



Wheat Producers To Cast Ballots

The Eastland County Farm Bureau is urging all eligible wheat producers in the county to cast their ballots in the July 24 wheat referendum.

"Only by exercising their right to vote in the referendum can wheat growers actually have a voice in their farming operations," Joe Bob Browning, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, said. He emphasized that the organization is not attempting to tell farmers how to vote.

"The Farm Bureau believes that all producers should know the facts, then vote their own convictions," the county farm leader said. "Basically, the choice in the referendum is between continued government controls and more freedom in individual farming operations."


