PLANS UNDER WAY TO ESTABLISH

have given the "go ahead" signal for the establishing of a soil testing station in Gorman to be placed in operation during the fall of this year. A study is be ing made at this time as to the materials that will be needed for such a station and as soon as they have been worked out, necessary steps will be taken to place the testing station in operation.

The use of a soil station in this section should be of great tenefit to the farmers, and with the proper testing facilities it will give the producers an advantage that they have never had before.

Plans now are that the soil tests will be made during the fall and winter months in order that the farmers and land owners may determine to their own satisfaction just what type or analysis of commercial fertilizer will be best suited for their individual farms.

Very little, if any charge, will be made for the tests, and a wide section if this part of the state will be invited to use the station during the coming year.

As soon as the plans have been completed and the station placed in operation the farmers will be will begin.

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




