"Trinidad is a base for one of our largest and best radar tracking stations. It has one of the finest harbors in the world being some thirty feet wide. A most strategic point for us should there be war. Supplies could be funneled from South America to the United States should the need arise."

A collateral duty of Currie was acting as public relations officer on the island.
