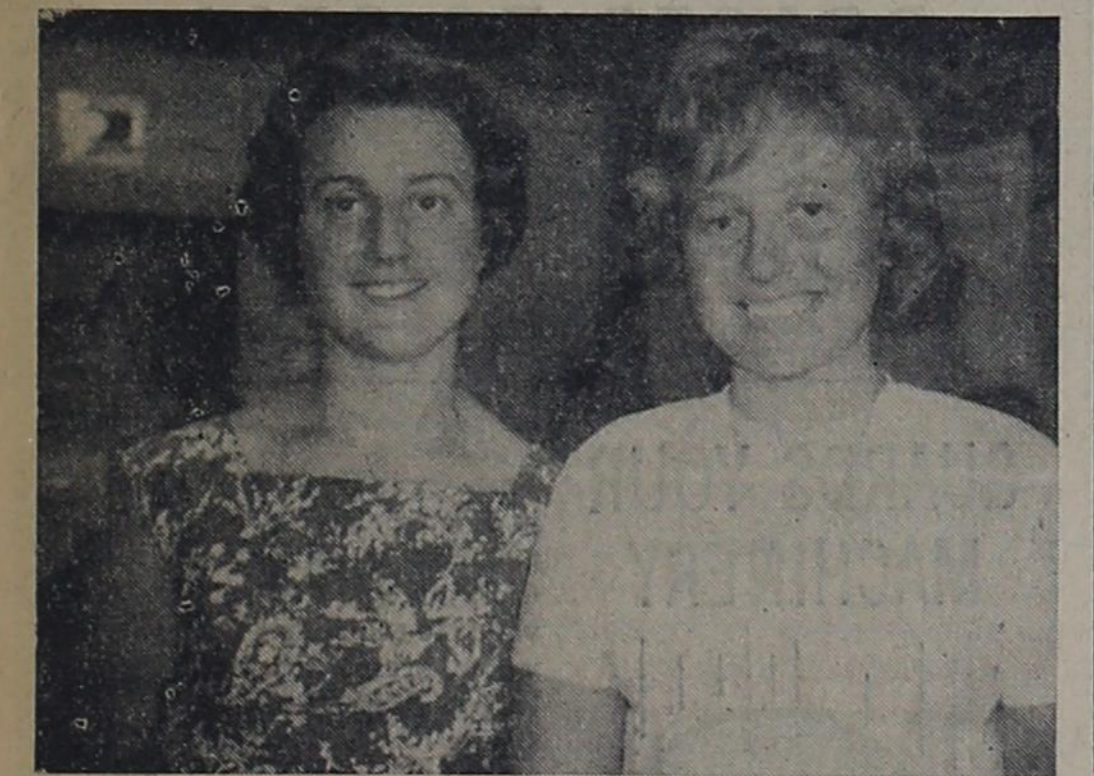

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## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

There are some who waggishly suggest that the chicken should be substituted for the American eagle, inasmuch as chicken seems to play such an important part in public life the past three decades or so.

First, of course, was the famous decision knocking out NRA which was based on the marketing of chickens.

And now the big international news is chicken. While the U. S. State Department has been bending over backwards to dance the tune of the European Common Market, and U.S. protective tariffs have been slashed high, wide and handsome to open the American market to an ever increasing flood of cheap foreign imports, chickens again pop up.

Despite all the polite palaver, the European Common Market without so much as a "by your leave" upped their tariff sharply from 4 1/2c per pound to 13 1/2c on American chickens.

Frozen American poultry has been a substantial export item. Europeans have always had a fondness for chicken, from the coq au vin of France, to chicken cacciatore of Italy, to jaw breaking Teutonic name for chicken with dumplings. Europeans delight in chicken.

But chickens, getting ready for the pot, consume a lot of grain. This is not the most plentiful commodity in Europe with

many of the nations having to rely on imports of feedstuffs.

However, American ingenuity, aided by an abundance of domestic grains, plus electrical current, developed the mass production of poultry through electric battery brooders, and found the peoples of Europe quite willing to buy in big quantities. The efficiency of the American poultry producers is so great, nobody as yet has been able to match them.

So with the typical European philosophy "if you can't lick 'em, tax 'em," the European Common Market sharply increased the tariff on imports of American poultry.

Thus, once again the chicken becomes the cause celebre of American life.

Of course, there are other examples pointed out of how chicken applies to current U.S. affairs. Every time some obscure nation has yelped unless they get a cut of foreign give away funds from America, they will go communist, the State Department gets chicken and give them a slice of the tax dollars.

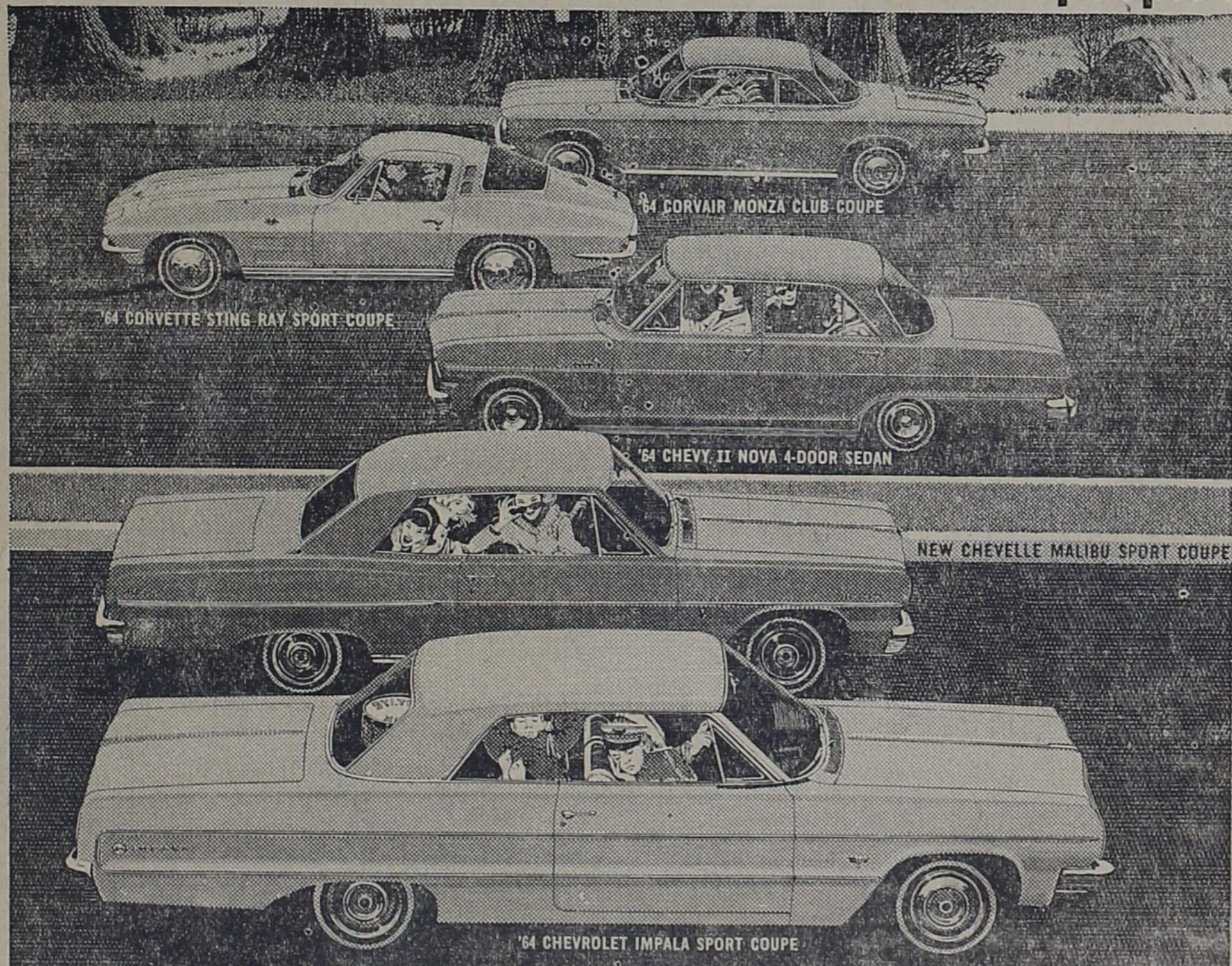
These chicken tactics have so far cost the American taxpayers over \$100 billion and the end is not in sight.

In addition, this squandering of American dollars to back up the chicken tactics of the State Department has dissipated the gold reserves and has taken out of American small business funds needed to launch new enterprises, expand existing business firms. This has created a serious unemployment situation. So now, the chickens are coming home to roost.

The county farm leader declared that membership in Farm Bureau is the best assurance that a farmer or rancher has that his economic future is protected.
