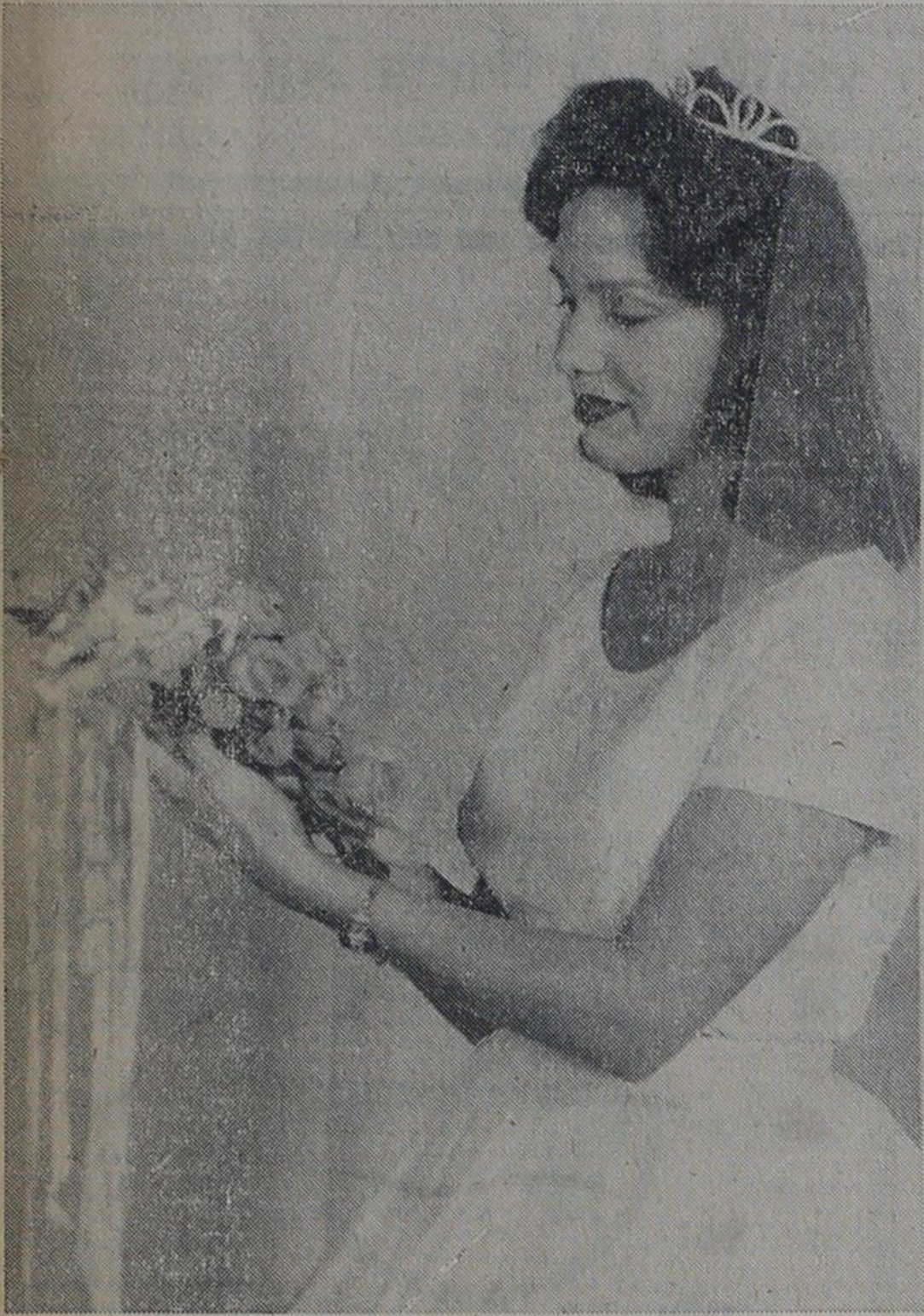


Miss Carol Hatcher Becomes Bride of Charles Brown In Surprise Ceremony

SCHOOL BOARD RECOMMENDS EQUALIZATION PROCEDURE

The School Board of the Gorman Independent School District, in a late meeting Monday night of this week, after having met earlier in a discussion session with the Equalization Board and its advisory group, passed the following resolution by unanimous vote:

"The Gorman School Board recommends that farm and ranch real estate property in

general be increased in value for school tax purposes by forty percent (40%) over its 1962 assessed value, and that the value of all other real estate property be assessed at twenty-five (25%) of its "fair and reasonable market value" as determined by the current Equalization Board. (The \$2. rate would be applied to the above values).

It is further recommended that the Equalization Board be encouraged and backed in exercising its right and obligation to equalize to the best of its ability the values of similar properties, whether rural or city.

The object of this recommended procedure is to bring about a high degree of equality in values of different types of school tax properties than has been in effect in recent years."

All members of the board were present at the above meeting with the exception of Dr. W. M. Brogdon.

The Equalization Board and the Advisory Group are scheduled to meet again this Friday night to attempt to reach agreement on valuation adjustments.

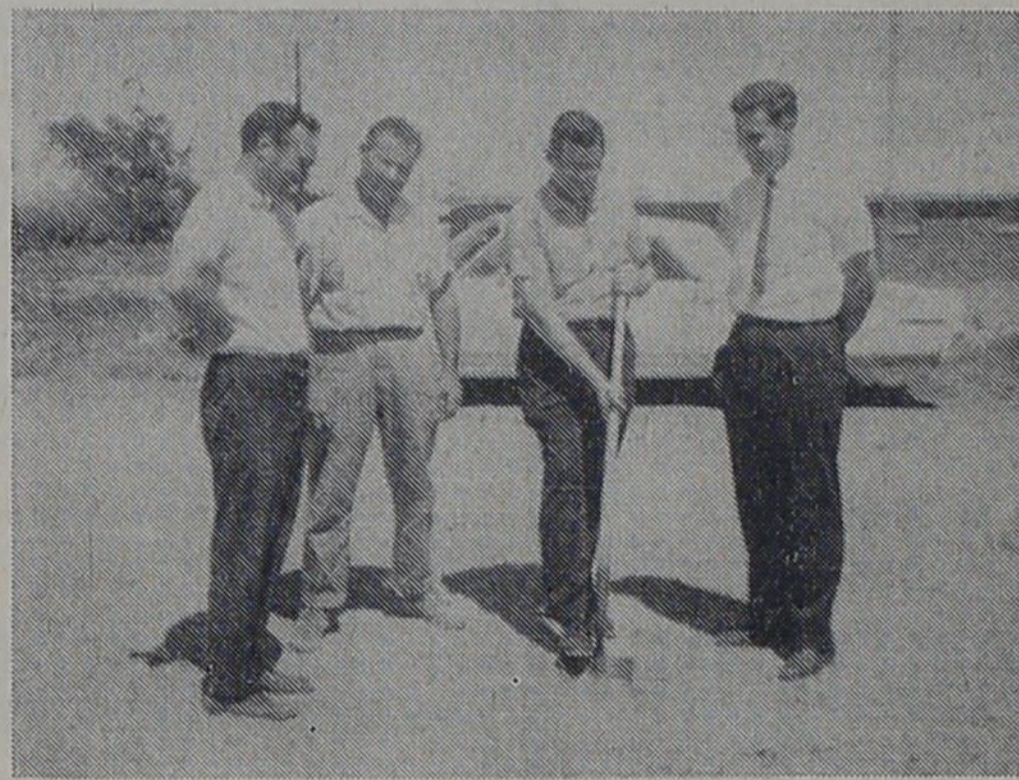
