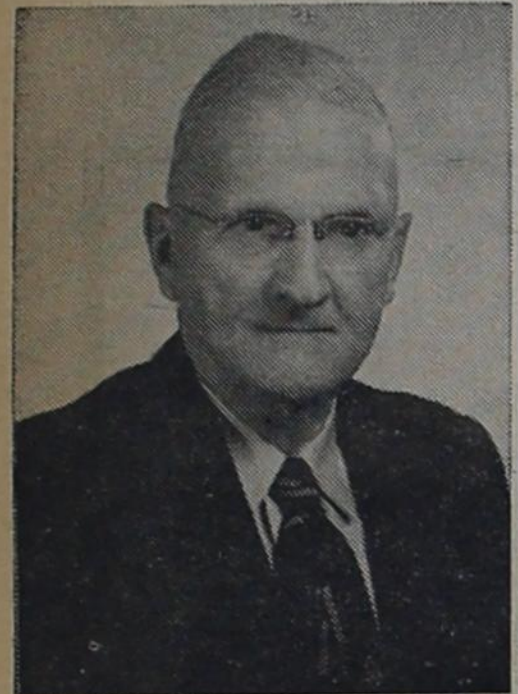


## RUSSIA LAGS BEHIND U. S. IN MEAT PRODUCTION SAYS NLMB

Premier Krushchev's announcement of a 30 percent increase in retail meat prices in Russia points up the fact that Russia simply has not been able to catch up with the United States in producing adequate amounts of the essential foods, according to Carl F. Neumann, Chicago, general manager of the National Livestock Meat Board.

"It is significant that the livestock and meat industry of the United States, which has remained singularly free of government price supports and production controls, produces twice the amount of meat for 185 million Americans than Russia's government-operated agriculture is able to supply for its much larger population," Mr. Neumann said.

"The U. S. produces three times as much beef and veal and nearly twice as much pork as Russia. Per capita consumption of meat in the United States averages 160 pounds per year compared with 68 pounds in Russia. This means that on the average each American eats nearly 100 pounds more meat per year than does the average Russian. The difference is probably even more drastic, actually, since there would seem to be little doubt that in a controlled society as they have in Russia, the short supplies of high protein meat go first to the elite — the military, the party leaders and the athletes — with the average citizen getting what is left over."

The Meat Board general manager said the livestock and meat industry of the United States is the largest food industry in the world since the U. S. production of 29 billion pounds of meat per year exceeds that of any other nation.

"We in the United States, with approximately six percent of the world's land area and approximately six percent of the world's population, are producing and consuming more than 25 percent of the world's supply of beef, pork, lamb and veal," he stated.

"Even with this tremendous production, it is all consumed because production efficiencies, unhampered by government controls, make the products available at prices the consumer can afford to pay. In Russia prices are jumped 30 percent overnight by government edict and with no accompanying increase in the citizens' income. In the United States, retail meat prices have advanced less than 10 percent in the past decade. In the same period average hourly earnings have increased 37 percent."

Mr. Neumann said Americans spend less than five percent of their disposable income on the purchase of meat. For this each American receives on the average 87 pounds of beef, 63.5 pounds of pork, 5.9 pounds of veal and 4.7 pounds of lamb.

## Congressman Omar Burleson Replies To Questionnaire On USDA Program

Programs of the United States Department of Agriculture have been designed to keep the national economy on an upward trend.

Surpluses of commodities, resulting from the tax revenue supported program, have been used and are being used in efforts to build or rebuild and support economies of other countries without discrimination as to political philosophy, all of which began with a basic idea of helping humanity to a better standard of living.

Distributions of surplus in the United States are channeled through Health, Labor and Welfare organizations, including the school lunch program.

Congressman Omar Burleson has furnished the following information, compiled by the USDA under the direction of USDA Administrator N. C. Koffsky, in reply to a 7-point questionnaire from a constituent, Mrs. M. H. Fairbetter:

"There is no simple answer to the question 'What was the total cost of the entire agricultural program for 1961 including the stated amount of salaries paid to government employees, but exclusive of foreign aid?'"

As of Dec. 31, 1961, the USDA employed 91,644 people of which 15,562 were part-time or intermittent employees.

There are an estimated 3,811,000 farms in the United States (not including Alaska and Hawaii). It is assumed that there is one operator for each farm.

## As It Looks From Here

**AS IT YLOOKS FROM HERE**  
WASHINGTON, D. C. — The following story appeared in newspapers from Miami, Florida to San Francisco, California; from New York to Cincinnati to Duluth and Denver. It is an excerpt from a speech which I made before the House of Representatives on May 31, 1962.

"Representative Omar Burleson, Democrat from Texas, told applauding House colleagues yesterday it would be a 'ridiculous and absurd' mistake for the United States to bring in thousands of Chinese refugees from Hong Kong.

"How gullible can we get," 'to welcome with open arms people about whom we know nothing.'

Burleson, a member of House Foreign Affairs Committee, said he knew he would be criticized for making the comments. He also said there would be some who would charge that he was not in favor of feeding hungry people.

"Well, I'm in favor of feeding them in Hong Kong," he told the House.

"Burleson said this country brought in thousands of refugees from Hungary and Cuba after crises in those countries.

"Some of them, he said, ended up 'picketing the White House,' thus mistaking 'freedom and liberty for license.'

"Many of these people have no concept of... our customs and traditions."

Because of this publicity, hundred of letters poured in, the vast majority of which express approval. Those which are critical are invariably bitter in nature and, in fact, some are insulting. This is to be expected.

Of course, mail from our constituents on any subject will be answered first, but eventually all these letters will have a reply, even if it may take most of the summer.

This whole idea is, in my opinion, about as asinine as anything our Government has ever done.

As mentioned in the speech before the Congress, while we are supposedly trying to ferret out subversion with our right hand, the left hand is waving in these hordes of people about whom we know absolutely nothing, and we have no way of finding out. As if we do not have enough problems already, we invite more by compounding conditions about which those who want to relieve the situation talk - more Federal Aid to Education, more Public Housing, more this and that and the other - but it seems there

## RED CROSS SUGGESTS RULES FOR SUMMER WATER SAFETY

For the millions of Americans who will take to the water this summer - a probable all-time high - the American Red Cross has issued its annual summer advice on how to stay afloat and tsay alive.

June heralds the start of the aquatic sports season in most parts of the country, and with the rapid multiplication of moe-owned swimming pools, form ponds and motor-powered boats, the Red Cross estimates that over 100 million Americans will use the water this summer for recreational purposes.

Alfred W. Cantrell, national director of Red Cross Safety Services states: "Since our water safety training program was inaugurated in 1914, the annual number of drownings has declined by 1,400, despite a near-doubling of the populations and an astronomical increase in aquatic activities through the joint efforts of all organizations in the water safety field.

"But there are still 6,500 drowning a year -- the majority resulting from recreational use of water. It is to help prevent these that we issue this safety advice."

1. Learn to swim. If you can swim a little, learn how to swim better. Check with your Red Cross Chapter for upcoming classes.

2. Always swim with a companion. Make sure someone is near by to help if you need it.

3. Swim in a safe place. The presence of lifeguards usually indicate the area is safe for swimming.

4. Know the area. Before diving, make sure the water is deep enough and that there are no hidden objects such as emerged rocks.

5. Respect the water and know your limitations. Don't go beyond safe limits or your swimming capacity.

6. Use discretion. Wait at least an hour after eating before swimming, and don't swim when overheated or overtired.

7. Try to remain calm in case of trouble. Assume a face-up floating position, keep your hands under water and slowly move your hands and feet.

8. If your boat overturns stay with it. Most small craft will float, even when filled with water.

9. Don't depend on a tube or inflated toy to hold you up.

10. In river swimming, watch out for swift currents. Lifeguards will tell you how to recognize these conditions and how to save yourself if your are caught.

11. In long distance swimming, always swim parallel to the shore and with a companion or a boat nearby.

12. Equip your boat with safety items. A life jacket for each passenger and a stern light are musts. Recommended also are anchor, oars, boat hook, extra line, fire extinguisher, first aid kit, and tool kit.

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### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

The recently announced completion of negotiations on tariff cutting under the present Reciprocal Trade Treaty Act probably best illustrates a point of futility about the proposals to slash U.S. protective tariffs even further.

It is the contention of the adherents of this new measure that if the U.S. cuts its tariffs to permit greater floods of cheap labor into the American market, the European nations will also cut their tariffs so that the U.S. can sell more to them. As part and parcel of the plan, the U.S. taxpayer will be called upon to finance aid for workers, and for industries that are liquidated in U.S.

In the recent tariff go around, one of the items on which tariffs were further cut was automobiles. The U.S. agreed to cut the tariff and European nations agreed to cut their tariffs on U.S. made cars.

From the standpoint of money it works about like the following. The U. S. import duty on one small, cheap European "puddle jumper" type of cars will be about \$25 lower. The typical European duty on a standard sized American car will be about \$125 lower.

Does this mean there will be a big rush on foreign orders for the products of Detroit? In 1960 the U.S. imported \$596 million dollars worth of foreign cars, exported to Europe only \$76 million worth.

There are two basic reasons for this. One is that they do not make enough money to afford them. The second is that their own governments put such a high purchase tax on autos, foreign or domestic built, that they are priced out of the market.

Consider a typical illustration. A medium priced American car can now be landed in England for about \$125 less than formerly. How powerful a buying incentive is this? It is perhaps as much an incentive as a price reduction of \$500 on a 100 foot yacht would be to someone living on Social Security payments.

For there is a matter of a 55% purchase tax in England.

Thus, for example, an American medium priced car is sold by Detroit to a British dealer for \$2,000. When freight, dealer mark-up, other extras are added, the cost to the potential buyer is around \$3000, or about equal to full two years income for the average Englishman.

But if this average Englishman figures out how he can afford it, he has to pay a tax of 55% on \$2,000 manufacturer's price, or pay over \$4,000.

This perhaps well illustrates the nonsense at the heart of a great deal of the current mystical fervor about "free trade."

For as long as governments use power to inflate wages in the U.S., or hold them down as in other nations, as long as world wide monopolies can rig prices of basic commodities, and as long as governments can levy taxes on transactions in the market place, the whole concept of "free trade" is an illusory myth.
