Mrs. George W. Harwell is looking forward to the celebration of her 90th birthday on July 30th. Her children and their families will be with her Sunday, the 29th, for a birthday dinner.

Born Quilla Hazelwood at Burnet, she was orphaned by the death of her mother when she was two weeks old and the death of her father at the age of four. She was reared by an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. William Reynolds.

When she was eighteen she married George Harwell and moved to Paducah where they made their home until moving to Gorman in 1905.

Mr. Harwell was a painter by trade but he was an artist at heart. At his death in 1925 he left a number of paintings which she has treasured through the years. Other paintings are to be found in the homes of friends.

At the age of 90 she seldom leaves home but does keep her own house, and grandchildren do not find the cupboard empty when they look for a piece of cake or pie.

Mrs. Harwell, who is "Mama" to children and grandchildren, recalls, "When George and I crossed the Brazos coming down here from Paducah, the water was high. I was frightened and not without cause, for headwaters took the bridge with it just as our covered wagon was safely across."

In the past decade she has found the tending of flower beds leaves her a bit fatigued. But she finds TV to be the greatest invention ever.

"Why sometimes, really more often than not, Tracey (her son) and I watch the late, late shows. You know I like boxing and baseball," she confessed with twinkling of her eyes.

"I have so much to be thankful for," she said. "You might say I have never been sick. And I do hope no one will ever have to wait on me."

The four daughters and one son and their families who will be at home on Sunday are Mrs. Gladys Stark of El Paso, Mrs. Ira Ford of Lamesa, Mrs. Harold Stephens of Odessa, Mrs. Speck Clark of Gorman, and Tracey, who makes his home with Mrs. Harwell. Many of our students do use the Progress Library in working up themes and other lessons.

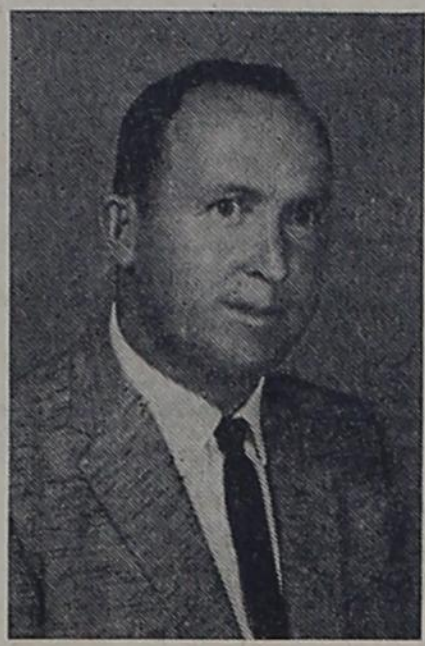
Mr. and Mrs. Arlan Burton of Carlsbad, New Mexico brought us a box of good books when they were home on vacation recently.

County Sheep And Goat Field Day Set For August 7

Preparing and marketing wool and mohair, selection of breeding animals and other topics are scheduled on the program of the Eastland County Sheep and Goat Field Day on the Hageman Ranch east of Ranger on August 7th, it was announced today.

Other topics scheduled for the all-day affair include the future price of wool and mohair, control of internal and external parasites and the progress of the screw-worm control program in Texas.

Lunch will be served those attending through the courtesy of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, it was announced by Col. Roy Plumley, manager.

Weldon Cloud, wool and mohair buyer and warehouseman, Lampasas, whose firm has a warehouse and a buying station in Ranger, will discuss the preparation of wool and mohair for marketing of the two fibers.

Other speakers who have been invited to appear on the program include Sidney Jenkins, Area Farm Management Specialist, Agricultural Extension Service, Stephenville; James A. Gray, Sheep and Goat Specialist, Extension Service, San Angelo; Dr. J. B. WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

In a recently conducted poll by the National Federation of Independent Business, 69% of the nation's independent business people expressed approval of the bill introduced by Congressman Kolwaski to permit retired people drawing Social Security to earn up to \$2400 per year without penalties.

At present retired people are permitted to earn up to \$1200 per year. After this, they give up \$1 in C. W. Harder benefit for every \$2 earned in excess of \$1200 per year up to \$1700 per year. After that, they forfeit \$1 for every \$1 earned.

Thus, at present, if a retired person makes \$1700 in a year, he or she loses \$250 in Social Security payments. The maximum benefit is only \$124 per month, the average is \$78. Thus, for the average making this amount of money in addition to the pension, the monthly benefits are cut to less than \$50.

Therefore, the bill by Congressman Kolwaski seeks to correct one of the most fantastic situations of the times.

It is quite obvious that most people under today's prices cannot live in anything approaching decency on a pension of less than \$1,000 per year. It is also equally as obvious that the benefits are not a free hand out from government, or manna from heaven, because both the recipient and his or her employers have been compelled to contribute to a fund to pay these benefits.

Thus, severely limiting the amount of additional income a recipient can make is somewhat akin to the situation that would exist if an insurance company refused to pay on an annuity policy unless the policy holder agreed to conditions laid down by the company.

Additionally, it is quite odd that retired people should be discouraged from making additional income at the same time a drive is on to boost social security deductions on the basis that elderly people cannot pay for medical care.

In addition, there is a sheer economic waste involved here. People vary greatly in their physical stamina in the late sixties. Many people are quite active for many years after reaching this age. Many women in their sixties, experienced from raising their own families, can earn \$1800 per year caring for children. Many men are quite capable of doing light clerical work, serving as watchmen, and serve in a host of other capacities.

There is also a human respect. Many people, if forced to do nothing productive, quickly fade and die. This is especially true if forced to exist on a pension that keeps them on the edge of want.

Eskimos of the Far North, because is requires full vigor merely to exist, have the custom of leaving their old people sitting out of the ice to die of exposure and starvation. It would seem that with the restrictions placed on those who are drawing on the Social Security fund they have contributed to, that there must be a substantial number of Eskimos making policy in Washington.

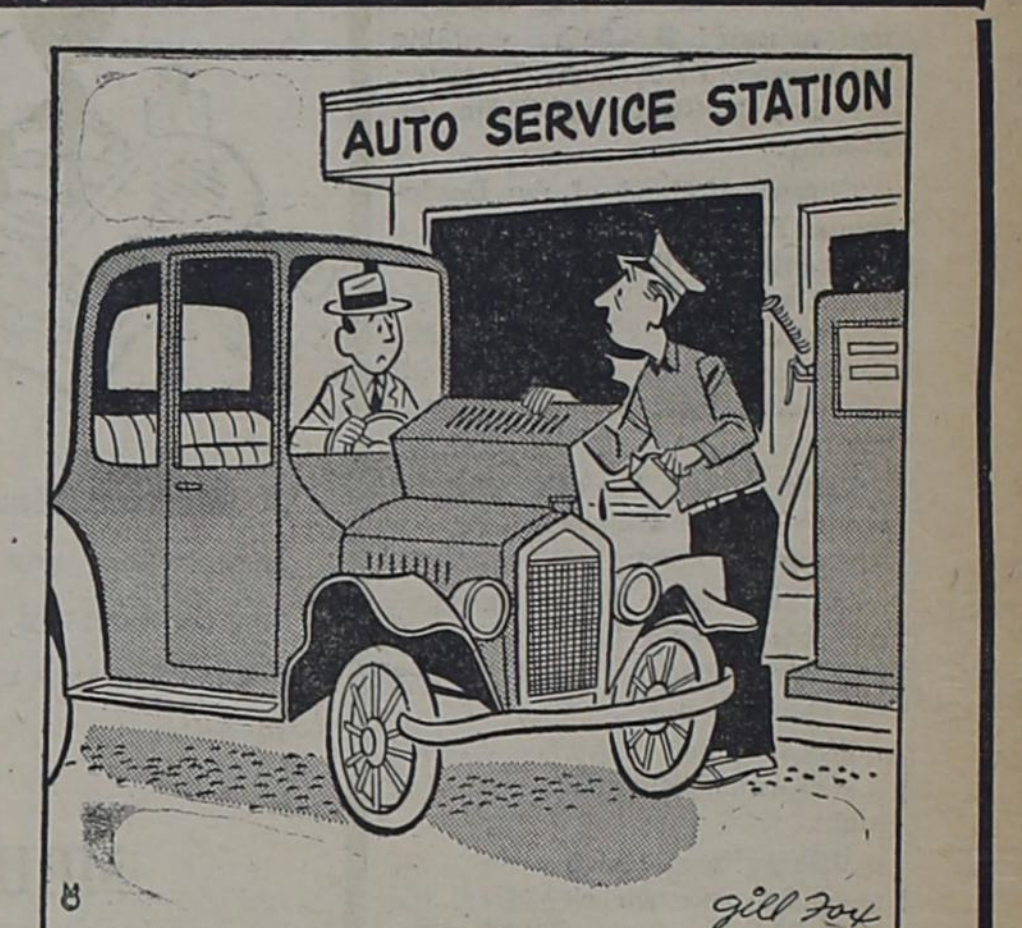

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE FOREIGN AID BILL passed by the House of Representatives last week authorizes \$4.6 billion. Two weeks before the Senat passed a similar Bill.

ON THE MATTER OF FURNISHING aid to Communist dominated countries such as Poland and Yugoslavia, both the House and the Senat marched up the hill and down again.

THE SENATE FIRST ADOPTED AN AMENDMENT which would cut off assistance to Communist nations, and then followed it with another amendment exception agricultural products. The House of Representatives first said that no assistance of any sort or kind should be given to the Communist nations, each country being spelled out by name. It then followed this action with a provision permitting the President to grant such aid to any nation if he found it to be in the "vital interest of the United States."

THE TWO VERSIONS OF THE MEASURE will now be brought together in a Conference between the House and the Senat. As finally passed, doubtless authority will remain to grant assistance to any nation in the world, regardless of the nature of their government. Conceivably, this could even apply to Red China.

THERE IS SEEMINGLY AN INHERENT desire on the part of many Americans to feed hungry people. The desire and willingness on the part of these people are genuine and understandable.

THE HARD AND CRUEL FACT REMAINS that only a hungry and a distressed people have ever risen up against tyrannical rulers.

IN 1921 MR. HERBERT HOOVER headed the American Relief Organization which probably saved the Soviet Union. It is more correct to say that it saved the Russian Revolution started in 1917.

THE AMERICAN RELIEF ORGANIZATION received credit for saving millions of Russian lives. Just prior to this assistance, the structure of Soviet Communism was falling apart under the strain of hunger when Mr. Hoover's organization stepped in.

BETWEEN 1929 and 1939 it was estimated that Joseph Stalin massacred 17 million persons. Countless other millions died in Soviet labor camps. These same millions were those saved by American food.

A LOGICAL CONCLUSION OF ALL THIS was pointed out in a current column by Joseph Alsop. It is to the effect that, had it not been for American relief, Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and the rest of Eastern Europe would not now be in chains. China might be a free, rather than a slave state. Russia would have built her national power on a less ugly foundation.

THERE APPEARS TO BE CONSIDERABLE SENTIMENT, in and out of Government, to furnish food to Red China. The biggest obstacle to it is simply that the Government of Communist China has not made the request.

SHOULD THIS YEAR'S CROPS IN Communist China be as bad as the past year, it is entirely possible that Mao Tse-Tung, like Lenin in 1921, may call on the United States for help and even agree to United States supervision, as was done in Russia.

SHOULD COMMUNIST CHINA CALL UPON THE United States for such assistance, it will not be out of a feeling of humanitarianism for her people, but to prevent the people from revolting. History indicates that this was exactly the situation in Russia in 1921.

MILLIONS OF LIVES WERE SAVED IN RUSSIA. The generosity of America was proved. But Communism was saved with all its evil results. The number of lives saved in this gigantic effort would weigh lightly in the balance against lives afterwards lost, warped or enslaved because of the Communist system.

IT IS NOT A MATTER OF MEETING EVIL WITH EVIL. This is not the Christian way. Neither is it Christian to contribute to the perpetuation of evil. It takes the Communists to disprove the ancient proverb of "Whose bread I eat, his song I must sing."
